

Democrats Warned Against Any Inquiry into Loyalty Program New York Newspaper Declares

New York — (U.P.)—The New York World-Telegram and Sun in a copyright dispatch from Washington, said Saturday the Eisenhower administration has warned the Democrats against launching any investigation of the GOP loyalty program.

The story said the administration warned it would prove that 96 per cent of federal employees fired as security risks were inherited from the Truman regime.

The spokesman said any investigation would show more than 50 of those dismissed as subversives had been members of the Communist Party.

"It will show that many were members of 10 or a dozen organizations listed by the attorney general as subversive," the spokesman was quoted.

"It will show that, of the 48 perverts found in the Central Intelligence Agency, every one was a holdover from the Truman administration. It will show that,

of 94 perverts found in the State Department everyone was inherited by the Eisenhower administration.

Gold Hill Navy Corpsman 'Unpopular' at Shot-Time

Criss A. Dizick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Criss A. Dizick, route 2, Gold Hill, was "just about the most unpopular man" on board the USS Osborn recently, according to a Navy press release.

Dizick, a hospital corpsman, is usually highly popular for his seafaring and headachy remedies for the men aboard the destroyer. But not when he lined up his fellow crew members to give them their bi-yearly "shots" for cowpox, cholera, tetanus and typhoid.

The Navy release said on one day he shoved a needle into the arm of sailors more than 1,200 times, with each of the 250-man crew getting five shot each.

Navy crewmen get such shots — inoculations and "boosters" — every six months while overseas, and each year while in the U.S.

Dizick took his recruit training at San Diego, and his corpsman training at Bainbridge, Md., later serving in Boston where he inoculated "thousands" of sailors. Last August he was transferred to the Osborn for his first tour of duty in the Far East.

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More Accuracy in Smog Prediction Techniques Slated

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — James C. Worthy, assistant secretary of commerce, said Friday night the U. S. was developing new techniques of "smog" conditions in areas "such as Los Angeles."

Speaking at a meeting of the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, Worthy said the Weather Bureau was studying the use of new electronic techniques for the analysis of weather data and the "problem of forecasting." However, he said application of the techniques were "not too well developed as yet."

Better Service Ahead
"It would seem that the potentialities for automatic instrumentation, for improved communications networks, and for higher speed data processing machines hold out new prospects for better service," he said.

"Among such prospects is that for the more accurate prediction of 'smog' conditions in areas such as Los Angeles, thus making possible preventive actions which may greatly reduce the present menace."

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Red Proposal Seen As Newest Attempt To Freeze Out U. S.

Soviet Russia's call for a conference on "collective security" in Europe is the latest attempt by the Kremlin to freeze the United States out of Europe.

It is aimed directly at preventing the armament of Western Germany and sabotaging the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. But Moscow's big aim remains, as it has been for a long time, to promote the "Yankee Go Home" movement of the Communists and leave Russia dominant on the whole continent of Europe.

Under the Russian call for a conference to start in Moscow or Paris on Nov. 29 the United States would be invited only as an outsider along with Communist China.

Moscow Note Seen As New Propaganda
It is incredible that Soviet Premier Georgi M. Molotov and Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov really could hope to lure the Western Allies into this conference and get it started only 16 days from now.

Hence the Moscow note may be written off largely as propaganda. It is propaganda which nevertheless has its appeal to the important elements in Europe who are ready to do nearly anything to get rid of their dread of a third world war.

But the Kremlin's overall aim is to get the United States out of Europe and to gain control of the whole of Europe including Germany.

It was on last February 10, at the Big Four foreign ministers conference in Berlin, that Molotov proposed a 50-year security treaty which would take the place of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Nobody but a Communist ever would have had the cheek to make such a proposal — that the Western Allies scrap their defense system, that the European Allies abandon their defense ties with the United States and that they enter a "security" treaty in which they would depend for their defense upon the Red armies of Russia and its satellites.

Under the Soviet proposal, the United States would take part in the "security" conference, while Red China would be there only as an observer.

But the United States would be effectively frozen out of any part in the defense of Europe — and there would be no organized defense against Communist aggression.

There was one notable thing about Saturday's Soviet note —

It did not enter into any blistering denunciation of "warmongers." It was, rather, argumentative and, from the Communist viewpoint, reasoned.

That may be part of the current Soviet "peaceful co-existence" propaganda, which advanced a stage last Sunday when Molotov urged in talking to the United States and British ambassadors in Moscow that the Big Four power revert to old-fashioned secret diplomacy to keep individual incidents from becoming crises.

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Hearing on Harlan Appointment Slated To Start Nov. 19

Washington — (U.P.) — The Senate Judiciary committee will open hearings Nov. 19 on the nomination of Federal Judge John Marshall Harlan to the Supreme Court and on 10 other presidential appointments.

There has been no indication of opposition to President Eisenhower's nomination of Harlan, 55, to succeed the late Robert H. Jackson. Several senators have praised the appointment of the New York Federal Circuit Court judge.

Committee Chairman William Langer Friday announced the hearings on the 11 nominations received since the Senate reconvened to consider censure recommendations against Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.). The North Dakota Republican had said earlier he could not plan hearings during the censure session as long as the Senate Republican leadership discouraged them.

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Tokyo — (U.P.)—Actor Clark Gable arrived in Japan Saturday for his first visit amid the sights, giggles and ecstatic stares of Japanese female fans. 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Root Sees Next Session of Legislature as 'Tough One'

State Rep. Robert Root of Medford Friday night told delegates to the state convention of the Young Republicans of Oregon that the 1955 session of the state legislature will be "a tough one" because of the fiscal problem.

Speaking at the Jackson hotel, Root pointed out that more than \$22,000,000 in new money will be required "if needs remain the same." However, he added that needs are going to increase in school, welfare, salary adjustments and building.

Heavy Local Taxes
The state representatives added that the legislature will be reluctant to put all the increase on property, "even though the voters might be considered to have asked for it" when they defeated the six-mill property tax limit at the general election.

The basis for the reluctance will be the heavy local property taxes in many places, he added.

Root stated that the "legislature would be justified in considering the election an easy answer to what is expected to be its principal problem. However, the Oregon legislature doesn't always take the easy answer, and this one will still call for plenty of aspirin."

To Use Surplus
He pointed out that the state will use up all but about \$8,000,000 of the \$55,000,000 treasury surplus it had at the end of World War II.

A buffet dinner in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel preceded the speech. Registration for the conference began at 6 p.m. Friday.

Winston Carl, Medford, was general chairman for the convention, assisted by William Duhaime.

The convention concluded last night, after a full day of activities.
