

Official Ballot Canvass Changes No Elections; Write-Ins Listed

The official canvass of the Jackson county vote in the Nov. 2 general election showed a change of only six votes from the unofficial tally in the hot race for United States senator.

Republican Guy Cordon gained the six votes for a final count of 11,914. His Democratic opponent, Richard L. Neuberger, the apparent victor on the basis of statewide canvasses, received 9,758 in Jackson county. This was exactly the number given him by the unofficial count.

Three Write-Ins
Write-in votes for the United States senator post. The number was unusually low as most voters made an attempt to "make their vote count" for one of the two candidates. Write-in votes went to Wayne Morse, Oregon's Independent U. S. senator who still has four years of his present term to serve; Robert Root, Republican state representative who was not a candidate for reelection, and W. P. Tucker, long-time county official now serving as county constable.

One of the closest votes was on the city of Medford's controversial dog control measure, which was defeated by a narrow 3,476 to 3,295 margin, according to the official canvass.

Billy Graham Sets Portland Meetings

Portland — (U.P.) — Billy Graham, the world-famed evangelist, will return to Portland this week for two mass meetings sponsored by Youth for Christ.

The visit will be Graham's third in Portland. In 1950 he attracted more than 629,000 persons to 45 meetings held in a huge, specially-constructed hall. In 1951 he addressed a crowd of 14,000 at a single meeting.

This week's appearances are scheduled for the civic auditorium and Multnomah Stadium. He will appear in the auditorium Saturday evening and will conduct an outdoor revival at the stadium Sunday, Nov. 20, regardless of weather conditions. On Nov. 22 he will meet with Portland clergymen at the Rose Bowl of Multnomah hotel and then will leave for two meetings in Seattle. Members of the advance party of the Graham team will arrive in Portland Friday. The evangelist recently concluded a series of sermons at New Orleans, La.

Roundtable Sessions Started by Chamber; Gaining Popularity

Weekly roundtable sessions, started some four weeks ago by the membership committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, have proven to be increasingly popular, it was reported last week.

Attendance has almost doubled, from 16 at the first session Oct. 25, to 30 at last Monday's session. Increasing attendance is expected.

Purpose of the roundtable luncheons is to bring in new members, to get them acquainted with older members of the chamber and with the work the chamber is doing.

Discuss Mutual Problems
"People can find out what's going on," according to Manager Don McNeil. From time to time speakers will be brought in to discuss specific phases of community development, he added, but most of the time the meetings will be simply an informal discussion of problems which affect everyone in Jackson county.

It is thought that regular attendance at the meetings will make for greater unity in the chamber, and a better-informed group, according to Vic Milnes, chairman of the membership committee who started the project. All chamber members and their guests are welcome.

The meetings begin at noon and end at 1 p.m.—sharp, McNeil explained, so that members can get back to their businesses. The sessions are at the Jackson hotel, and Mrs. Betti Boyle, the manager, provided a real roundtable for the first roundtable meeting. But increasing attendance has required extra tables.

Self-Help Plan May Aid Wool Growers

Roseburg — (U.P.)—A Department of Agriculture official Saturday told delegates to the 59th annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers Association that the self-help feature of the national wool act provides the means of improving the market and lessens the need for federal price supports.

Frank W. Immasche, deputy director of the USDA's commodity stabilization service, said agreements may be entered into with the secretary of agriculture for the purpose of developing and conducting advertising and sales promotion programs.

Funds for financing these promotions may be obtained from payments to growers, he said. These self-help methods cut down the need for government price assistance, Immasche said.

Secretary Victor W. Johnson told the convention the association now has \$8062 in the treasury.

The convention closed Saturday with a discussion of lamb promotion and Oregon pasture development.

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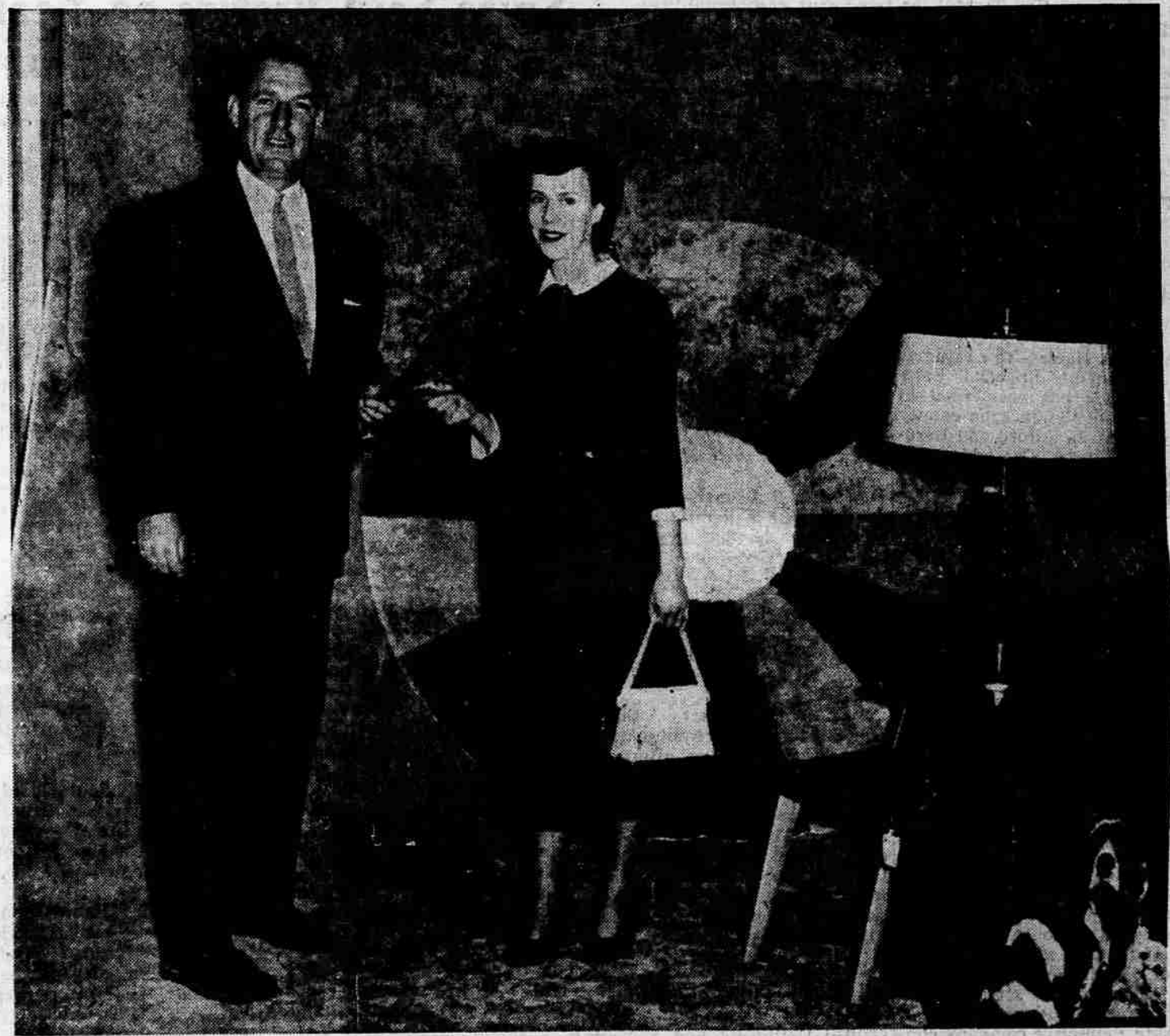
