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Yankees Got Best in Deal With Orioles

Joe Cronin said it very emphatically, and the majority of other top baseball executives agreed with him in more guarded language—the Yankees got the better of the Orioles in history's biggest baseball swap.

"They must have hypnotized Baltimore to pry Bob Turley loose," said Cronin, general manager of the Boston Red Sox.

There were several executives—notably the suitably modest Casey Stengel, manager of the Yankees—who expressed the belief that the Orioles had improved their own club by the 16-player deal that involved an estimated million dollars' worth of baseball talent.

But most agreed pretty much with Cronin's opinion that the Yankees "got just what they wanted," and the Orioles didn't get much help.

Turley Key Man
"I think that Turley is the key man in the deal," said Cronin.

General Manager Frank Lane of Chicago White Sox said he thought the trade would make the Yankees "much tougher to beat next year."

In his home at Glendale, Calif., Stengel didn't want to talk about the effect of the trade on his club, but freely predicted that the deal gave the Orioles "a great opportunity to be in fourth place."

"This deal is three-mendous for Baltimore," declared Casey. "I regret losing the ballplayers who helped me win championships. I mean Woodling and McDonald. All the players the Orioles got are capable of playing regularly on any American League club."

The league's Board of Directors accepted Rowland's resignation yesterday "with regrets."

Rowland's resignation was hinted several weeks ago when Wrigley said in Chicago that the veteran baseball executive would always be welcome back in the Cubs' organization which he left to assume the Coast League presidency.

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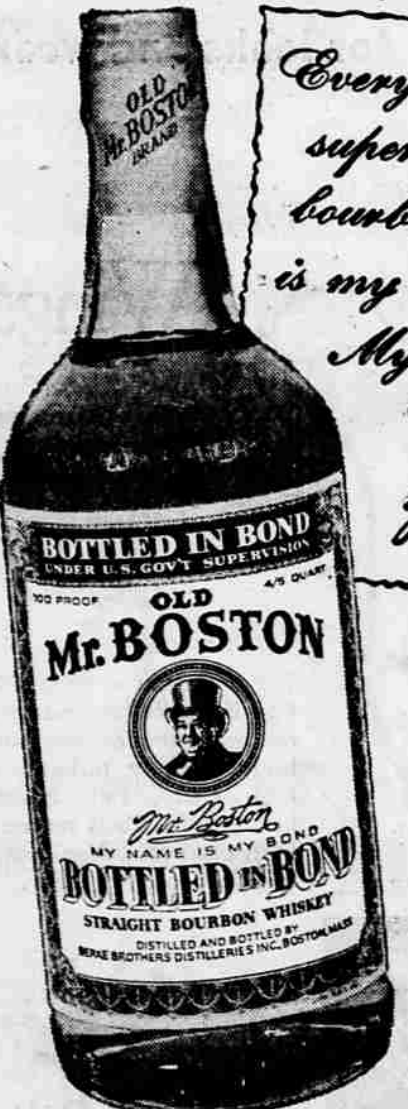
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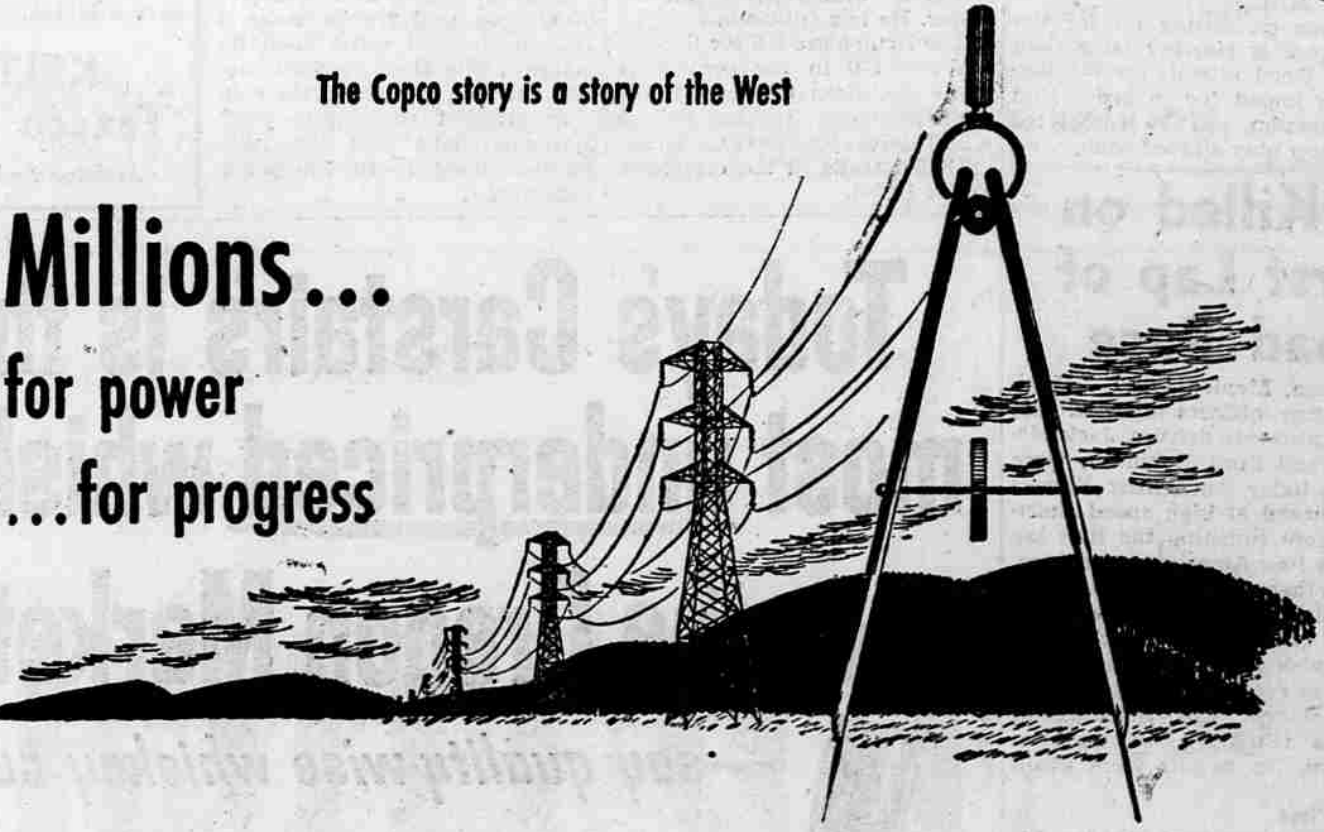
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
