

Jim Carter Favored To Regain Mitt Toga From Paddy Tonight

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Paddy DeMarco puts his world lightweight crown on the block for the first time tonight when he gives former champion Jimmy Carter a shot at it in a 15-round nationally televised bout in the San Francisco Cow Palace.

The odds favor Carter at 11-5 to regain the title for the second time, with about 7,000 fans paying nearly \$40,000 to watch the battles.

The two fighters, pound-for-pound rated the slickest boxers in the business, both are confident of victory, with Carter claiming he'll score a knock-out.

Shift of Dodgers To LA Subject Of Loop Monday

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Plans to shift the Brooklyn Dodgers to Los Angeles will be discussed in New York Monday at a secret meeting called by President Warren Giles of the National Baseball League, the Los Angeles Herald-Express said last night.

The newspaper said it received a tip on the meeting from a "highly authentic" source.

It had been previously announced that the proposed invasion of California by the major leagues would be discussed at the National League's annual meeting in New York Dec. 9.

The newspaper said it learned that the special meeting was called without publicity, to offset possible plans in the American League to expand to 10 clubs at the earliest possible opportunity.

Ralph Kiner Sees Series Opportunity

Palm Springs, Calif. — (U.P.) — Ralph Kiner, Cleveland's high-salaried, home run-hitting acquisition from the National League, said today, he almost lost hope of playing in a World Series before his surprise trade to the pennant-winning Indians.

"Every ball player wants to play in that one," said Kiner. "I guess the last time I seriously thought I might make it was in 1948 with the Pirates."

Pittsburgh finished fourth that year and then settled deep in the NL second division despite Kiner's steady home run production. In 1933, the Pirates sold him to another second division team with only the faintest pennant hopes, the Cubs, who traded him to Cleveland.

First Good Chance

"It's the first really good chance I've had of making a series since I started playing in the majors," said Kiner. Seven National League clubs signed waivers on the slugger, whose salary is estimated at \$60,000 a year.

Only 32 years old, Kiner said he was in "swell shape" and could see "no reason at all why I shouldn't have a fine season" with the Indians next year. He hit 22 homers with the Cubs last year while his best season was 54 four-baggers in 1949.

"And I'd like to play at least another four seasons," he said. Kiner said he thought playing with a better ball club would take some of the pressure off his shoulders.

"It's always much easier to play when you're winning," he said. "When you're losing you always look back and take it out on yourself for not doing better."

Red Dawson To Quit Pitt

Pittsburgh — (U.P.) — The University of Pittsburgh postponed consideration of a successor to football coach Lowell (Red) Dawson today until after the season finale against Penn State on Saturday.

Athletic Director Tom Hamilton, who has been acting coach since Dawson was stricken with a heart ailment Oct. 12, said that "There will be no comment on any suggested" successors to Dawson until after the end of the season.

Third Year
Dawson, in the third year of a three-year contract, resigned as Pitt's head coach Tuesday to enter the business world. Red said his decision was made before the season began.

The 47-year-old Dawson, who has coached football for 22 years, said he wanted to wait until after the Pitt-Penn State game to make the announcement, but, since he was "tired of being the object of speculation," he announced his decision to quit sooner.

