Pillow Imprint Testimony Resumes

Cleveland—(U.P.)—In a stormy courtroom scene, Coroner Samuel R. Gerber today firmly rejected the Sheppard defense contention that an imprint in blood on slain Marilyn Sheppard's pillow was an "ink blot effect" caused by a fold in the pillow.

Gerber stuck to his guns in a shouting, accusing cross-examination session with William J. Corrigan, master strategist of Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard's defense staff. The coroner maintains that the imprint was made by a "two-bladed surgical instrument."

Dr. Sheppard, 30, an osteopath and brain surgeon, is on trial for his life in Common Pleas Court. The state accuses him of bludgeoning his wife to death last July 4 after a quarrel about his intentions to a freckle-faced technician, Susan Hayes, and other women.

Even the defendant got into the act which had as its star attraction the blood-stained pillow case taken from the murder bed. At a mid-morning recess, Dr. Sheppard, pale and solemn, dumped ink on a piece of paper, folded it, and then opened it, showing that that would produce two identical images. The imprint on the pillow shows what Dr. Gerber has described as two blades of an instrument.

"If you throw a pair of shears on a pillow it will smooth out the material," Dr. Sheppard told the crowd of reporters near the clerk's desk in the courtroom. "It will not press it together."
