

Many Local Officials Attending Meeting of Oregon Cities League

A number of city officials from Jackson county will take part in the annual League of Oregon cities convention beginning today at Portland. It ends Wednesday.

At least 15 Medford officials plan to attend the meetings, according to Mayor D. L. Flynn, vice-president of the League. Flynn is considered a strong candidate for president of the League next year as the vice-president usually ascends to the top post. Elections will be held Wednesday morning.

Main Topics

Main topics of discussion during the convention include coordinating park and recreation development, slowing traffic down on through highways, re-

lating state and local programs, buying municipal insurance, guiding community growth, grading city fire defenses, dealing with fringe areas and running a small city.

Several local officials will participate in the various convention sessions. Monday afternoon, Harvey will be a panel member on the topic of "City Policies and the Fringe Area." At the same time, Duff will be discussion leader in the fire protection section concerning "New Developments in Fire Alarm Systems."

At a small cities section, Ferd W. Jones, Gold Hill recorder-treasurer will be on an advisory panel on small city problems.

To Preside

Tuesday morning, Mackie will preside at the breakfast business meeting of the Oregon chapter, Pacific Coast Building officials. He is president of the group. Flynn will preside at a noon luncheon at which Gov. Paul Patterson will be the speaker.

In an afternoon session with municipal judges, H. R. Jordan, Ashland city judge, will preside. The topic will be "Disposition of Teenage Traffic Violators." Mackie will also preside during the building regulation section which will concern new materials, construction and city department responsibilities.

The convention closes Wednesday with the annual business meeting.

Watkins Promises 'No More Wrangles' With McCarthy During Censure Debates

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Arthur V. Watkins (R-Utah), said Saturday he will have "no more wrangles" with Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy during the Senate censure debate.

Watkins, chairman of the committee that recommended censure of the Wisconsin Republican, said he will not interrupt his speeches in the future to answer oral questions by McCarthy or any other senator. He said he would answer only questions submitted in writing or posed in speeches by other senators.

Watkins announced he will take the floor Monday to speak on the censure issue when Senate debate resumes Monday. At the end of his opening speech Wednesday, Watkins was questioned at length by McCarthy and the two exchanged angry charges.

Recalling that the senator who has the floor can decide whether to yield to a questioner, Watkins told newsmen: "I can't use the gavel to silence McCarthy, as he did in the censure committee hearings, but I can determine how I extend courtesies."

With the Senate in recess, McCarthy flew to Milwaukee for a speech Saturday. His friends continued work on a compromise plan which they intend to offer in the Senate Monday or Tuesday in an effort to soften the censure move.

In Milwaukee Friday night, McCarthy again predicted the Senate would vote to censure him. He said Democrats and "left-wingers who ran under the Republican banner" had the votes to put the censure resolution over. McCarthy predicted only the "Taft-type" Republicans would support him.

McCarthy Refuses To Give Apologies To Hendrickson

Milwaukee, Wis. — (U.P.) — Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy says he isn't going to apologize to anyone, so the Senate might just as well go ahead and censure him.

McCarthy, arriving here Friday night to attend a testimonial dinner, told newsmen he hopes the censure will be over with soon "so we can get on with the work we've got to do."

The Wisconsin Republican's refusal to apologize applied specifically to Sen. Robert C. Hendrickson (R-N.J.), target of a stinging remark by McCarthy.

"Bob Hendrickson is a good friend, and I like him," McCarthy said. "If I could say anything that may make him feel better, I would but I have no plan for an apology."

McCarthy planned to limit himself to a few "brief remarks" at the dinner in his honor last night.

Sen. Barry M. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) is the featured speaker at the \$5-a-plate dinner. Goldwater, in a statement Friday, said the Communists had started the original censure move to "get McCarthy." He said if McCarthy is censured, the next Communist drive would be against FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover.

Chairmen for the event, sponsored by Milwaukee County's Republican groups, said the proceeds from the 1,300 reservations would be used to pay for radio time to broadcast Goldwater's speech over 13 Wisconsin radio stations.

Rome Newspaper Asks Distribution to Army

Washington — (U.P.) — Assistant Defense Secretary Fred A. Seaton said Friday the Rome Daily American definitely will be distributed in Europe by the Army if servicemen want the newspaper.

Ray Vir Den, publisher of the Rome English-language newspaper, has charged the Army newspaper Stars and Stripes has refused to distribute the Daily American after first agreeing to do so. Stars and Stripes handles distribution of newspapers and periodicals at U. S. military installations in Europe.

Seaton said he has had a report from the Army in Europe that the Daily American matter is under study and that he himself plans to "get to the bottom" of the controversy.

"All publications are going to be treated fairly," Seaton said. "If there is a demand" for the paper by servicemen, "certainly there's going to be distribution."

Snite Said Victim of Years In Mechanical Respirator

Miami Beach, Fla. — (U.P.) — Frederick B. Snite, who lived nearly half his life in an iron lung, died an apparent victim of the mechanical respirator that kept him alive for 18 years, doctors said Saturday.

Snite, who married, became the father of three children after he had entered the Florida state bridge tournament at West Palm Beach and was resting from a game when he died.

Snite's father, a wealthy Chicago financier, was leaving a golf course here when the Rt. Rev. William Barry, pastor of St. Patrick's church, brought him the news of his son's death.

The father, Frederick B. Snite Sr., said the family's grief was somewhat softened because "he did live 18 years when others in his condition haven't lived a year."

Stum Pleads Guilty To Charge of Murder

Spokane — (U.P.) — Vernon Le Roy Stum, 32, Spokane, Friday pleaded guilty to a charge of second degree murder and was sentenced by Superior Court Judge Raymond Kelly to life imprisonment.

Stum had been scheduled to go on trial Monday on a charge of first degree murder for the fatal shooting of Charles V. Lyon, 23, Geiger Air Force Base, last April.

The earlier information also had charged Stum with kidnapping Mrs. Coffman after the shooting, but that charge was dropped when the murder charge was reduced. The murder victim had a wife and child in Vancouver, Wash.

Cornerstone Laid

Berne, Switzerland — (U.P.) — Stephen L. Richards of Salt Lake City, first councillor in the first presidency of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day saints, Saturday laid the cornerstone for the first Mormon temple in continental Europe at nearby Zollikofen.

La Jolla, Calif. — (U.P.) — The Volcan Alcedo volcano in the Galapagos island group off South America is erupting for the first time in recent times, the Scripps Institution of Oceanography reported Saturday.
