Ohio State Wins 21-7, Bowl Bound

Columbus, O. — (U.P.) — Ohio State came from behind to whip Michigan, 21-7, here Saturday to win the Big Ten title, a trip to the Rose Bowl and Complete its first unbeaten season in 10 years.

Arkansas Gets Cotton Bowl Bid

Shreveport, La. — (U.P.) — Arkansas, which was defeated 7-6 Saturday by Louisiana State, backed into a Cotton bowl berth in the final "big" Saturday of the college football season.

Nebraska Team In Orange Bowl

Norman, Okla. — (U.P.) — Nebraska was crushed 55 to 7 Saturday by Oklahoma but backed into an Orange bowl berth when Colorado downed Kansas State, the other Orange bowl aspirant from the Big Seven.

KC Blue Move Decision Due

Chicago — (U.P.) — The American Association will decide Tuesday or Wednesday whether the displaced Kansas City Blues move to Denver, Colo., or Omaha, Neb.

Both cities entered bids for a Class AAA franchise at a meeting of Association directors Friday.

The meeting broke up without reaching a decision, although AAA President Ed Doherty said "tremendous progress" was made.

Association members will be polled by telephone and Doherty will announce their decision next week, he said.

Ohio, completely outplayed by Michigan in the first half, caught fire late in the third period to stop Michigan six inches from the Buckeye goal line, and then launched two touchdown drives that insured the victory. The 82,483 howling fans yelled themselves hoarse and showered the field with paper.

Ohio State in winning its ninth straight game, was assured of the Rose Bowl bid to oppose Southern California in Pasadena Jan. 1. Big Ten athletic directors balloted last night on their choice of a "representative" team to represent the Western Conference and they traditionally pick the champion.

Titans Clash Not Possible

Norman, Okla. — (U.P.) — Oklahoma University President George L. Cross said Saturday he personally would like to see Oklahoma play an Olympic benefit football game with UCLA but such a match is "impossible."

Several Oklahoma players said they favor a bowl game, but they were unanimous in their feeling that Oklahoma should not flaunt the Big Seven rule against it.

Cross said waivers would have to be obtained from the NCAA, Orange Bowl and Big Seven for the proposed Dec. 4 Oklahoma-UCLA match to materialize.

Slade Purse Held After Fight Farce

New York — (U.P.) — Chairman Bob Christenberry of the New York State Athletic Commission declared Saturday, "Jimmy Slade not only gave a pathetic performance but he went down without being hit in the eighth round" of Friday night's fiasco with light heavyweight Floyd Patterson.

Slade's performance was so poor during the eight-round fight at Madison Square Garden that Christenberry ordered the New York heavyweight's purse of about \$5,370 held up until he makes an official explanation Monday.

The strangely sluggish and fragile Slade went to the canvas five times before losing a near-shutout decision to 19-year-old Patterson of Brooklyn, fifth-ranking light heavy contender. The first four knockdowns were caused by punches but the fifth resulted from an "invisible" blow in the opinion of some observers, including this writer.

During the lamentable presentation, the 3,325 fans voiced their derision with boos, catcalls and the good old "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" song. Fortunately the bout was limited to eight rounds because of Patterson's youth. One must be 20 to fight 10 rounds in New York.

Slade, the New York state heavyweight champion who had pared down to the light heavyweight limit of 175 pounds, according to the contract, said, "I don't know what was wrong with me. I just couldn't get going. No. I'm not thinking of retiring."

Hill Holds Race Lead

Mexico City — (U.P.) — Phil Hill of Santa Monica, Calif., clung to a slender 39-second lead in the Pan American road race Saturday after a breakneck duel with

Oaxaca, Mexico — (U.P.) — Ray Elliott of Portland, driving a Dodge, finished in sixth place in the first lap of the small stock car class of the Pan American Road Race Friday.

Russians Gain Rifle Honors

Caracas, Venezuela — (U.P.) — A. Bogdanov of Russia set a new world record of 396 points as he led his country to a sweep of the three top places in the .22-caliber rifle shooting, kneeling position, official placements revealed Saturday at the world shooting championships.

Vasily Borisov was second with 393 points and 19 bulls'eyes, and M. Itkis third with 393 points and nine bulls'eyes.

The Soviets also took an easy team victory, with a total of 1958. Sweden was second at 1943, and Norway third, also at 1943. Finland took fourth with 1920, and USA fifth at 1918.

Orioles Said Not Outfoxed

Washington — (U.P.) — At least one baseball critic—Tyrus Raymond Cobb—conceded Saturday that the Baltimore Orioles were not outfoxed by the New York Yankees in baseball's biggest player deal.

Cobb, one of the game's greatest players and a member of the Hall of Fame, said that the winner of the multi-player trade probably will be decided eventually by the lesser players thrown into the deal which up to Saturday involved nine men.

The Yankees procured pitchers Bob Turley and Don Larsen and shortstop Billy Hunter in exchange for pitchers Harry Byrd and Jim McDonald, catchers Gus Triandos and Hal Smith, shortstop Willie Miranda and outfielder Gene Woodling. Seven players have yet to be named to complete the deal.

Six Men Suspended Friday In New York's Boxing Row

New York — (U.P.) — Five or six more men are expected to lose their licenses next Tuesday at the New York State Athletic Commission's full-dress hearing of blacklisting and monopoly charges against the International Boxing Guild and its New York chapter.

