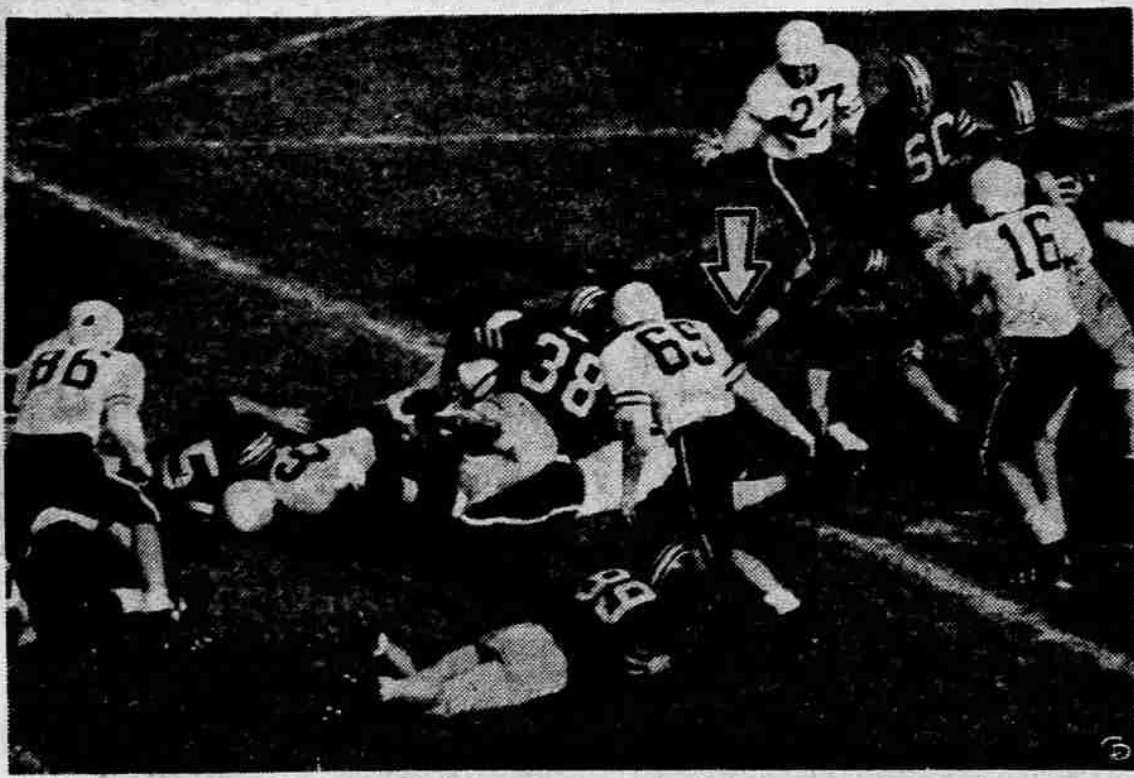

## U. Maglioli Goes Ahead In Road Race

Durango, Mexico.—(U.P.)—The "battle of Ferraris" roared on today in the Pan-American road race as Bill Hill of Santa Monica, Calif., and Italy's Umberto Maglioli continued their gruelling dash to the Texas border.

Maglioli held more than a six-minute lead over his California rivals in the unlimited sports car class as the reduced field set off on a 25-mile lap to Parral this morning. They faced another leg of 186 miles this afternoon that would carry them to within 224 miles of their objective.

The five-day race across Mexico will conclude tomorrow at Ciudad Juarez, across the border from El Paso, Tex.

**Good Margin**  
Maglioli trailed Hill by only 39 seconds as a field of 112 sports and stock cars started out from Mexico City yesterday. After two more laps, that weaved through 690 miles of Central Mexico, Italy's "driving mad-

man" was back in front by a comfortable margin.

As the drivers rested here last night it became obvious that, barring accidents, these two men in their Ferraris probably would carry their fight right to the U.S. border. Their closest rivals were more than an hour behind and steadily losing ground.

Maglioli covered the first 1,247 miles of the race in 12 hours, 23 minutes and 25 seconds.

### Browns Gain Eastern Lead; Rams, Lions Win

The Cleveland Browns are back in their old familiar place at the top of the National Football League's Eastern race and Coach Paul Brown says his bruisers are set to run their record string of division championships to nine.

