Prince Charles of England Is Six Today; Party Planned

London — (U.P.) — A blond boy nicknamed "Chunkie," who doesn't know he will sit one day as king on the British throne, turns six today with a burning ambition to be a railroad engineer.

His Royal Highness Prince Charles, Duke of Cornwall, went to bed early tonight at Sandringham palace in happy anticipation of his birthday party.

Everybody will be there—his mother and father, Queen Elizabeth II, and the Duke of Edinburgh, his aunt, Princess Margaret, and his sister, Princess Anne. Everyone except "gran-nie," Queen Mother Elizabeth who is now in Canada on a royal visit.

It is the first birthday for Bonnie Prince Charles when his grandmother will not be on hand to help with the party and give him a present. But before she left London for the United States, the Queen Mother gave the Queen a parcel to be hidden until Sunday and promised to call her grandson from across the Atlantic to wish him a happy birthday.

This is no ordinary birthday for the young prince. It heralds the coming of age for British royalty, because from now on his father will influence his education more and more.

The accent on dancing classes and games with girls is over. Prince Charles will spend more time riding horseback, swimming and learning the games other boys the world over play.

It was recently disclosed that the Queen and Duke were making tentative inquiries about boxing lessons for Charles, and that feelers had been extended to an American boy as a sparring partner. But the palace has since known that the boxing plans have been postponed until Charles is a little older.

Despite the many plans for Charles' future, he hasn't been told he will one day be king. He knows his mother is queen and that is why people cheer and wave when she passes, but the involved details of royal succession are a mystery to him.

Home Construction Sets New Records

Washington — (U.P.) — Construction began on 106,000 non-farm homes during October, setting a new record for the month.

The Labor Department reported the new construction pushed the total for the first 10 months of 1954 in the non farm home category to more than 1,000,000.

The October starts topped the 102,500 figure for October, 1950, the record housing year, and were 18 per cent higher than the October, 1953, level. They were 7 per cent below the total for last September however. For the first 10 months of this year, housing starts totaled 1,016,500 second only to 1,215,000 homes started in the first 10 months of 1950 and well above the 950,000 to 975,000 homes started during the first 10 months each year since 1950.

Freezer tip: When preparing meat pies or turnovers for freezing, leave the pastry crusts unbaked. Crusts are flakier and have a fresher flavor than those baked and then frozen.

Coffee Shop, Barber Wage Bitter War for Customers

London — (U.P.) — A coffee shop and a barber waged a war for business Saturday.

The feud started when Claude Barnett, who owns the Moka Coffee Bar in the Soho District's lineup of night clubs and exotic restaurants, noticed that many of his early morning customers needed a shave.

So Barnett installed an electric razor and put up a sign offering a "free shave for everyone buying a cup of coffee before 10:30 a.m."

Business boomed. But across the street barber David Crook watched his customers trickling into the coffee shop and searched for a counter-move.

Two days later a large sign appeared in Crook's window. "Free cup of coffee for everyone having a shave before 10:30 a.m.," it said. The battle was on.

Crook's coffee-making is costing him \$28 a day for hire of a coffee making machine and cups, whereas Barnett has his razor on free loan from its manufacturers.

"We'll fight to the finish whatever," Crook said. "Besides, we have a secret weapon. If Barnett doesn't quit using his razor next week, we'll start serving biscuits with our coffee."

Savings Bond Sales Up in State, County

Sales of U.S. treasury savings bonds in the state of Oregon in October showed a large increase over sales in October, 1953, according to figures just released by E. C. Sammons, chairman of the Oregon Savings Bonds committee.

Sales of E and H bonds in the state last month amounted to \$3,499,472, an increase of 50 per cent over the sales for October, 1953. State sales for the 10 months of this year amounted to \$30,635,761.

Sales in Jackson County in October were \$85,478, according to Morris B. Leonard Sr., county chairman, compared to \$755,835 at the same time last year.

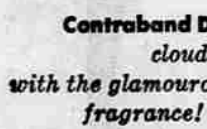
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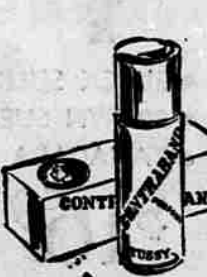
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
