Democrats Elect 97 Women To Legislatures, Record Set

Washington — (U.P.) — The Democratic National committee announced Saturday that 97 Democratic women were elected to State Legislatures on Nov. 2—a new record for the party.

Mrs. Katie Louchheim, the committee's director of women's activities, said unofficial reports from 47 states showed 88 Democratic women won seats in the lower houses and nine in the upper houses. Another 12 were elected to state-wide offices such as secretary of state, auditor, superintendent of schools, and the like. Nineteen are continuing in unexpired terms.

Congressional Record

Mrs. Louchheim pointed out that the nine Democratic women elected to the U. S. House of Representatives constitutes the

largest number of women ever elected to Congress by any political party.

She said she regards the steady gain as showing women's "increasing determination to obtain better government at all levels."

Democratic women who will have seats in the new Congress are Iris Blitch of Georgia, Grace Pfost of Idaho, Martha Griffiths of Michigan, Coyle Knutson of Minnesota, Leonora Sullivan of Missouri, Edna Kelly of New York, Edith Green of Oregon, Vera Buchanan of Pennsylvania and Elizabeth Kee of West Virginia.

Two women Democrats have the job of secretary of state—Mary Texas Hurt of Alabama and Natalie Buck of New Mexico. Pennsylvania's secretary of internal affairs is Genevieve Blatt. State auditors include Mrs. Jewell W. Jordan of Arizona and Agness Baggett of Alabama. Ruth Moon is state treasurer of Idaho.

Hostesses for the evening will be Mrs. Lew Thurman, Mrs. Ralph Cutshall and Mrs. John H. Eddy.

Evans Valley Club Has Demonstration; Party Announced

Evans Valley — Demonstrations on making Christmas decorations and corsages and talks on how to grow lilies and other gardening information were on the program of the November 17 meeting of the Evans Valley Garden club. The event was held at the home of Mrs. Charles Jackson and Mrs. Robert Wales served as cohostess.

Plans also were made for a Christmas party which will be held December 22 at 1 p.m., at the home of Mrs. Claire Douglas. This will be a potluck luncheon and table service will be required. Mrs. Vern Orr will assist the hostess and they will serve the dessert. A gift exchange also is planned for the meeting.

Mrs. Douglas spoke on how to grow lilies from scales during the recent meeting. She explained that first a flat should be filled with damp sand, then the outer scales should be placed in individual sections, convex side down on the sand. They should then be covered with two inches of peat moss. The moss may be pushed aside from time to time

to watch the growth of the bulb-lets. When roots grow then the bulb-lets should be planted in flats or pots of sandy, well drained soil. During the winter they should be protected and when they reach the flowering size, should be planted in a garden bed.

Mrs. Douglas also demonstrated how to make Christmas bells.

Mrs. Luke Bond showed how to make holiday corsages from cedar spray tips, wood fibre poinsettias, bells and colored ribbons.

Mrs. Charles Jackson mentioned the importance of drying geranium cutting for several days, in the hot sun if possible, before potting the cuttings.

Mrs. Carl Watson, a new guest in the valley, was a guest at the meeting and Mrs. Harold Wehren joined the club. Seven-teen members attended.

Mrs. John Goldt displayed a dried flower arrangement made up from materials she had gathered during the summer along roadsides, fields and creek

beds. The arrangement was sent on to Mrs. Sam Smith who is hospitalized in Medford.

The group is to meet December 9 at the home of Mrs. E. W. Shock at 10 a.m. to help with the making of a 20-foot garland for Camp White decorations.
