

Great Britain Joins in Contributing Material for 'Atoms for Peace' Plan

United Nations, N. Y.—(U.P.)—Britain joined the United States today in contributing fissionable material to help put President Eisenhower's "atoms for peace" plan into operation.

British Minister of State Anthony Nutting told the U.N. Main Political Committee that his government would earmark 20 kilograms (44.1 pounds) of fissionable material to serve as fuel in experimental atomic reactors.

United States Allotment Told

The United States announced yesterday that it had allocated 100 kilograms (220.5 pounds) of nuclear material to be used to fuel reactors abroad in connection with the program for the peaceful use of the atom.

"The American announcement is easily the equivalent of 100 eloquent speeches," answering Soviet delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky, Philippines delegate Salvador P. Lopez said.

The announcement which diplomats said gave "dramatic impetus" to the Eisenhower plan was made by U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., at the end of a reply to Vishinsky in

the United Nations Main Political Committee yesterday.

The Announcement

"I am authorized by the President of the United States to say that the Atomic Energy Commission has allocated 100 kilograms of fissionable material to serve as fuel in the experimental reactors to which the Secretary of State and I have previously referred," Lodge said.

"This amount of fissionable material is enough to activate a considerable number of these reactors throughout the world."

The precise type of fissionable material was not specified. It was considered unlikely it would be the weapons-grade U-238 used in atomic and hydrogen weapons but probably be either plutonium or U-235.

Shasta County Dam Permit Being Sought

Washington — (U.P.) — The Pacific Gas and Electric company has applied for permission to build a \$24,000,000 hydroelectric project on the Pit river in Shasta county, Calif., the Federal Power commission said today.

The proposed project would include a concrete gravity dam about 230 feet high, a reservoir with a capacity of about 34,000 acre feet, a 560-foot tunnel, two steel penstocks about 200 feet long, a powerhouse containing two 68,000-horsepower turbines, a substation, switchyard, transmission lines and a long concrete dam about two miles downstream.

The proposed development would use water diverted from the McCloud river as well as water from the Pit.

In case the overall project is not authorized, the PG&E submitted an alternate plan calling for slightly smaller turbines and using water only from the Pit river.

Lodge previously told the committee in response to Vishinsky's questions as to how the diversion of material from peaceful to warlike uses could be avoided:

No Question

"There are forms of peaceful utilization in which no question of weapon-grade material arises. In the activities proposed for the immediate future . . . weapon-grade materials would not be involved."

The figure supplied by Lodge was the same suggested last week by Brig. Gen. Carlos P. Romulo of the Philippines who

said Russia and the United States "should be willing to contribute the equivalent of one atomic weapon, say 220 pounds of fissionable materials."

Norway's veteran diplomat Finn Moe said the 220 pounds was enough for "10 atomic bombs."

Duke Discusses Marilyn Monroe

London — (U.P.) — The Duke of Edinburgh talked with Jane Russell about Marilyn Monroe last night.

The husband of Queen Elizabeth II walked along the line of movie stars attending the glittering royal film performance and stopped in front of Miss Russell. The actress had been sewn into her tight ivory and gold gown after a last-minute decision that a more revealing dress she intended to wear was a bit too bold for the queen's eyes.

"What are you doing over here?" the Duke said to the actress.

"I'm making a film, 'Gentlemen Prefer Brunettes,'" she replied, smiling.

"So you're getting even with Marilyn Monroe, are you?" the Duke said.

Both Miss Monroe, a blonde, and brunette Miss Russell appeared in the movie "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes."

Blue Ribbon Travel Slated for Iowa Hogs

Chicago — (U.P.) — Hogs will travel "first class" next week on a blue ribbon special train from Schleswig, Ia., to the International Livestock Exposition here.

Railroad officials said the stock cars will be painted yellow and green, the same as streamlined passenger trains.

Economists See '55 Business Boom Second To Record

Washington — (U.P.) — Government economists said today there will be a business boom in 1955 which may rank second to 1953's record peak.

The economists said a large factor in the expected boom will be a new record in both private and public building. They predicted new construction will hit 39½ billion dollars compared to this year's expected record of 37 billions.

The government also reported that corporations which publish dividend statements paid out seven billions in cash to their stockholders during the first 10 months of this year, \$500,000,000 more than in the same period of 1953.

Overall dividend payments, including non-reporting firms, were believed to total about \$10,500,000 for the 10-month period.

The construction estimate was contained in a joint report by the Commerce and Labor departments which predicted that a record \$26,400,000,000 will be spent for private building and a record \$12,100,000,000 for public construction.

Care for Children

Since Mrs. Ring does a great deal of welfare work through her church and through other means when she is physically able, the friends point out, anything they might receive which she is unable to use, "she will see to it that others in need will receive it."

Believing that it will be helpful to those who want to donate, Mrs. Hedgpeth has enumerated some of the items needed to make living easier and more pleasant for the ill woman.

Items Needed

Water pipe is needed to bring water into the house and a water storage tank of 200 to 500 gallons for use as an outside

reservoir; a washing machine, and if possible, a clothes drier; cash donations for hospital and doctor bills; and a double bed, blankets or other bedding, linens, towels and clothing.

In the way of clothing, the father, who is employed at the Red Blanket Lumber mill, and the oldest son, 16, need work clothes such as jackets, coats or other apparel.

Both the father and the oldest son wear a medium size, or about 15½.

The other children are a boy, age 14; a girl, 9, and a girl, 2, in addition to the baby girl.

A crib also is needed for the baby and numerous pieces of household furniture could be used, including an old davenport. Food of any kind also will be most acceptable.
