

Ducks End Long Drought, 33-14; Shaw Gets 1,536 Total for Title

Corvallis—(U.P.)—George Shaw, Oregon's All-American quarterback candidate, wound up a brilliant college football career Saturday with three touchdowns passes as the Webfoots ended a five-year Oregon State victory string, 33-14, in the 58th renewal of their "Civil War" rivalry.

Shaw, mixing his plays beautifully, intercepted a pass that set up the first Oregon touchdown after Oregon State had taken a sudden 7-0 lead. Oregon then blazed to two more scores before the first half ended to go convincingly in front.

Shaw ended up with 121 net yards Saturday, giving him a total for the season of 1536 and the national yardage gained title over Paul Larson of California.

Two of Shaw's touchdowns

another pass and Shaw topped another drive with a scoring strike to James. The Webfoots went out ahead 33-7 in the second half on a 51-yard pass play from Shaw to James and a plunge by McGee before Oregon State mustered enough drive to push over a final touchdown.

Shaw, who played the entire

game, handed the ball off to reserve senior quarterback Don Holt on the final two plays rather than try to increase his yardage total.

Oregon State actually out first-downed Oregon, 17-14, but three Beaver fumbles and intercepted passes nullified many of them.

passes went to Halfback Dick James and the other to Halfback Lloyd Powell. Fullback Jasper McGee plunged to the other two Oregon touchdowns.

Oregon State scored on a pass from Jim Withrow to end Ediger in the opening minutes and again near the end of the game on a four-yard plunge by Dick Mason.

First for Cas

It was Oregon's 28th win in the long series but was the first time a Webfoot team coached by Len Casanova has beaten a Kip Taylor-coached Oregon State squad.

Oregon State started out as if it meant to make it six in a row. The Beavers moved downfield after the opening kickoff on a long pass from Withrow to Jack Patterson and scored on Withrow's 11-yard toss to Ediger.

Oregon was held until midway in the second period when the alert Shaw intercepted a Withrow pass and returned it 38 yards to the Oregon State 48. The Ducks moved downfield with McGee plunging over.

Another Strike

Moments later, after James recovered Peterson's fumble, Shaw hit Campbell with a strike on a play good for 50 yards and a touchdown. Oregon intercepted

Langlois to Fight Olson

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Pierre Langlois of France replaced Joey Giardello as champion Carl Bobo Olson's opponent in the scheduled Dec. 15 middleweight title fight here after the bout almost wound up in moth balls.

Langlois Friday cabled from France that he would meet Olson for the crown and the offer immediately was snapped up by the International Boxing Club and promoter Bennie Ford while manager Sid Flaherty added that "Bobo was ready to defend his title anywhere against anybody."

Ford scratched Giardello from the fight Friday when the promoter was informed by IBC President Jim Norris that the Philadelphia's left knee had started to stiffen up following a workout.

Some torn ligaments had been removed from the knee in October.

"Norris told me that a doctor has said Giardello's knee would be all right in two weeks but rather than risk losing the bout altogether I asked the IBC to get another fighter for Bobo," Ford said.

Marshfield, South Salem Get into Finals

It's Marshfield against South Salem and Vale against St. Helens for Oregon's two top high school football titles.

The powerful Golden Pirates from Coos Bay and the smooth Saxons from Salem won as expected in Friday night's class A-1 semifinal games. Both teams still are unbeaten, making this week's title game at Multnomah Stadium in Portland a natural.

South Salem, which was tied this season by Corvallis, racked up Beaverton 27-7 at Multnomah stadium Friday night before 6289 fans. Marshfield took a tough Lincoln team 20-7 before a crowd of 4,500 at Coos Bay.

Vale, the team which upended Prineville only a week ago, whacked Coquille 21-7 at Vale Friday night as Tony Arena passed to one touchdown, scored another and kicked three extra points. St. Helens crushed Dallas 38-0 at St. Helens in a game highlighted by a 68-yard punt return by the winners' Neil Kellogg.

Others Given

Site of the Vale-St. Helens A-2 title class will be announced early this week.

In class B 11-man action, Monroe won its way into the finals by downing Knappa 32-14 at Corvallis. Monroe will meet the winner of Saturday's Union-Moro game for the title this week.

Glide hosts Culver Saturday for the state six-man title. Marshfield stuck to the ground in its win over Lincoln.

The Pirates tried only two passes, neither of which was completed. Halfbacks Johnny Johnson, who ran for 192 of Marshfield's 303 rushing yards, and Danny Baker, who scored two touchdowns, were the Marshfield stars.

South Salem broke its game with Beaverton open in the third quarter with two touchdowns as quarterback Herb Juran smoothly guided the Saxons' T-formation attack.

Union, Ore.—(U.P.)—The Union High school Bobcats defeated Moro 14-6 here Saturday afternoon to earn a berth in the Oregon State Class B football finals.

