Book Reviewed For Meeting of Butte Falls Club

Butte Falls — Mrs. E. J. Malloy reviewed the book, "Cream Hill" by Lewis Gannett at the last meeting of Butte Falls Garden club. Lewis Gannett and his wife live in New York when not at Cream Hill, a Connecticut hilltop which they bought 25 years ago and began to make livable for week end escapes from the city, only to find that his great-great-grandfather had been an earlier settler on the hill.

From his encounters and observations deepened by that personal link with the past, he has fashioned this wise and engaging country book, which contains lithographs by his artist wife. Any gardener will gain a feeling of companionship as well as more knowledge of gardening as he shares his experiences in this book, according to the reviewer.

Mrs. Robert Beeman brought out facts about conservation by the question and answer method. Forest fires and logging are extremely destructive to forests, it was said, and only by planned plantings in sufficient quantities can we hope to keep the balance sufficient for future needs. Everyone's cooperation is needed to "Keep Oregon Green."

Mrs. Frank Carson, in a short talk suggested the hardy cyclamen as an interesting new flower to try in local gardens. The hardy species are grown successfully in the northwest. They may be transplanted at any time of year that weather permits. Plants should be kept moderately moist all during the growing season. They do not appreciate dry conditions and even during their short dormant period in mid-summer enough moisture should be applied to keep the ground loose. Hardy cyclamen are very seldom bothered by diseases and pests, Mrs. Carson said.

Mrs. N. B. Stoddard, bird chairman, gave an interesting account of the whooping cranes. She said that in the past the spring and fall migrations brought forth these beautiful white birds in huge flocks that literally covered the skies. Measuring almost five feet in length and powered by a wing-spread of seven and one-half feet, they made, in their annual flights to and from the Arctic, one of the greatest natural spectacles in North America. But today only twenty-four lonely birds carry on the traditional flights.

In August 1952, two United States wildlife workers discovered the summer breeding grounds of the whooping crane in the marshes just north of Great Slave Lake in the province of Saskatchewan, Canada. The personal life of the whooping crane, however, remains largely a mystery, and wild life specialists and bird lovers are making a study of these birds in an effort to enable the birds to survive and multiply.
