

# Willie Mays' Salary Upped To \$25,000

New York — (U.P.) — Willie Mays' salary was rocketed to \$25,000 today as the New York Giants patterned their young super star's pay increases after the great Joe DiMaggio.

The 23-year-old Mays' new contract duplicated the \$25,000 pact which DiMaggio received from the New York Yankees in his third year and which served as a springboard toward making him the highest paid player in the game. Manager Leo Durocher has said publicly and the Giant officials have predicted privately that Wondrus Willie some day will match DiMaggio's \$100,000 pacts.

"Willie obviously is going to become one of the game's all-time great stars if he keeps his health so he'll be getting raises from now on," said club President Horace Stoneham in announcing the signing. At the same time Stoneham announced the signing of 17-game winner Ruben Gomez for an estimated \$12,000. Both were signed recently in Santurce, Puerto Rico, where they are playing winter ball.

## Joe Earned \$704,769.71

DiMaggio, who earned \$704,769.71 in 13 seasons with the Yankees, received \$8,000 as a rookie in 1936 and was raised to \$15,000 in 1937. Following a spectacular campaign in which he hit 46 homers and batted .346 DiMaggio was jumped to \$25,000.

DiMaggio was raised to \$27,500 in his fourth year and drew \$5,000-a-year increases until his salary reached \$43,750 in 1942. In 1948 it went to \$70,000 and then to \$100,000 for 1949-50.

Mays, whom the Giants regard as the "new DiMaggio," got \$6,000 as a rookie and made \$12,000 last season.

## COUGARS SHOULD RECOVER

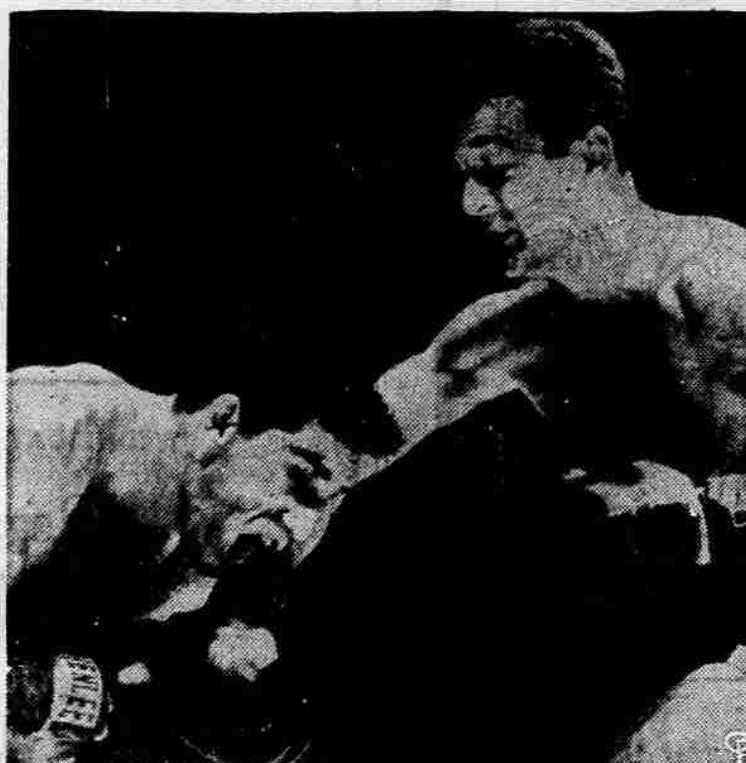

# Paul Younger Presses for Pro Honors

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — Paul Younger of the Los Angeles Rams, who finished 17th among the National Football League ball carriers last year, waged a close battle with Joe Perry of San Francisco, the defending champion, for leadership in ground gaining at the end of the first eight weeks of the season, official statistics showed today.

Perry set the pace with 656 yards in 98 attempts for an average gain of 6.7 yards per try. Younger followed closely with 610 yards on 91 attempts for the same average. Hugh McElhenny, Perry's injured teammate, was third with 515 yards, followed by John Johnson, another Forty-Niner with 428 and Eddie Price of the New York Giants with 426.

Norm Van Brocklin of Los Angeles had one of his worst games in years last week but continued to lead the league's passers with an average of 10.33 yards per attempt, completing 97 of his 176 heaves for 1,818 yards and nine touchdowns.

## Layne Second Passer

Bobby Layne of Detroit leaped from fourth to second place among the passers with 70 completions on 128 attempts for 1,049 yards, eight touchdowns and an 8.2 average. Bobby Thomson of Philadelphia dropped from second to a tie for third with Tom Dublinski of Detroit, each with an 8.12 average. Jack Scarbath of Washington was fifth with an 8.02 average and Otto Graham of Cleveland was sixth with 7.91.

Billy Wilson of San Francisco continued to lead with pass receivers with 42 snares. Pete Pihos of Philadelphia advanced from fourth to second with 39 catches. Bob Boyd of Los Angeles was third with 37.

Doak Walker of Detroit, scoring 18 points last week, came within nine points of the pace-setting Bobby Watson of Philadelphia in scoring. Walston had 87 points and Walker 78. Ben Agajanian of the Giants was third with 55.

## Van Top Punter

Van Brocklin continued to lead the punters with a 44.8 average followed by Pat Brady of Pittsburgh with a 43.9 average and Tom Laundry of New York with 43.5.

Veryl Switzer of Green Bay ousted Jack Christianson of Detroit as the leader in punt returns with an average of 12.3 on 21 returns. Christianson had a 10.8 average and Ollie Matson of the Chicago Cards was third with 10.6.

Bill Bowman of Detroit led in kickoff returns with a 33.8 average followed by Bill Reynolds of Cleveland with 31.3 and Billy Tidwell of San Francisco with 30.6. Paul Cameron of Pittsburgh had the most pass interceptions — six — with eight others tied for second with five each.