Six were suspended Friday at the conclusion of the commission's informal inquiry into the charges. They were two matchmakers, two Guild officials and two members of the rival Metropolitan Boxing Alliance, which brought charges against the Guild.

They are suspended pending the outcome of Tuesday's hearing.

Season Tickets For Basketball On Sale Tuesday

Medford high school season reserve seat tickets for basketball will go on sale Tuesday at the high school office, it was announced yesterday.

There are only a limited number of the reserves. Drive to sell them will continue through December 6 and persons who had season tickets for the 1953-1954 hoop year have through that date to buy their same seats.

The reserve seat ticket is the only type of season ticket being sold for Medford home games. Also, no reserve seat tickets for single games will be sold. A person to reserve a seat at any time during the season must buy a full season ticket, it was said.

Medford's first home game is December 4 against Eureka, Calif.

"I expect the hearing to be completed by Tuesday night. And I would not be surprised if there were five or six more suspensions before we are finished with the witnesses who will appear at the hearing."

The six suspended Friday were: Promoter - matchmaker Tex Sullivan and assistant Angelo Pucci of the London Sporting Club, which stages Monday night TV fights at St. Nicholas Arena; Manager Bill Daly, treasurer of the International Guild; Manager Custer D'Amato, collector for the New York Guild; ident of the rival Metropolitan Manager Alvin Braverman, press Alliance, and Manager Lippy Breitbart, a member of the Alliance.

Sullivan and Pucci were suspended for dealing with unlicensed managers and for assisting the New York Guild in collecting "donations" of \$106 each from the managers of 19 fighters who had television bouts at St. Nick's.

Daly and D'Amato lost their licenses for collecting \$100 "donations" to the New York Guild from managers who were Guild members and from some who were not members.

Braverman was suspended because he admitted at Friday's inquiry he had been convicted twice on bookmaking charges, an offense that could result in permanent loss of his manager's license. He is the pilot of Bill Bossio and other fighters.

Breitbart, manager of heavyweight contender Tommy Hurricane Jackson, was suspended because he failed to answer a subpoena and testify at Friday's inquiry, after he had previously filed an affidavit against the Guild.

Bruins Roll Over USC 34-0, Gain PCC Title

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The nation's top-ranking UCLA Bruins explored for four touchdowns in the final period Saturday to defeat University of Southern California, 34 to 0, and captured their second straight Pacific Coast conference championship.

Playing before the nation's top football crowd of the season—102,548 fans jammed into Memorial Coliseum—UCLA had to get as hot as the unofficial field temperature of 110 degrees in the final period to run up their one-sided score after being held to a single touchdown for the periods.

Bruins Explode But when the Bruins did explode they racked up three touchdowns in six minutes to dumbfound the huge crowd which had seen Southern California put on a brilliant defensive exhibition even if it was unable to move through the powerful UCLA line.

Although ineligible to go to the Rose Bowl, UCLA demonstrated it deserved its top-ranking in the United Press Coaches' poll with its great defense and ability to catch fire when given

the slightest break. Primo Villanueva, closing out his career, was involved in three of the five touchdowns as he passed to two of them and made a key run that helped set up another.

Great Defense But it was UCLA's great defensive team bulwarked by all-American candidates — tackle Jack Ellena and guard Jim Salisbury—that would not break despite Southern California's valiant efforts, and brought on the debacle.

And statistically, five interceptions returned for 165 yards by UCLA were the key plays rather than their runs from scrimmage in breaking the backs of the Trojans. That mark set a new Pacific Coast conference record for interceptions returned in a single game.

Southern California's wingback Lindon Crow was the Trojans' steadiest player on both offense and defense, while in the line Orlando Ferrante, end Leon Clarke and tackle Ed Fouch were largely responsible for the defense UCLA could hardly dent for three periods.

Wrestling Clinic Here December 4

Twenty-one schools in southern and southwestern Oregon have been invited to participate in a wrestling clinic on Saturday, December 4, in the Medford senior high school.

Bill Hammer, University of Oregon grappling mentor, will conduct the clinic with the help of U of O team members. The daylong session will be open to all interested prep coaches and their squads or to other interested students. The day's program will get underway at 9 a. m. and conclude at 5 p. m.

Coaches who plan to attend the clinic have been asked to telephone or write to Paul Evensen, Medford wrestling coach, by November 29. From them they will receive a syllabus of instruction, a list of follow up games for wrestling and a complete wrestling bibliography.

Program Told The program will include a brief history of wrestling in Oregon, discuss of the sport's role in education, wrestling fundamentals and techniques, including the conditioning program,

mass drills, demonstrations by the Roseburg area, in Jackson and Josephine counties and at Klamath Falls.

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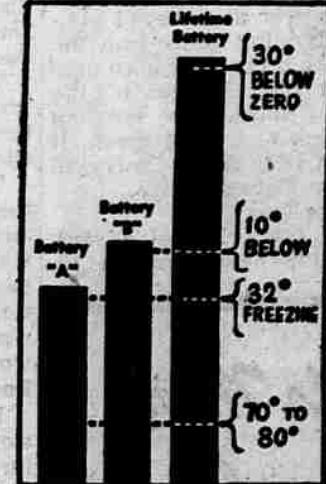
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