Brown's team, climaxing a two-month climb, grabbed the Eastern lead Sunday for the first time this season by shutting out the Philadelphia Eagles, 6-0, in a game studded with sparkling defensive plays and flying fists. The Browns started the day a half-game behind New York and took first place by the same margin when the Los Angeles Rams edged the Giants, 17-16, in another roughie.

Then Brown, whose defensive unit has allowed its five rivals a total of 30 points, threw down his challenge to the Giants for Cleveland's invasion of the Polo Grounds next Sunday.

"Our players are winning all the games they need by themselves now," he said. "We don't need other teams to knock off the leaders any more."

While Cleveland knocked Philadelphia 1½ games off the pace in the East, the Detroit Lions posted a 21-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers and need only two more triumphs to clinch their third straight Western title. The Rams and San Francisco Forty-Niners, who scored a 31-3

Saturday night victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers, remain deadlocked two games behind Detroit. The Lions and Browns have four more games. The 10 other clubs have three apiece.

Ollie Matson did the finest running in Chicago Cardinal history, scoring four touchdowns in a 38-16 triumph over the Washington Redskins. The Chicago Bears, led by the passing and play-calling of rookie Zeke Bratkowski, scored a 28-13 decision over the Baltimore Colts in the other Sunday game.

Lou Groza's 10 and 31-yard field goals provided the points for Cleveland's 100th victory, but the Brownie defensive unit had to make a tremendous goal line stand to hold off the crippled but inspired Eagles. The Eagles had four chances to make a touchdown from the Cleveland one with 2½ minutes to play, but the Browns, aided by a five-yard penalty Philadelphia drew for delaying the game, held to the delight of 41,531 Cleveland fans.

**Same Story**  
The score was bigger but the story was the same at Green Bay. Bobby Layne's third period pass to end Dorne Dibble gave the Lions their victory points. But it took a strong defense and a break to beat the stubborn Packers. Rookie end Max McGee dropped a pass from Tobin Rote in the end zone that would have put Green Bay ahead mid-

### Read, Meunier, Gemaehlich Unanimously Selected for Jackson B All-Star Crew

Halfbacks Stan Read and Laval Meunier, St. Mary's of Medford, and Center Bob Gemaehlich, Jacksonville, were unanimous choices for the 1934 Jackson County B League all-star football team.

A 13-man crew was selected by coaches and squads of the five rival schools. Champion St. Mary's and runner-up Rogue River high each place five men on the star team. Talent, Jacksonville and Prospect each got one berth.

Four ends and three tackles tied in the voting. Other positions had normal complements of players. However, Jack Herburger, Rogue River, was named to two positions, guard and back.

Norm Van Brocklin's 27-yard third period touchdown pass to Tom Fears and Les Richter's conversion enabled the Rams to edge the Giants after ex-Ram Ben Agajanian had kicked three second quarter field goals to give New York a 16-10 lead before 27,737 fans.

Matson ran 62, 79 and 15 yards for touchdowns and also scored on a five yard pass from Lamar McHan as the Cardinals beat Washington before 15,619 Chicago fans. Bratkowski scored once, pitched out to Billy Stone for one TD and passed to Stone for another before 23,093 at Baltimore. Y. A. Tittle threw two scoring passes to Bill Jessop as San Francisco won easily before 35,520 Pittsburgh fans.

Ends chosen, each with four votes were Bill Weaver and Cleto Daily, Rogue River, Bob Bobbett, St. Mary's, and Jim McAbee, Talent. Tackles picked, also with four votes apiece were Ken Oswald, Prospect; Truman Dres, Rogue River, and Joe Hasler, St. Mary's.

Del McKenzie, Rogue River, with six votes, joined teammate Herburger at guard. Herburger had three votes for his line spot. He got his backfield berth with four ballots. Choice of Jim Jones, St. Mary's, with four votes, gave the title-winning crusaders three slots in the all-star backfield.

Under the system of voting the coach and squad of each school each chose an all-opponent team. No coach or squad named his or its own players. That made a total vote of eight ballots possible for each post. That was the total Gemaehlich, Read and Meunier each received.

Herburger's double selection was an example of a number of cases of split voting. McAbee, in addition to his end votes, received three for the backfield where he played much of the time.
