The purpose of the two guides, according to the committee, is to overcome the helplessness which many women feel in dealing with unfamiliar financial problems.

The new folder, produced especially for AAUW members by the editors of "Changing Times," the Kiplinger magazine, is also available to the general public. It contains four study units giving answers to concrete problems on borrowing wisely; investing on a small scale; health, fire, auto, and liability insurance; and budgeting, spending, and keeping of family records.

A handy check list for recording important financial information for the family is a bonus feature of the Folder.
