Hollywood — (U.P.)—Lionel Barrymore was described by Hollywood leaders today as "the greatest of the Barrymores" and his death as "a loss to the entire world and the theater."

Dore Schary, head of MGM Studios where Barrymore was the dean of the contract stars, called the veteran performer "a great actor and a wonderful man."

"We at MGM who knew, respected and loved Lionel for so many years mourn with millions of his fans all over the world," Schary said. "The loss is a loss to the entire world."

Mother Admits She Fed Child Rat Poison

Ebensburg, Pa. — (U.P.)—Police held a mother of five children without bail today on a murder charge after she admitted feeding rat poison to her deformed two-year-old daughter because the infant "cried all the time."

State police said Mrs. Eileen Bell, 28, was taken into custody yesterday and admitted after two hours of questioning that she saturated a piece of bread with poison, put it under a sink and told her son, Robert, three, to give it to Ruth Ann last Wednesday. The girl died several hours later.

Mrs. Bell pleaded innocent to a formal charge of murder before Justice of the Peace Elizabeth Rowland and then was imprisoned in the same jail where her husband, William G. Bell, 37, awaited Grand Jury action for mistreating his son Robert.

Writer Cameron Shipp, with whom Barrymore collaborated on his autobiography in 1951, called Lionel "the greatest of the Barrymores."

"I never knew a man who was more cultured in as many fields as Mr. Barrymore," the writer said.

Jack Warner Shocked
Jack L. Warner, chief of Warner Bros. Pictures, said he was "shocked and saddened at his passing." Warner said "Lionel Barrymore was one of the renowned figures of the American stage and screen. I am proud that I knew him as a friend."

Charles Brackett, president of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, said he was shocked to hear of the actor's death.

"Lionel had a long and distinguished career since the days he appeared in 'The Copperhead.' I cannot express my sorrow in words," the academy president added.

Hells Canyon Group Lacking Case Funds

Portland — (U.P.)—Jim Marr, president of the National Hells Canyon County association, yesterday said the association lacks \$19,000 toward completing its case before the Federal Power commission opposing the Idaho Power company's application for three low dams on the Snake river.

Marr said current funds of the association would be spent by the end of the month. Plans for raising the additional amount will be considered at the association's annual convention here Saturday.

Marr said Nov. 24 is the deadline for filing of briefs in the lengthy FPC hearing on the dam issue. A decision by the examiner is not expected until late spring.

Eugene — (U.P.)—The Lane county commission yesterday voted to recommend disapproval of an application before the state racing board to permit a dog racing plant near here.

The three-man commission was to forward its recommendation to the state commission. It acted in accordance with disapproval many Lane county groups and individuals expressed toward parimutuel betting.

The petition was presented by Greyhound Park, Inc., which is seeking authorization to construct a \$300,000 dog track on the city's outskirts here.

Scandinavian Airliner Completes LA-Denmark Trip Over North Pole

Copenhagen, Denmark — (U.P.)—A Scandinavian Airlines DC6B airliner blazed the first commercial air trail across the north pole landing in Denmark on a 5800-mile flight from Los Angeles.

The giant four-engine U.S.-built "Royal Viking" arrived at Copenhagen's Kastrup Airport seven minutes ahead of schedule.

Pilot Ferdinand Buck, using a "magic" electric gyro-compass no larger than a baseball, brought 40 persons and nine other crewmen over the route in finally conquering the legendary "northwest passage" as uneventfully as on a routine flight from Washington to New York.

Delay Made Up
The flight took 22 hours and 28 minutes. A 35-minute delay at the takeoff from Greenland's Soendre Stroemfiord Air Base was made up on the way to Copenhagen.

Passengers and crewmen soared through the climates of three

seasons in passing over summery California, autumn in Winnipeg and wintry Soendre Stormfiord.

On its way to Los Angeles after taking off from Copenhagen last night was a second DC6B, the "Helge Viking," to complete the two-way transpolar link.

Anti-Censure Papers Get Good Response

New York — (U.P.)—Leaders in the drive to collect 10,000,000 signatures on petition urging the Senate not to censure Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy today reported overwhelming response from all parts of the country.

Rear Adm. John G. Grommelin, retired, chief of staff of "Ten Million Americans Mobilizing for Justice," said the response made him feel certain there will be no difficulty in gathering 10,000,000 signatures in the 10-day time limit.

The 16 U.S. and Canadian officials and 24 newsmen were greeted by Copenhagen's diplomatic corps at Kastrup Airport.

Among the passengers on the historic flight were Harold J. Powers, lieutenant governor of California, and Mrs. Powers; film stars Walter Pidgeon and Jean Hersholt, and Mayor Norris Poulson of Los Angeles and Mrs. Poulson. Mayor Poulson will visit the former home of his parents, the tiny village of Hornslet near Randers, Jutland.

Conquest of the polar route by a passenger-carrying aircraft came as a victory for the West over the Russians who have set up several weather stations in the area that strategists expect would be a "bomb highway" from the Soviet Union to the United States in wartime.

Aviation sources said neither of the two Vikings was contacted by the Soviet weather stations based on the Arctic ice flows.
