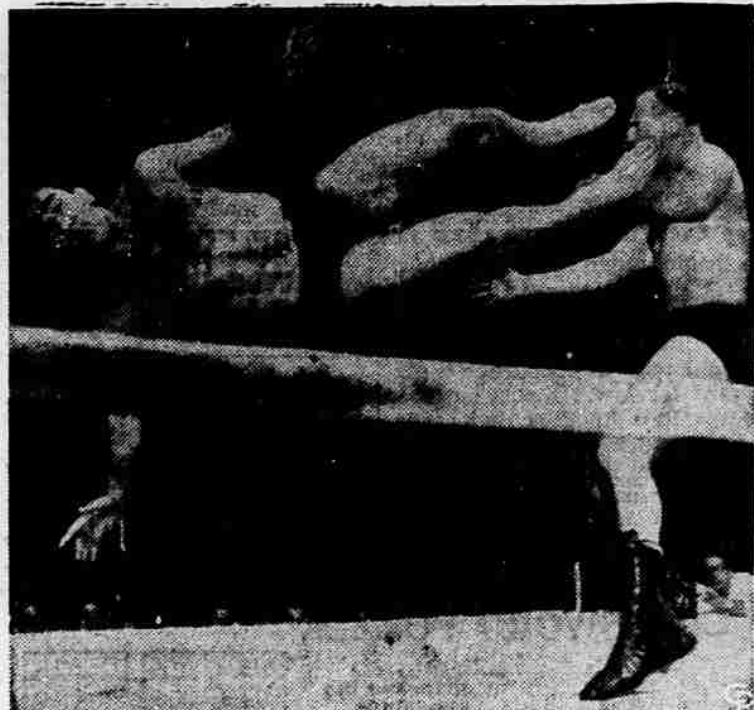
JOSEPH OWEN

Mendes-France Make Addresses in Canada

Quebec City — (U.P.) — French Premier Pierre Mendes-France today makes his first public address in Canada when he speaks at Laval University. Later tonight he will make a major address at Montreal.

Mendes-France, who arrived from Paris, was guest of honor last night at an official state dinner at the residence of Lt. Gov. Gaspard Fautex.

He will hold top level political discussions with Canadian leaders in Ottawa tomorrow and Wednesday before flying to Washington.

Conferences with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles are scheduled for Thursday and Friday.

Grangers Hear Incentive Praised

Spokane — (U.P.) — It is wiser and usually more successful to implement economic adjustment by the "incentive method rather than the punishment method," Dr. John Davis, former assistant agriculture secretary under Ezra Benson, said today.

Davis, now director of the Moffett program in agriculture and business at Harvard, told the 88th annual National Grange convention the federal price support program for farm products had been "infinitely cheaper than to have permitted surpluses to demoralize both domestic and world markets."

Had the full U. S. agricultural production been allowed to enter world markets, he said, world recovery after World War II would have been retarded.

"But the philosophy that the entire agriculture economy must be depressed economically as a means of forcing adjustment is unsound," he said.

Wrenches Found in Car

Scandinavian Plane Takes Off on First Trans-Polar Flight

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The Scandinavian Airlines' "Royal Viking" departed from Los Angeles International Airport today on an historic new commercial air flight across the North Pole region to Europe.

The plane, carrying 32 passengers and a crew of 10, took off 17 minutes later than scheduled because of a thick fog.
