

Polynesia Expert Says Voyages Fail To Prove Theory

Honolulu — (U.P.) — A scientific expert on Polynesia says neither the William Willis nor the Kon-Tiki raft voyages have proved that the Pacific islands were peopled by migrants from Peru or North America.

Dr. Kenneth P. Emory of Honolulu's Bishop museum, one of the world's most eminent ethnologists, said that despite the success of the two raft voyages all concrete evidence still points to Malaysia as the spawning ground of the native populations of the Pacific. He listed these reasons for rejecting the South American or North American theory:

1. The languages of Polynesia have been identified by anthropologists as having roots in the west from Malaysia, Micronesia and Melanesia.

2. Polynesian out-rigger (double-hulled) canoes are similar to those found in Malaysia and are not found in the Americas.

3. The big balsa rafts copied by Willis and the Kon-Tiki expedition probably originated with the Inca empire period after Polynesia had been settled. Evidence indicates that Hawaii, the last of the Polynesian chain to be settled, got its first people 1,000 years ago.

4. The religious, social and material cultures of Polynesia all point west to Malaysia and not to Peru.

Dr. Emory said Peruvian sweet potatoes and stone work may have been brought to Polynesia, but only after it had been settled from the west. He said it may even be that Polynesians did the sailing to Peru and brought back plants and masonry. In support of that theory he recalled his work during World War II teaching the American troops the facts of survival when stranded in the Pacific.

"We found that a man lost at sea generally survived not more than four days," Dr. Emory said, "if he had no hope of reaching land. If Peruvians had started out to the west they would not have known there was land such as Samoa, ahead. This journey on the current takes several months."

"The migration from Malaysia would have been easier because of the 'stepping stones' afforded by the closely spaced islands where the travelers could take on fresh water and food. Also, the hurricanes and summer winds from west to east would have provided great tail winds for the sturdy out-rigger canoes."

Marlon Brando Said En Route To Paris

Rome — (U.P.) — Actor Marlon Brando was en route to Paris by car today with Italian film producer Renzo Davanzo. He said before he left he hoped to reach Paris in three or four days and intends to fly to New York the first of next week.

Brando said he did not know whether his fiancée, Josanne Mariani, daughter of a French fisherman, would be able to meet him at the New York airport. He said the last he heard from her was a telephone call before her flight to California to appear on a television show.

Freighter's Hull Cracked at Sea

Seattle — (U.P.) — The Pope and Talbot freighter Trader, with 48 crewmen aboard, radioed Coast Guard headquarters here today she had suffered a hull crack between frames on her main deck but was in no immediate danger.

The 6000-ton ship, en route from Yokohama, Japan, to Yaquina Bay, Ore., was about 840 miles west by north of Cape Flattery on the northwestern tip of Washington, proceeding in a northerly direction at about five knots per hour to soften the poundings of heavy seas.

The Coast Guard said the cutter Klamath would proceed to the scene as soon as possible.

Air Force Men Here On GOC Assignment

First Lt. Lew Ayres and Master Sgt. Bernard B. Moore have been assigned by the United States Air Force to coordinate Ground Observer corps activities in this area, it was announced yesterday.

Clay Tile Covers Underground Arteries

New York — (U.P.) — The underground arteries of this city are lined with enough clay tile to surface 77,125 average-size bathrooms.

Latest addition to this glistening acreage is the 440,000 square feet of tile which will line the \$100,000,000 new third tube of the Lincoln Tunnel, which is slated for completion in three years. According to statistics of the Tile Council of America, this new link in the city's transportation system raises the total surface of tile in New York's underground arteries to 9,240,000 square feet.

Clay tile, which engineers like because it's durable, easy to clean and has the pleasing effect of diffusing light, covers 7,000,000 square feet of subway, 770,000 square feet of the Brooklyn-Battery Tunnel, 260,000 square feet of the Queens Midtown Tunnel, 440,000 square feet of the Holland Tunnel and 330,000 square feet of the first two tubes of the Lincoln Tunnel.
