Final Pushes For Offense Honors Set

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Two hectic stretch drives for a pair of national offensive titles reach a climax on Saturday at Berkeley when California and Stanford tangle in the 57th "Big Game."

Quarterback Paul Larson of the Bears goes into the fray trailing Oregon's George Shaw by 40 yards for total offense honors while California's Jim Hanifan leads John Stewart of Stanford 39-36 for the most pass receptions by the nation's big college players.

Just to keep the pot bubbling, Jim Carmichael of the Bears is tied for third place in receiving with Jerry Mertens, whose Drake team closed out its schedule last Saturday. Both men have grabbed 28 passes.

Shaw, who plays against futile Oregon State this week end, hoisted his over all total to 1415 yards last week in the Washington State game while Larson zoomed up to 1375 for the year against Oregon State.

Both clubs are washed up in the Pacific Coast Conference race but it remains a crucial game for alumni and coaches alike.

The series now stands at 23-23 with each team holding (4-5) marks for the season and trying to wind up with a .500 record.

Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf of California is closing the worst season he has had since he replaced Frank Wickhorst as head man in 1947. Some of the alumni are said to be getting restive even if the Bears lost tough ones to the likes of UCLA, Ohio State and Oklahoma this year.

This shapes up as Taylor's grimmest season since the erstwhile guard of Clark Shaughnessy's "Wow Boys" took over as Stanford coach in 1951. Taylor rolled into the Rose Bowl that season, was 5-5 in 1952 and now is 4-5 heading into the Berkeley tilt. And one of those losses involved that horrendous 72-0 stampede by UCLA.

Waldorf never has dropped a "Big Game," although his charges were tied 7-7 in 1950 and 21-21 last year in what is generally hailed as the greatest of all the transbay contests.

Detroit Picked As Possible Site For Olympics

Chicago — (U.P.) — Detroit was safely over the first hurdle today in the race among world cities to play host to the 1960 Olympic games.

The Motor City was nominated as this nation's choice for the summer games Wednesday by a selection jury of the United States Olympic committee after it heard summer game bids from representatives of four other American cities.

Final approval of Detroit as the scene of the 1960 Olympiad now is in the hands of the United States Olympic association whose membership will be polled in a mail vote.

Four Other Bids — If Detroit receives such approval its representatives will automatically be invited to Paris to attend the June 14-17 meeting of the International Site Award Committee.

The selection jury recommended Detroit for 1960 after listening to other bids from Chicago, Los Angeles, Philadelphia and Minneapolis.

The jury members delayed a decision on the 1960 winter games site after hearing representatives from Colorado, Lake Placid, N.Y., and Sun Valley, Idaho.

Boudreau's Job Tough

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — Lou Boudreau, newly hired field manager of the Kansas City Athletics, today held one of baseball's toughest jobs — that of making the former Philadelphia club a strong pennant contender.

The work cut out for him is hard, but the pay is good. Arnold Johnson, owner of the A's, did not disclose salary terms when Boudreau, 37, signed a two-year contract Wednesday. But he indicated the pay would be close to \$100,000.

He said Boudreau, who managed the Cleveland Indians and Boston Red Sox, "has always been one of the highest paid managers in baseball, and he isn't taking any step down by coming here."

Asked about the Philadelphia team's play last season, he said he thought the A's could do better.

"We want that extra effort," he told newsmen. "I want to win, but we all know what a tremendous job we have here."

COUGARS DEFEND

Pullman, Wash. — (U.P.) — The Washington State Cougars went through a light pass defense workout yesterday, devising plans to stop Washington university quarterback Bob Cox in the season's final game here Saturday.

Coach Al Kircher said he will rely mostly on line charges to stop the Huskies' aerial attack. He said scouts have told him the University of Southern California stopped Washington's passing with a four man line, permitting more men to fill in weak secondary positions.

BRUINS SHARP

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The top-ranking UCLA Bruins, working against Southern California pass formations, were declared "razor sharp" today by their field general, Henry Red Sanders.

In yesterday's workout, the

varsity allowed Ronnie Knox to complete but one throw out of six, intercepting three of his passes. The Bruins also went through all their formations to halt Southern Cal's plays from both the single-wing and T-formation.

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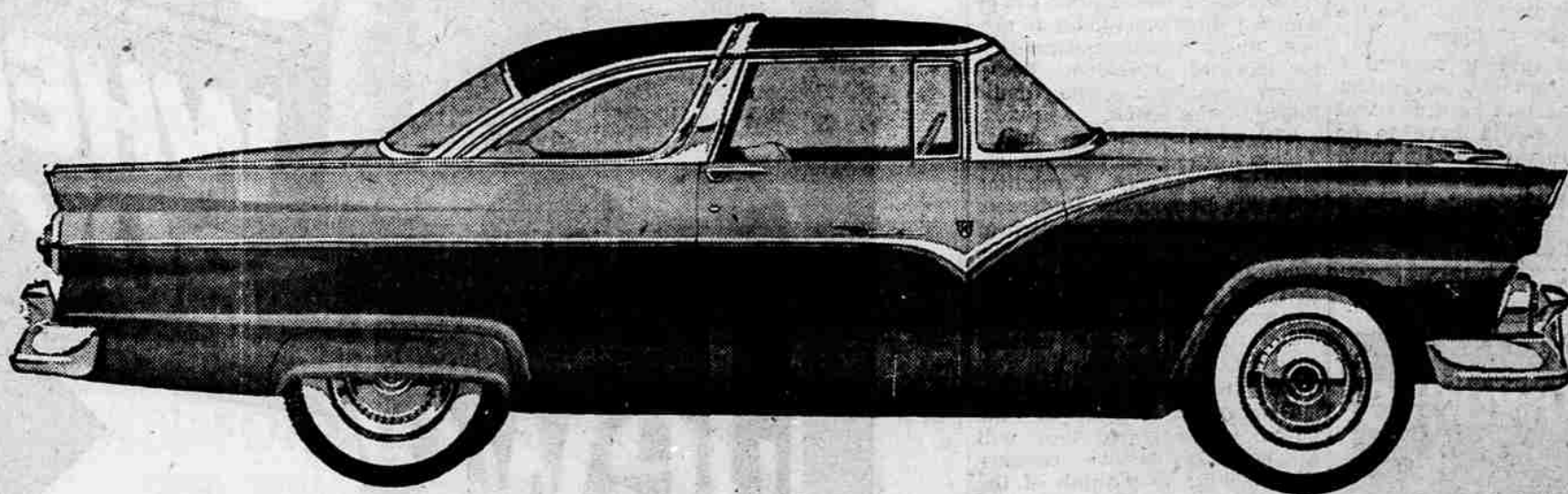
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
