Democratic Leaders Outline Legislative Program for Congress

Washington — (U.P.) — Democratic leaders outlined a legislative program for the new congress today with emphasis on a stronger defense and a faster economy.

In an apparent move to grab the political initiative from President Eisenhower, the Democrats who will control the 84th Congress, laid down their proposals for the new session without waiting to hear his.

Rep. Carl Vinson (D-Ga.), chairman-designate of the House Armed Services committee, announced he will sponsor legislation to:

More Shipbuilding

1. Step up the naval shipbuilding program, with emphasis on carriers, destroyers, submarines and expanded development of atomic power plants.

2. Extend the draft law two years and put teeth for the first time in the requirement that servicemen take an active part in the reserves after discharge.

3. Speed up expansion of the Air Force.

4. Raise military pay, and

Dixon-Yates Pact May Prevent Quick Approval of Pair

Washington — (U.P.) — The controversial Dixon-Yates power contract threatened today to prevent quick Senate confirmation for two of President Eisenhower's nominees to the Atomic Energy Commission.

The nominations came before Senate members of Congressional Atomic Energy Committee with the Democratic leadership pledged to fight confirmation of "controversial" nominees. Republican leaders have agreed that the Senate should bypass any nominations which produce major fights at the current special Senate session.

To Be Questioned
Democratic critics of the power contract said they will ask both prospective commissioners what they think of the Dixon-Yates arrangement and how they would feel about similar deals. The critics were ready to question:

1. W. F. Libby, a Chicago University nuclear physicist credited with developing the "carbon-14 clock" for dating archeological finds. Currently serving on the AEC under a recess appointment, Libby indicated his approval of the final version of the Dixon-Yates contract.

2. John Von Neumann, a physicist and mathematician who helped develop electronic computers used in atomic research. Von Neumann, who has not yet been sworn in as an AEC member, has not expressed an opinion on the Dixon-Yates contract.

Controversial Matter
Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-N.M.), prospective chairman of the Congressional Atomic Energy Committee in the new Congress, said he would question both nominees on the Dixon-Yates matter. Asked whether the nominations might be classed as controversial, Anderson said, "There is nothing very much more controversial than the AEC at the moment."

Elgin, Ore. — (U.P.) — Orville Simmons, 26, of Milton-Freewater, Ore., walked out of the Blue mountains about six miles north of here late yesterday while a large-scale search was underway 20 miles away.

Simmons became lost Sunday while elk hunting. When he came out, he said he had no idea how far he had walked in rain and snow that soaked him to the skin. Simmons went into the rugged mountains in the Tollgate area, about 20 miles from here.

He said he had a fire every night, and although he was wet most of the time, he was not too uncomfortable. He had a candy bar and a snowshoe rabbit that he shot for nourishment.

Hunt Resumes for Boy Believed Drowned

Madras, Ore. — (U.P.) — Search Warm Springs Indian boy who is was resumed today for the body of James Polk, 2½-year-old believed to have drowned in a creek Tuesday afternoon.

The boy's four-year-old sister, Melinda, said he fell into the creek and was swept downstream. The children were sliding down a sandy bank on a piece of cardboard.

The boy is the son of Mrs. Evelyn Polk. His father was one of four Indians drowned at Celilo falls on May 24, 1952.

Barrymore Buried With Service Which He Planned Himself

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Lionel Barrymore music composition, James Doane, his business manager, and William Ball, who used to drive Barrymore and his wheelchair around town.

The last rites were planned according to Barrymore's wishes, with the details of a scenario. He selected the crypt at the Catholic cemetery 18 years ago when his wife died. He requested that his casket remain closed so "my friends will remember me as they last saw me." He asked that no rosary be said, but only the hour-long high requiem mass.

The Rev. J. J. Hurley conducted the Catholic service while a quartet sang the high requiem mass.

Among the 48 honorary pallbearers were such renowned names of show business as pioneer actor Francis X. Bushman, Mickey Rooney, Red Skelton, Eddie Rochester Anderson, director Frank Capra and Robert Taylor.

Ethel Grief Stricken
Barrymore's sister, Ethel, was still grief-stricken and was ordered by her doctor not to attend the funeral.

The varied group of pallbearers also included Lew Ayres, with whom Barrymore starred in the "Dr. Kildare" series, and Henry Kevring, a policeman who has been guarding the east gate at Barrymore's studio, MGM, for 27 years.

On the list of active pallbearers was not one celebrated name, but old friends of the actor: Webb Overlander and Stanley Campbell, his make-up men; George Trembley, who taught

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No Eulogy
The Rev. Hurley, of Barrymore's neighborhood church, said the Catholic service did not allow for the inclusion of a eulogy on the renowned actor.

