

Insulated Draperies**Announced by Company**

Insulated cotton draperies are a recent development in household weatherproofing. Called "Weatherwall," the material is an everglaze cotton lined with millium, which insulates against the sun's rays in summer and cold drafts in winter.

A room decorated with these draperies loses temperature only 50 per cent as fast as an ordinary room in winter, according to the Everglaze Marketing Division. In summertime, it gains heat only 50 per cent as fast as the ordinary room.

One side of Weatherwall is a lustrous, embossed cotton—available in 20 vat-dyed decorative colors. The other side is millium-treated with a coating of silvery aluminum crystals.

The material is resistant to creases, shrinkage and stretch, won't stain, soil or spot easily and is durable. It may be used as a drapery lining to protect delicate fabrics from sun fading and deterioration. It won't hike or sag.

Cotton Kitchen Towels
Double as Curtains

Even a very modern powder room, filled with 20th century fixtures, can be right at home in a house decorated in early American style. Cotton kitchen towels can help do the trick.

Make cafe-style window curtains of a yellow and red kitchen towel printed with spinning wheels, rocking chairs and other Early Americana. Paint the walls a yellow to match that of the towels and put up of colonial-style mirror of wood instead of a chromium medicine cabinet.

Even a simple electric clock can go colonial if you mount it in a wooden salad bowl lined with cotton chintz; bore a hole in the center for the clock cord. The bowl serves as a frame for the clock face.

Topping
1/4 cup fine bread crumbs
1/4 cup flour
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons margarine
9 apricot halves, stewed or canned
Mix the dry ingredients. Cut or rub in margarine until the mixture is crumbly.

Batter
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup melted margarine
1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Combine the beaten egg, milk, and melted margarine. Add to the dry ingredients, stirring until the batter is smooth. Pour into a greased 8x8-inch cake pan or into a 9-inch round cake pan. Press apricots into the top of the batter, arranging them so each out portion of cake will have one piece of fruit. Sprinkle topping over all. Bake in moderately hot oven (350° F.) 25-30 minutes. Serve warm, with margarine. If desired, drizzle thin confectioners' sugar icing from a small pitcher over the top of the cake for garnish.

While she didn't do any public speaking, another extremely attractive visitor in the city last week was Mrs. Karlin Capper-Johnson, whose husband spoke for a meeting in the YMCA Thursday night. Mrs. Capper-Johnson, another pretty brunette, is a native of Czechoslovakia. Mrs. Ryhiner, who said she speaks "kitchen Malay" as well as French, German and English, has almost no accent but Mrs. Capper-Johnson has a most interesting one.

Bob Jones of the YMCA promptly identified Mrs. Capper-Johnson's accent as soon as he heard her talk, which surprised her. He explained that he at one time had a Czech friend who spoke almost exactly like the visitor.

Professor Capper-Johnson, on the faculty at Lewis and Clark in Portland, thinks most people in this country need to know more about the United Nations and since many agree with him, he didn't even have to urge those in his audience to start a unit of the Oregon United Nations association here.

The professor, practical sounding, well-grounded in international relations and immensely anxious for the UN to succeed in its efforts to preserve peace, believes that unless citizens around the world make an honest effort to understand one another, talk things out and get along, the UN will fail, another devastating world war will come and democracy will be immeasurably harmed.

"When my ancestors in Scotland were raiding one another's lands and carrying off cattle and waging small wars, at least the land was there after they were through," said the speaker.

He repeated, in effect, many of the statements made in Medford earlier this fall by Dr. Heberto Sein, Mexican diplomat and authority on the United Nations and said he believed, as does Dr. Sein, that the common people have it in their power to make the UN work successfully.

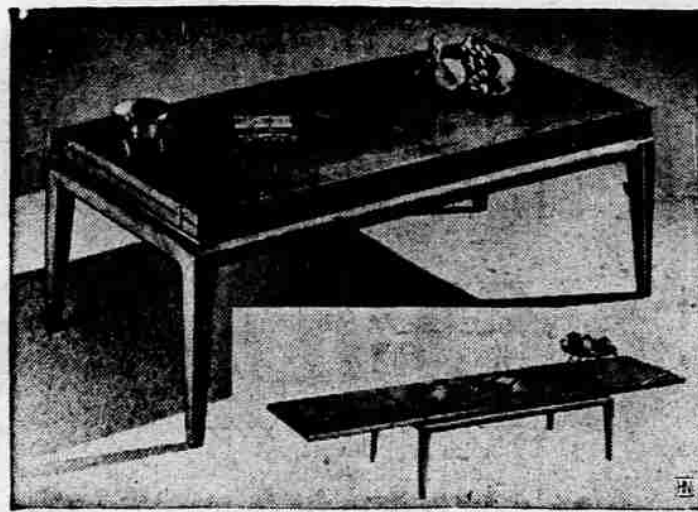
Talk about UN always ends in talk about Russia and China and it did Thursday. Admitting that Red China's admission into the UN is a mighty problem, Dr. Capper-Johnson pointed out that China's latest census puts her population at more than 600 million and said that many people can't just be ignored.

