

Jacques Fath' Fashion King Dies in Paris

Paris, Nov. 13.—(U.P.)—Fashion King Jacques Fath, who dedicated the styles for millions of women throughout the world, died today after a lengthy illness. He was 42.

For nearly 14 years the fun-loving Parisian Socialite had shared the limelight with Christian Dior as one of the two best known and most important designers of women's clothes. His creations set the pace of serenity in the world capital of fashion. His father wanted him to be an accountant, but Fath followed from childhood the urge to fashion that first was apparent when as a youth he began designing dresses for his sister's dolls. His death, from an undisclosed ailment, brought mourning to the world of fashion and expressions of regret from even his bitterest competitors.

Fath's latest creation was a collection of spring coats and suits for American women, known as the "Windflower Silhouette." Designed for a well-known New York fashion house the collection is now being shown to buyers.

Fath was born with designing in his blood. His great grandmother, Caroline George Fath, designed ball gowns for the Empress Eugenie, wife of Napoleon III.

He made his first entry into the fashion world just before World War II—but without much success. He served with distinction during the war, winning the Croix De Guerre.

With the return of peace, Fath really hit his stride and made the established firms like the Schiaparelli, the Worths and others sit up and take notice.

In 1948, he made a deal with an American manufacturer to design a special collection for the American trade. The manufacturer provided Fath with a small studio and ten workers.

In six weeks, he had turned out 40 dresses for the mass retail market. His clothes were an immediate success, and his star was firmly fixed.

With his fame as a fashion designer established, Fath embarked in the perfume business. He handled the complicated business of blending the scents and designed the bottles.

Fath had been ill for several months and spent several days in the American hospital at Neuilly early in October. He died this morning at his home in Paris.

PTA Congress Prepares Guide To Evaluate Books, Radio, TV

As a help to the evaluation of comic books, motion pictures, and radio and TV programs, the action committee in these areas of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers has prepared guides for evaluation of these media.

The evaluation guides have been distributed to local associations, not as a means for setting up approved and disapproved lists, but as a tool to be used for the examination of the content of mass media designed for youth.

Mass media have a definite place in the communication of ideas and in the building of cultural concepts, the national congress committee said. While it recognizes that the code of ethics set up by the motion picture industry itself has functioned with appreciable success over a comparatively long period of time and that similar codes have been adopted by radio and television producers, it nevertheless stresses the need for a vigilant attitude on the part of citizens and citizen groups on community, state, and national levels. That there is a need for this vigilance is evident in the growing concern of parents, teachers, and others as to the kind of mass media fare being served to our children.