Also named as honorary pallbearers were Clark Gable, Spencer Tracy, Bob Hope and Bing Crosby. But they were out of town and unable to attend.

Barrymore, dressed in a navy blue suit and holding a rosary, lay in a rose-colored bronze casket surrounded by candles and flowers.

Back Stairs: Duck Hunting Task

Washington — (U.P.) — Back stairs at the White House:

President Eisenhower's duck-hunting expedition in Ohio last week presented the Secret Service with a new kind of problem: How to maintain a constant guard over his safety without warning the game?

The fact that the President bagged the daily four-bird limit in half an hour attests to the success of their job.

Even in a small flat-bottomed boat shared only by a guide and a dog, the President was fully protected at all times.

When Mr. Eisenhower set out from the docks of the Cedar Point Club in the chill grey dawn, two boatloads of Secret Service men did likewise. When he took up his position hidden in the tall reeds along the Lake hand.

They weren't close enough to interfere with the sport. But they were close enough to head off any one who might have penetrated the swamps and attempted to approach the President, for sinister or any other purpose. Before the President took to his boat, the Secret Service had made a detailed "security" check of the region, cruising the area by small boat and charting the waterways through the reeds.

Although the Secret Service men didn't shoot any ducks, it's a good bet they could have done as well as Mr. Eisenhower. For every one of them is a crack shot with almost any weapon you could name.

Before qualifying for the White House details they have

Erie shore, they also were on to demonstrate top shooting ability. Once on the job, they must practice regularly. Their test includes shooting a pistol with either hand, from a standing or moving position and at a stationary or moving target.

The proficiency with weapons is merely precautionary. They

are not trigger happy. They'd just as soon they never have to use their weapons to protect the President's safety. They prefer to do it by advance planning and eliminating any danger before it reaches the shooting stage. The weapons are there, though, in the event that someone is foolish enough to offer a real threat to the President's safety.

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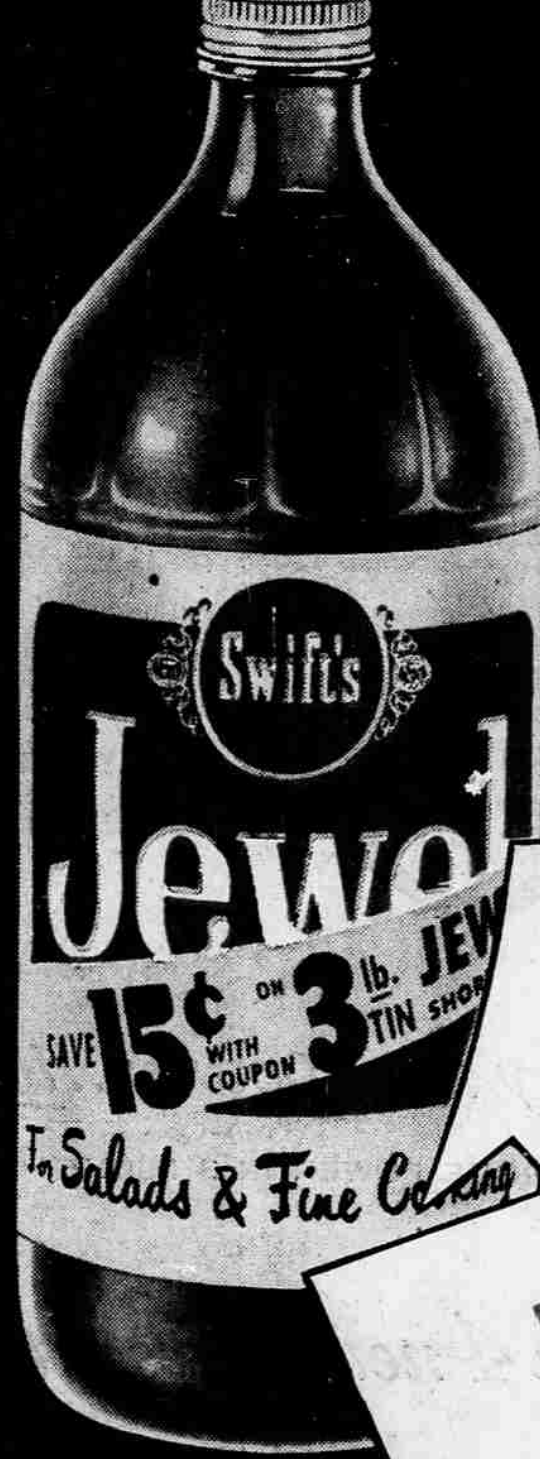
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