"The Chinese are empire-minded—and not a people just to stay home and do nothing," he warned. "They shortly will be well organized and well armed." The professor echoed some of the thoughts of Joseph Alsop who recently wrote in the Saturday Evening Post that the present trend in China is what it is because the Chinese are Chinese, and not altogether because they have turned Communist, and reviewed their "recurring pattern" of "digestive imperialism."

Dr. Capper-Johnson is hopeful that President Eisenhower's plan for an atomic energy pool will be successful and said that the president's addresses about this had given a fresh approach to the problem of rearmaments. He read from a speech the president had delivered in April of 1953 to the American Society of Newspaper Editors in which he had said, after describing what the world may be facing as the result of using atomic knowledge only for warfare: "The best would be this—a life of perpetual fear and tension; a burden of arms draining the wealth and the labor of all peoples; a wasting of strength that defies the American system or the Soviet system or any system to achieve true abundance and happiness for the peoples of this earth."

"Every gun that is made, every warship launched, every rocket fired signifies in the final sense a theft from those who hunger and are not fed, those who are cold and are not clothed. This world in arms is not spending money alone. It is spending the sweat of its laborers, the genius of its scientists, the hopes of its children." He then added comparative figures about the cost of only one heavy bomber—a modern brick school in more than 30 cities, two electric power plants for two cities of 30,000 population, two fine, completely equipped hospitals, etc., to show the enormous cost of the arms race.

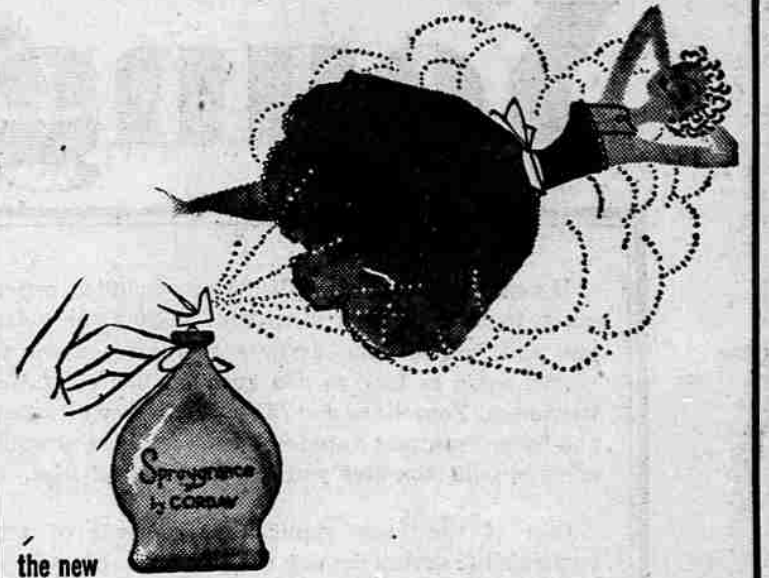

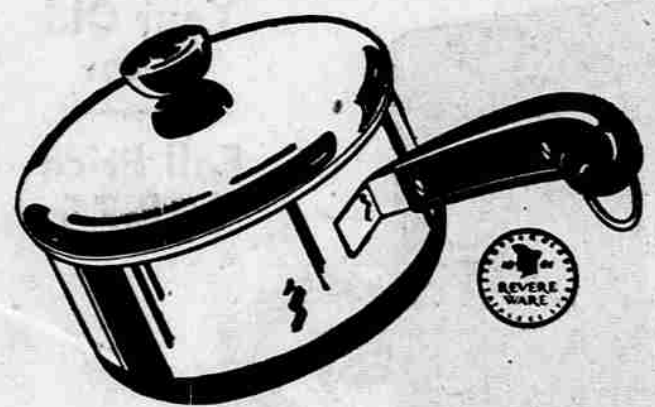
