Premier of France Flies to U.S. for High Level Talks

Paris — (U.P.) — French Premier Pierre Mendes-France flew to America Saturday night for talks with President Eisenhower which were expected to include the new Russian call for a European Security conference.

The Premier left Paris only a few hours after the Soviet Union in an attempt to block German rearmament proposed a conference here, or in Moscow, on Nov. 29 of 23 European nations, the United States and Communist China.

To Discuss Talks
Informed sources said that Mendes-France planned to raise the question of new talks with the Soviet Union in his meeting next week with Mr. Eisenhower and Secretary of State John A. Edgar. Mendes-France favors the West drafting a new plan for co-existence with the Communists, the sources said. However, France does not want such East-West talks until after ratification of the German rearmament and sovereignty treaties.

There was no official comment on the Soviet's latest proposal in Paris. But diplomatic circles predicted the Russian bid would fall to block French ratification of the new Western European union pact, which would rearm and free Germany.

Ike Plans To Send German Treaties To Senate Monday

Toledo, Ohio — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower plans to submit to the Senate Monday the treaties to restore sovereignty to West Germany and bring 500,000 of her troops into the European defense against Communist expansion.

The plan was disclosed Saturday while Mr. Eisenhower was enjoying a duckhunting expedition on the shore of Lake Erie. **Strong Recommendation**
White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the German treaties will be sent to the Senate Monday with a strong recommendation for ratification in January.

"He will stress the importance of these agreements to the free world and his hopes for speedy ratification in January," Hagerty said.

Mr. Eisenhower does not expect action on them at the present session of the Senate, convened to consider censure charges against Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.). **Submitted for Study**
But he submitted them to this special session for study by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in the hope that it would clear the way for speedy approval when the 84th Congress meets in January.

In addition to his own strong arguments, Mr. Eisenhower will send the Senate a voluminous report from Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Little Hope Held For 15 Men Trapped In Mine Explosion

West Virginia Blast Kills Father of Four

Farmington, W. Va. — (U.P.) — An explosion ripped through a coal mine Saturday killing one man and trapping 15 others more than a mile inside. Efforts to rescue the 15 were abandoned Saturday night minutes before a second blast shook the mine. Little hope was held that the 15 trapped men still were alive.

Demolished Entry
The first blast let go with a mighty roar about 1:45 p.m. at the Jamison Coal and Coke Co. No. 9 mine and demolished the main entry portal, a ventilating fan house and nearby structures. Mushroom-like clouds of black smoke billowed from the portal. Smoke still poured from the shattered ventilating shaft hours after the explosion.

The second explosion occurred minutes after George McKay, general manager of the mine, ordered a halt to rescue operations until a fan could be repaired to expel the deadly fumes. McKay said two entrances to the mine would have to be barricaded before repair work could be started.

Rescue May Take Days
Members of the rescue crews said it may take days to reach the men trapped deep in the mine.

McKay said equipment to repair the fan was being rushed here but it would take "several hours" before the job could be completed.

One rescue team was ordered to stand by but a team from nearby Monogah was ordered to report back at 4 p.m. Sunday. Howard Jenkins, 38, father of four children, who was working outside the mine Saturday was killed by falling debris. The trapped workers were members of a maintenance crew.

Midnight Monday Deadline for Taxes

Deadline for payment of Jackson county property taxes is midnight tomorrow.

He also pointed out that any letter containing payment will be in time for a tax refund if it is postmarked before midnight.

After tomorrow, penalties amounting to a small percentage of the total payment for each month of delinquency will begin.

OREGON YOUNG REPUBLICANS APPLAUD WATKINS FINDINGS

Speaker Declares Liberal Attitude Needed by Party

Portland Man Named To Serve as Chairman

The Oregon Young Republican federation adopted a resolution yesterday applauding the Watkins committee on its findings "and the soundness of its findings in recommending censure of Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) for conduct which would have tended to bring the U.S. senate into disrepute."

The measure was adopted overwhelmingly with only one vote cast against, according to committee officials. The federation, which was holding its state convention in Medford, also adopted two other resolutions on national affairs, including one endorsing the "co-operation offered by the government in private power development as presented by the administration."

