

Back to School Night Observed By Gold Hill PTA

Gold Hill—Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association observed "back to school" night November 10 in the school gymnasium. The event drew a large attendance.

Mrs. Lester Parker, ways and means chairman, reported that the committee held October 21 at the home of Mrs. Paul Malloy proved most successful.

Membership chairman, Mrs. Clyde Kell, reported 171 members so far, the largest number to join in any previous year. The membership drive carried on between rooms ended at this meeting, and the winner will be announced at a later date.

Mrs. Norman Gail, family relations chairman, spoke of available literature on hand for parents to take home and read.

Robert Sage, principal, announced that Gold Hill school is now participating in the special milk program authorized by the agriculture act of 1954 which is intended to expand the dairy program by increasing the milk consumption of school children. First grade children are now receiving milk in the afternoon.

Part of this cost is being paid by the government in the form of reimbursement making milk available to children at the cost of 2½ cents per one-half pint. It was voted to adopt the milk program for the organization's project for the year making up the amount needed to carry on this worthwhile program.

Mr. Sage also spoke of the crowded conditions of the schools, the gradual increase in youngsters entering school each year and the possibility of adding another class room. He stated the district is fortunate in having a building in such good condition for its age and one which so nearly meets the requirements essential to a good school.

The principal further said the district is fortunate to have certified teachers with years of experience in their profession.

After the business meeting, parents were invited to visit the rooms where the teachers talked with them, explained the books and where work was on display.

Don't Mix Oil, Wax In Cleaning Furniture

Lincoln, Neb. —(U.P.)—Cleaning tip: furniture polish and wax don't mix. Clara Leopold, extension home management specialist at the University of Nebraska, advised that homemakers choose either oil or wax for furniture instead of using wax one week, oil the next. If you do want to change the routine, make sure the old surface is removed first by washing. Wipe the surface with a well-soaped cloth, then with a clean damp cloth. Give the furniture plenty of time to dry, before applying wax or polish.

Light Switches Glow If Painted with New Phosphorescent Dope

New York —(U.P.)—Light switches, jewelry and even fishing plugs can be made to glow in the dark with a new phosphorescent compound which is applied like glue. The compound, applied from a tube, contains a vinyl-based adhesive, which sticks it to paper, wood, glass, cloth or metals.

You can outline a door knob, light switch or fuse box for easy locating in the dark. Once the lights are turned off, the compound will glow for hours. Or, apply the adhesive to lamp shades, pictures, jewelry, or greeting cards, sprinkle on some phosphorescent glitter which comes with the compound, and these too take on a night-time glow.
