

## Church Youth Club Members To Attend Nazarene Services

About 44 members of five boys and girls clubs of the local Nazarene church will attend revival services there in a group Thursday, Nov. 18, at 7:30 p.m.

The Rev. Paul Martin is conducting the daily evangelistic meetings through Nov. 28, at 7:30 p.m. The evangelist, who is from Oakland, Calif., has traveled the most of the United States and Canada during the past few years speaking to youth groups in summer camps, college campuses and in church campaigns.

The Jackson County Public Health association has listed recent articles and publications on retarded children in connection with the observance of national Retarded Children's week, Nov. 14 to 23.

Mrs. Robert Minear, general chairman for study groups of parents of retarded children in Jackson county, said two articles presented in the Oct. 18 and 25 editions of Life for this year are outstanding.

The nationwide effort to help retarded children by parents who have banded together in the National Association for Retarded Children is pictured in the first of the two Life articles.

Open discussion of cases receiving care in public institutions, clinical help and home care is presented. A "master plan" used by one community to help such families is explained.

volves signs of retardation, and an assigned foster parent who will supervise the child's progress and be responsible for him in case the parents are unable to. The plan has three main branches, social, medical and educational. The social services offer counselors, case workers, and a lawyer to advise parents.

### Services Offered

The medical services include a clinic for diagnosis and treatment. The educational services, besides regular teachers, offer a recreational leader and a scoutmaster who heads a scout troop of retarded boys. Speech therapy and religious and vocational instruction are also provided.

Jackson county, parents of retarded children have formed groups to work out their own problems. These groups are represented on the governor's advisory committee, formed by state Education Superintendent Rex Putnam to consider legislation relative to education for the retarded child, by Riley Cook, sales manager of Elk Lumber company.

### Better Life

In the Oct. 25 edition of Life, a better life for the retarded child is considered. A new approach to their training and education, with plans aimed at helping them to become self-sufficient and productive so that they can return to the

world and useful lives, is presented, and model training institutions that make this situation possible are studied.

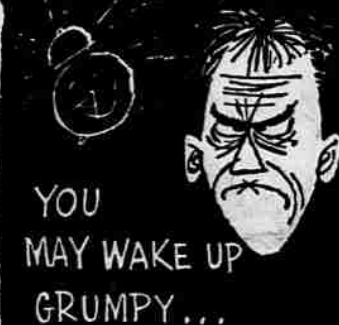