Election Discussed
In the last major speech of the convention, State Sen. John Merrifield, Portland, blamed the recent GOP election failure in Oregon to "failure of our state-wide Republican organization to do the kind of selling job which is required in the year 1954. Oregon has changed and I question if all of us Oregon party workers have changed with it."

The speaker stated that the defeats could not be blamed on any Democratic landslide, and said the GOP must "adopt a more liberal attitude . . . and re-examine our Republican machinery in Oregon and replace the faulty and worn-out parts."

The federation wound up its convention last night after a long day of activities, including committee sessions in the morning and a business session in the afternoon, long into the early evening. Heading the new officers elected was George Tomlinson, Portland, as chairman. He is deputy district attorney for Multnomah county.

Others included Emily Handy, Roseburg, co-chairman; Fred Bernau, Roseburg, assistant chairman; Winston Carl, Medford, vice-chairman at large; Dorothy Fletcher, Portland university, secretary; Robert Batcheider, Willamette university, treasurer; James Hatfield, Salem, national committeeman, and Maryann Stoop, Eugene, national committeewoman.

The convention opened Friday night with a dinner at which State Rep. Robert Root was the speaker. The average convention attendance was about 75. (See Story on Page 2)

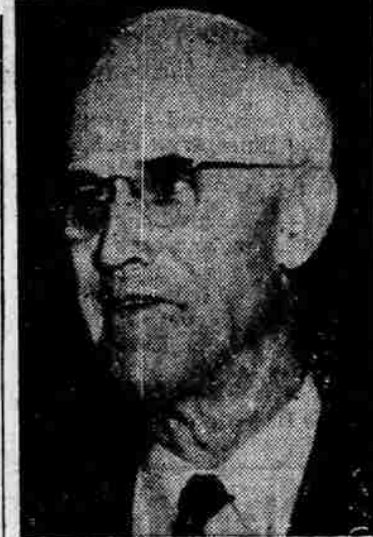
Cordon Says Future Plans Not Definite
Sen. Guy Cordon, defeated in the recent election by Richard L. Neuberger, says his future plans are not definite but he probably will practice law either in Washington, D. C., or Oregon—or both.

Cordon, visiting friends here and in Grants Pass yesterday, also said he would not concede defeat to Neuberger or ask for a recount of votes until results of the complete official canvass are announced by the State Elections Bureau.

With 29 counties reported in with official figures, and unofficial tallies from the remaining seven counties, it appeared that Neuberger's margin will be slightly more than 2,400 votes.

Hearing Demanded by Klamath Murder Suspect
Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — James O. Anderson, 32-year-old rancher from Beatty, Ore., on the Klamath Indian reservation, Friday demanded a preliminary hearing when he was arraigned on a charge of first degree murder.

Anderson, who appeared at the arraignment without his attorney, is accused of the murder of Richard David Miller, 25-year-old son of a Tucson, Ariz., family.



STICKS TO GUNS — Sen. Arthur Watkins (R-Utah) Saturday refused to alter his position on the censure of Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.) despite efforts by Sen. Francis Case (R-S.D.), a member of the Watkins committee, to obtain a "constructive substitute" to the censure move.

Sen. Case Would Back Substitute For Censure Move
Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Francis Case (R-S.D.) said Saturday he would support a constructive substitute for the resolution to censure Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy because

it is "unjudicial" and a "negative thing just to tack a man's hide up on the wall."

Case is a member of the special committee which recommended that McCarthy be censured. However, during Senate debate he had proposed that the censure move be killed if McCarthy would apologize for some of his deeds and remarks.

Still Keeps Charge
The Wisconsin Republican refused, and that move collapsed. However, Case still was seeking some substitute.

Case said that "pure censure" of McCarthy would be "sterile and negative." He said he would support a substitute for the censure resolution "if I thought it provided a more constructive result."

But Sen. Arthur V. Watkins (R-Utah), chairman of the special six-man committee which unanimously recommended censuring McCarthy, told reporters: "I signed some recommendations and I haven't altered my position."

Reaffirms Stand
Watkins thus reaffirmed his stand after learning of Case's remarks.

Newsman asked Case if he would vote to censure McCarthy on the basis of the committee report.

"That depends on developments during debate," Case. "How can I predict?"

