London — (U.P.) — The Duke of Edinburgh is a thoughtful husband. He never forgets anniversaries.

Tomorrow morning Philip will greet Queen Elizabeth II after breakfast with a handsome bouquet. For the day is the seventh anniversary of their wedding in historic Westminster Abbey. Philip never fails to mark the occasion appropriately. When he orders flowers for his dark-haired wife, he tells the florist "there must be plenty of white carnations."

White carnations are the British Queen's favorite flower. Prince Philip sent her a small cluster of them on the morning of their wedding, a private token before they met at the Abbey altar.

Philip, if he follows his usual procedure, also will give Elizabeth some jewelry, probably a brooch which is one of her favorite accessories. Unlike many a man, the Duke will have shopped for it personally. He always visits the court jeweler at least once to explain what he wants. He's been known to carry a sketch of what he has in mind.

The Queen and her husband probably will observe their seventh wedding anniversary quietly. It comes this year on a Saturday night — not a night when royalty is in the habit of "doing the town."
