St. Mary's Defeated By Tough Moro, 26-7

Moro high, a good team with power in the backfield and a big strong line, ruined the state B football title hopes of St. Mary's of Medford Friday afternoon.

Stanford U. Upset 19-14 By San Jose

Stanford, Calif. (U.P.)—San Jose State's underdog Spartans, who met highly favored Stanford Saturday with orders just to enjoy themselves, frolicked to a 19-14 victory over the Indians in one of the biggest upsets on the Pacific Coast this season.

It was the first triumph ever recorded by a San Jose team over Stanford. Up until Saturday the Spartans had lost all 11 games in the neighborhood series and were expected to drop this one by at least two touchdowns.

And San Jose took this one the hard way, storming back from behind twice and halting two Stanford drives on their 17 and 13 yard lines during the second period.

Two of San Jose's tallies climaxed 54 and 69 yard marches. The touchdown which wrapped up the game came in the fourth 14-12 and Indian Quarterback John Brodie passing dangerously deep in his territory. One of his tosses was intercepted by Matt Vujevich on the Stanford 24 and he raced to the four to set up the crushing tally.

USC Socks UW, 41-0

Los Angeles (U.P.)—University of Southern California kept its slate clean in Pacific Coast conference play Saturday by defeating a weak Washington team 41-0, but so far as 36,108 fans were concerned the game was won on the opening kickoff which Aramis Dandoy raced 95 yards for a touchdown.

The crowd had hardly settled down in Memorial Coliseum when Dandoy took the kick on the run which equalled the longest kickoff return in Southern California history.

Southern California scored four touchdowns in the first period and two in the third, in both cases with the starters in the game. Against the reserves, however, the Huskies were able to keep their opponents scoreless in the second and fourth periods to what amounted to a moral victory.

Dandoy's run was not the only long sprint of the game. Fullback Gordon Duvall in the third period broke loose from scrimmage for 77 yards to score on the other major run of the day.

Hal Duncan, ace back of the Moro gang, swept around end 30 yards to score on a drive following the opening kick-off. The conversion was bucked. Another end jaunt by Duncan produced the TD in the second stanza.

Stan Read of St. Mary's provided a game highlight when he ran 80 yards for a goal on the second half opening kick-off and cut the Crusader deficit to 13 to 7. A 60-yard pass interception run by Ivan Kirbelie was good for a Moro counter in the panel.

Duncan drove into the pay zone from the two in the final canto after L. Smith had run back a punt 45 yards to the SM four. The conversion was kicked.

The Crusader squad returned to Medford early Saturday. Coach Ed Hummel said the St. Mary's players who took a physical beating in the Chiloquin mix a week ago, suffered even a worse battering at Moro.

Laval Meunier in the backfield and Gerald Darland, Joe Hassler and Ramon Elberts in the line were fine on defense for the Crusaders and Read was a standout on offense.

St. Mary's was Jackson county and District 5B champ and Moro was tops in District 6B.

Hector Constance Decisions Jones

New York (U.P.)—Newcomer Hector Constance of Trinidad B.W.I., will continue campaigning as a welterweight and will meet some 147-pound contender at Madison Square Garden in December or January despite his victory over middleweight Ralph (Tiger) Jones Friday night.

Sammy Richman, Hector's American manager, said today "He's still a welterweight and we don't want him to fight any more middleweights."

Managing Director Harry Markson on the International Boxing Club agreed and said "We'll match Constance with Carmen Basilio, Vince Martinez or Al Andrews in December or January. Everyone was very pleased with his Garden debut last night."

Constance, who is ranked 10th among the world's 147-pound contenders, weighed 153 pounds as he won an upset majority decision over 161-pound Jones of Yonkers, N.Y., in their television 10-rounder. He spotted the more experienced Jones eight pounds.

Corvallis (U.P.)—The University of Oregon Frosh wrapped up an unbeaten "season" yesterday by handing the Oregon State Rooks a 13-2 defeat at Bell field here.

It was the second win of the season for the Ducklings over the Rooks. The Frosh won their other game from Grays Harbor Junior College last week. PCC rules permit only three games a year by freshmen teams. The Rooks lost all three.

The Frosh scored both their touchdowns in the third quarter, one on a 42-yard gallop from scrimmage by Jim "Precious" Williams and the other on a five-yard plunge by Dick Jarvis after a 38-yard punt return by Leroy Phelps. The Rooks got their safety when Dwayne Fournier of McMinnville tackled Jack Hankel in the end zone.

1955 STATE GOLF OPEN SET FOR ROGUE VALLEY

Rogue Valley Country club here will be host for the 1955 Oregon Open Golf tournament, the club officially announced yesterday.

Club Pro Al Williams said that the tournament will be held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, March 25, 26 and 27. A 72-hole medal play tourney is scheduled with 18 holes on the first two days and 36 on Sunday.

A pro-amateur event may be contested on the Thursday before the state title rivalry. Committees to administer the open will be chosen soon, Williams stated.

It will be the second state tourney here within a year. The match play Oregon Golf association affair was held at the Rogue Valley Links in June.

Generally, the Oregon open is held in early May and in the fore part of a week. However, this area generally has good weather compared to the northern part of the state in March.

The week end timing will enable larger galleries to gather and the time is more convenient for pros of the Portland area to leave their clubs. Play in 1955 will mark one of the few times the open has been held outside of the Portland vicinity.

Bruce Cudd, Portland, an amateur, won the title last year and Ralph Dichter, Astoria, another simon pure, was runner up. Eddie Hogan, Riverside, Portland, was low professional.

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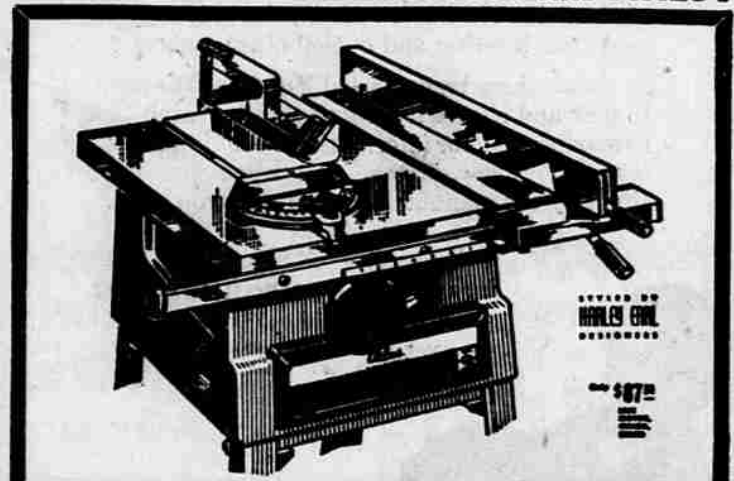
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