End Diplomatic Relations With Russia, Jenner Urges

Washington — (U.P.) — Chairman William E. Jenner of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee Saturday urged the severance of diplomatic relations with Russia and its satellites to "seal off the spy centers" in their embassies.

The Indiana Republican strongly recommended this action in a statement distributed with the fifth volume of his group's hearings on "Strategy and Tactics of World Communism." The volume contains testimony that the Soviet Union has used diplomatic facilities to further subversion.

Budenz Testimony
Louis Budenz, self-confessed former Communist, testified that Bolelaw Gebert, whom Jenner called a former Russian spy chief, set up the diplomatic establishments to "be links with the Communists and espionage in this country."

Jenner pointed out that "Mr. Budenz also declared that, before the United Nations was established and when the Soviet embassy was the sole Red diplomatic agency here, it directed the espionage."

Budenz was one of three witnesses whose testimony is included in the volume. **Two Other Witnesses**
Another, Grigori Klimov, a former Soviet official who defected to the West, said: "Political subversion is the primary and main purpose of all Soviet diplomats here and of the Communist party in the West."

Rep. Fred E. Busbey, (R-Ill.), the third witness, warned that, "you cannot trust or do business with the Kremlin under any circumstances."

Proposal for Talks On Europe Security Termed 'Insincere'

Formal Answer Set for Monday

Washington — (U.P.) — American officials late Saturday rejected Moscow's new bid for a 25-nation conference on European security as an insincere sabre-rattling propaganda effort to stall western progress on rearming Free Germany.

Officials who analyzed Soviet invitations for the proposed talks in Moscow or Paris on Nov. 29 expressed confidence that the Western Powers would maintain a united front in turning down the Russian invitation.

Hit Rearmament Plan
The Soviet Union warned that rearming Germany "greatly increases the threat of a destructive atomic war in Europe." The Russians added that bringing a demilitarized Germany into military blocs sets European states against one another and leads "finally to war."

The Soviets in almost identical notes to the United States, Britain, France and 21 other Communist and non-Communist European nations proposed the meetings be held in Moscow or Paris. The Russians said they "hoped" that Communist China would attend as an "observer."

The nations invited were: Austria, Albania, Bulgaria, East Germany, The Netherlands, Greece, Iceland, Norway, Romania, Turkey, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, France, Great Britain, Belgium, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Italy, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Luxembourg and the United States.

West Germany Omitted
Omitted were such countries as West Germany, Spain and Portugal, which have no relations with Russia. However, the Soviets offered to let the Western Bloc Three invite "European nations with which the Soviet Union has no diplomatic relations."

(Western observers and diplomats in London, Paris, Bonn and Washington predicted that the latest Soviet conference proposal would be turned down flatly. Washington said it was a "bald, undisguised" effort to kill the new Paris agreements on rearming a sovereign West Germany.)

Answer Slated Monday
The first U. S. formal answer will come Monday when President Eisenhower will send to Congress the Oct. 23 agreements to grant Germany its sovereignty and rearmament. This will be carried out within the Brussels Treaty organization and the North Atlantic treaty organization.

American reaction — In advance of Allied conferences on a formal reply — followed these general lines:

1. The Russians never expected that a meeting would be held on Nov. 29. It would be physically impossible to do the advance work for such a conference in two short weeks.

Scare Try Charged
2. The Russians engaged in a bald effort in their note to frighten the Europeans with the spectre of atomic war. They also raised the grim pictures of Hitlerism, heavy defense burdens, death and destruction for all Europe if the German rearmament program supported by the West goes into effect.

3. The Russians provided absolutely nothing basically new in proposing the conference. Experts said it sounded the same to them, except for a date, as the proposals put forward at the Big Four foreign ministers conference in Berlin last February by Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

Early Morning Blaze Destroys Dailey Motel

Ashland — (U.P.) — Fire early Saturday destroyed the four-unit Dailey's Motel on the highway about four miles south of Ashland. Owner Wayne Dailey estimated loss at \$20,000.

The blaze which started about 3 a.m. was fanned by a strong wind. Motorists passing by stopped and helped Dailey remove most of the furnishings from the motel units. There were no guests staying at the motel when the fire broke out.

The Dailey family's adjoining residence was saved.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined.
