

Unitarian Group Completes Year; Announce Meeting

Ashland—The Unitarian fellowship of Ashland recently completed its first year. The fellowship was organized by a group of Ashland residents who felt there was a need in this area for a church of liberal religion. It is affiliated with the American Unitarian association whose headquarters are in Boston, and the Pacific Coast Unitarian council with offices in Berkeley.

Over 400 Years

Although the Unitarian movement had its beginning more than 400 years ago, it is not as well known as most other denominations, except perhaps in the New England states. However, many famous American leaders, such as Thomas Jefferson, Ralph Waldo Emerson and Susan B. Anthony, were Unitarians.

One of 137

The local fellowship is one of 137 similar organizations which have been formed throughout the United States since 1948 in communities where the membership is not large enough to support its own church.

Free Discussion

The local unit meets on the first and third Sundays of each month in the homes of members in Ashland and Medford. Programs usually consist of free discussion of controversial religious and social problems or the reading of sermons.

The next meeting will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Hansen, 525 B street, Ashland, at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 21. The program will have a Thanksgiving theme and the sermon "American Faith and Destiny" will be read. All meetings are open to anyone interested.

Presbyterians Seek Moderator

Portland—(U.P.)—Members of the Portland Presbytery today launched a move to elect Dr. Paul S. Wright, pastor of Portland's First Presbyterian church, as national moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States.

The assembly will meet in Los Angeles in May. Normally, at least two prominent ministers are supported as candidates for the position as moderator, the highest elective office in the denomination.

Dr. Wright, who came to Portland in 1941 from Oklahoma City, was out of the state and not available for comment when his candidacy was proposed at a session of the Portland presbytery. It was offered by Dr. Leonard Odiorne of Westminster Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Wright's congregation is 12th largest in the denomination, with 3300 members. No Northwest pastor has been elected moderator since 1912. The post requires an annual visit to Presbyterian churches and speaking engagements in all of the 37 synods, as well as many of the 237 presbyteries.

Senatorial Campaign Cost Figured \$241,000

Portland—(U.P.)—An estimated \$241,000 was spent on the U. S. senatorial campaign in Oregon, according to the Oregonian today.

The newspaper said it arrived at "a close estimate" of the total spent by both candidates after assessing the returns filed with the State Elections Bureau in Salem.

According to the Oregonian's figures, Sen. Guy Cordon, who was defeated for reelection, spent \$138,000, while Democrat Richard L. Neuberger spent \$103,000 in his successful campaign. This amounts to a little less than 50 cents per voter who cast a ballot in the recent election.