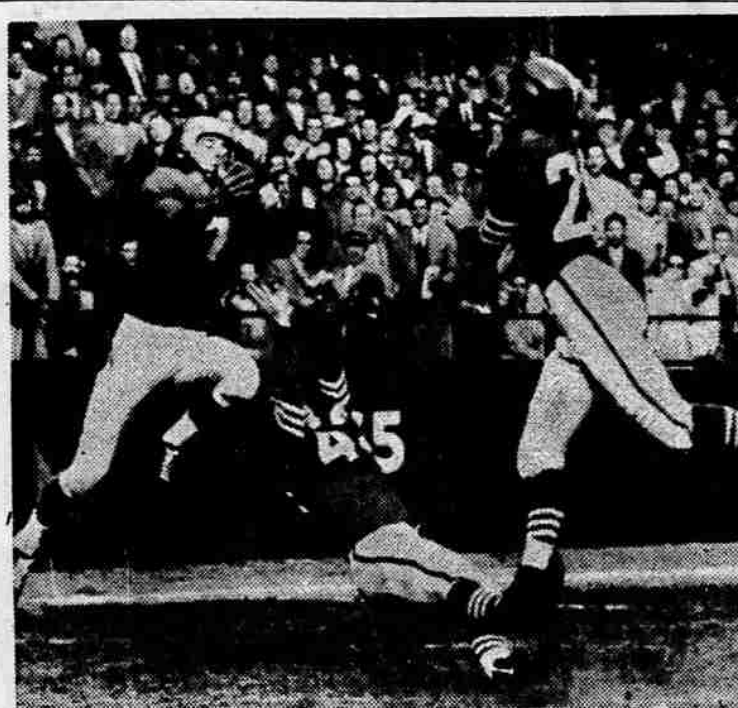

Trio Expected to Divide Profits In NCAA Grid Statistics Tussle

New York — (U.P.) — The firm of Shaw, Larson and Dawson will close up shop Saturday and divide its profits, evidently with each member getting his fair share.

The firm consists of George Shaw of Oregon, Paul Larson of California and Leonard Dawson of Purdue. Its business is T-quarterbacking and its product is passing yardage by the gross. The profits are various major college championships in total offense and passing departments.

The way it looks now, in the weekly audit released by the

NCAA Service Bureau, Mr. Shaw has the total offense and Mr. Larson the pass completion and completion percentage categories wrapped up. And Mr. Dawson, a sophomore partner, is shooting for the touchdown-pass and pass yardage honors.

Larson Guns For Title
However, Mr. Larson is going to make a serious effort to get that total offense title away from Mr. Shaw, since only twice before has a total offense leader been able to hang on to his crown for a second year. Bob Fenimore of Oklahoma A & M did it in 1944-45 and Johnny Bright of Drake in 1949-50.

The actual figures in the case go like this: In total offense, Shaw has 1,415 yards, Larson 1,375, Dawson 1,309. In pass completions, Larson has 111, Shaw 86, Dawson 81. In passing yardage, Dawson has 1,400, Larson 1,387, Shaw 1,233. Dawson has thrown 14 touchdown passes to 10 for Army's Pete Vann and Boston University's Tom Gastall, and Larson, who has thrown 173 times, has completed 64.2 per cent of his efforts.

Webfoot Harrier Crew Favorite

Portland — (U.P.) — The powerful University of Oregon cross-country team is favored to win the Oregon intercollegiate meet over the University of Portland three-mile course tomorrow afternoon.

Leading the Ducks is Bill Dellinger, NCAA mile champion, and Ken Reiser, who won the meet last year in 15 minutes and 40 seconds.

The six other schools entered in the meet include Oregon State, University of Portland, Reed College, Portland State College, Pacific University and Clark Junior College. Some 30 harriers are expected to compete.

Shaw, Larson, Vie To Gun In PCC Total Offense Race

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Oregon's George Shaw and California's Paul Larson battle to the final gun Saturday for total offense honors in the Pacific Coast Conference, according to figures released today by the PCC commissioner's office.

Shaw and Larson are but 40 yards apart in their total offense duel, with Shaw on top with 1415 yards to Larson's 1375.

At the same time, a four-way struggle will be underway for the individual scoring leadership. Four men are within six points of each other and three of them will appear in one game Saturday.

Leading the pack is Bob Davenport, UCLA, with 10 touchdowns and 60 points. Second is Southern California's Jon Arnett with 55 points and nine touchdowns and one conversion, while UCLA's Primo Villanueva and Oregon's Dick James each have 54 points.

Conference leader in rushing is Stanford's Bill Tar with 669 yards to 596 for California's Jerry Drew, who rolled up a spectacular 283 yards last Saturday.

Larson has passing honors all to himself with 111 completions to 86 for second-ranked Shaw. Larson has a 64.2 per cent completion mark which puts him in a good position to break the conference and NCAA season record of 60.9 per cent by Washington's Don Heinrich in 1950.

Top pass receiver is California's Jim Hanifan with 39 catches good for 510 yards and six touchdowns. Leading in interceptions is Bob Iverson, Washington State with five.

Beaver Seniors Eye Clean Record Against Oregon