The defending champion Bobcats scored both touchdowns in the second period on runs by Gene McKinney and Ronnie Dunham. Moro was scoreless until the final period.

Glide, Ore.—(U.P.)—The Glide warriors won the Oregon six-man high school football crown Saturday by defeating Culver 39-14.

The victory was the ninth straight this season for Glide under Coach Jack Forsythe. Gene Polley and Charlie Ferguson both scored twice for the victors, and Bob Gilbert and Dick Smith added single touchdowns.

Cal Stops Indians by Slim 28-20

Berkeley, Calif.—(U.P.)—California's Golden Bears exploded for three touchdowns in the second quarter and a 21-0 halftime lead, then hung on grimly through a tense second half for a 28-20 victory over Stanford in the 57th annual "Big Game" before 81,490.

With peerless Paul Larson performing with his usual brilliance in the air and new sensation Jerry Drew running wild, California had a 28-0 lead early in the third quarter.

But this is the "Big Game"—and the underdog Stanford team actually played over its head as it completely outplayed Cal during the last 17 minutes. With John Brodie taking care of the major aerial chores and Bill Tarr and Gordon Young running, the Indians made it the usual thriller as they scored three touchdowns in 15 minutes.

Roaring Climax

But the Bears finally eked out the win in a roaring climax to another great game that gave California the lead in the ancient series for the first time 24-23-10.

Larson had another great day in the air—passing for one touchdown and gaining 150 yards. But he lost 40 rushing yards for a net of only 110 for the afternoon, thus losing the National Yardage Gaining championship to Oregon's George Shaw.

Larson, a former halfback, set a national completion record for passes this year with 125 out of 195 for a 64.1 average—breaking the mark of 60.9.

The old mark was set by Don Heinrich of Washington.

California's Hanifan won the national pass receiving title as he caught five tosses this afternoon for a season's total of 44.

HARVARD VICTOR

Cambridge, Mass.—(U.P.)—A gallant Harvard team, battered and outplayed by the huge Yale line, rallied for two last period touchdowns Saturday to upset the favored Elis 13 to 9 in the 71st renewal of their Ivy league classic.

Two Uclans On Colliers All-America

Conway, Ark.—(U.P.)—UCLA and Oklahoma, with two players each, dominated Collier's All-America team which was released prematurely here last week.

A copy of the Dec. 10 issue of the magazine, scheduled for release Nov. 26, was mailed by mistake to a Conway hospital, and officials of Collier's permitted release of the teams.

UCLA, the nation's No. 1 team in United Press ratings, placed two men on the mythical team, Jack Ellena at tackle and Jim Salisbury at guard.

Oklahoma, the No. 3 rated team, placed Max Boydston at end and Kurt Burris at center. Other schools placing one player each were Army, LSU, Arkansas, Notre Dame, Rice, Ohio State and Wisconsin.

Idaho Tops BYU by 7-0

Boise—(U.P.)—A brutal University of Idaho line literally stopped the Brigham Young university Cougar in its tracks Saturday, then opened gaping holes for its own runners who plunged to a 7 to 0 football victory.

The game was played in crisp 50-degree weather before an estimated 10,000 fans.

It was the fourth straight win of the season for the Idaho Vandals of Moscow, who dropped the first five games they played this year. The last time Idaho won four games in a row was in 1923.

The final score in Saturday's game failed to show a true picture of the complete domination of play by Idaho. The Vandals chalked up 19 first downs and rambled to 311 yards by rushing, chiefly on the running of junior fullback Wilbur Gary and Bill Lawr, a senior right halfback.

Imbros Beats Out Karim

Albany, Calif.—(U.P.)—Andy Crevolin's Imbros beat out Karim and stablemate Determine, winner of the Kentucky Derby, Saturday to capture the \$10,000 Pacific Handicap at Golden Gate Fields.

Leading from flagfall to finish, Imbros scored a length and a quarter victory over Karim who beat Determine by five lengths. It was Determine's first start since July 3 after being laid up with a jaw infection.

Johnny Longden had Imbros out of the gate in a hurry along the inside, quickly opened up three lengths and had his mount pretty much in hand at the wire.

Time for the six panels for three-year-olds and up over a track labeled "slow" was a good 1:11 1/5. The Crevolin entry returned \$340 to win. Imbros packed high weight of 128 pounds in the field of six.

Hartwig New South Wales Tennis Champ

Sydney, Australia—(U.P.)—Rex Hartwig, bidding for one of Australia's two singles assignments in the forthcoming Davis Cup challenge round, won the New South Wales tennis championship Saturday by trimming Mervyn Rose, 6-3, 6-4, 8-6.

The crowd of 9,000 appeared disappointed with the caliber of play demonstrated by the finalists and Davis Cup selectors reserved judgment on their qualifications for helping defend the cup here Dec. 27-29.
