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Health Association Explains Permanent X-Ray Program Here

The tuberculosis situation in Jackson county and an explanation of the recently announced permanent chest x-ray centers in the county's two largest hospitals were given Thursday afternoon at a general meeting of Jackson County Public Health association.

Approximately 100 persons, including community health chairmen and leaders of organizations, attended the session, which also heralded the opening of the annual Christmas Seal sale November 22.

Mrs. Chester Guches, president of the association, presided and introduced members of the county health department who explained the county's TB problems. They were Dr. A. Erin Merkel, Miss Dorothy Huskey and Miss Dorothy Colard.

The panel emphasized the fact that an estimated 100 persons in the county have unknown tuberculosis, and that the permanent chest x-ray centers to be available in Community and Sacred Heart hospitals should result in greatly increased prevention and cure of the disease in the county.

Tuberculin skin testing, which began this month and which should test the entire school enrollment in the county within three years, was explained, as was the health department's laboratory facilities in relation to TB.

Mrs. Jack Walker, chairman of the association's case-finding program, told of the procedure planned to use to the fullest the two x-ray centers. She asked the group to begin informing their communities that chest x-rays will be available to the

public at Community hospital beginning December 1. Details will be announced by the health association prior to the first outpatient date.
