In Olden Days
Mrs. Daly, whose husband John Jay Daly, incidentally, once was named father of the year, noted that our forefathers and fore great-great-great, etc., and fore-grandmothers used to spend days preparing the feast of Thanksgiving.

Today, Mary mentioned what we all know. All you have to do is to go to a super market and everything, including the turkey comes packaged and ready for a little heat underneath. The makings of the pie, mince or pumpkin, can be found in a can. Or if you like store-bought pies they are yours at the bakery counter.

Chestnut Dressing
"It's all too easy nowadays," Mary said. "But at our house we realize that the turkey is served at other times of the year, too. So we concentrate on what is left of the good old days—that chestnut dressing. Want to hear my recipe?"

I sure did and here it is:
"Just boil a pound or so of chestnuts, for about 15 minutes," Mrs. Daly said. "Then peel the skins off and while they are still hot, push them through a sieve

or colander. Add them to the dressing. You can make your own dressing — toasted bread broken up and mixed with celery and onions plus plenty of butter. Put in a bit of sage, celery, dried parsley, and a half-teaspoon of baking powder to keep the dressing light."

Magic Eye Replaces Eagle Eye Inspection

Milwaukee — (U.P.) — The Veterans Administration has come up with a "magic eye" in inspection of documents for irregularities.

The VA said the new electronic eye could easily spot scratch-outs, obliterations, erasures and the like in the documents relating to VA-administered benefits for veterans and their families.

Previously the VA depended on eye detection or a costly and time-consuming process of infrared photography, often with inconclusive results. The VA said that the new "eye" can immediately spot any irregularities whether in ink, pencil or typing.

Under the device, which looks like a television camera, tampered portions of papers stand out in strong contrast. If a signature has been changed, the original signature will stand out clearly.

The device, according to the VA, was adapted from the infrared "magic eye" used on world war II sniper rifles with built-in telescopes.

School Pupils Match Pictures for Bus

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — If pupils of the first three grades of the rural Rock Creek school can match pictures, they can catch the right school bus. It works like this:

Each pupil wears a big, shiny button upon which is a bright picture of a tiger or a dog or some other animal. Buses serving the district also bear the pictures. Match the two and you've got a bus that will take you home.

Saranac Lake, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Maj. James A. Call, an Air Force deserter, has confessed the murder of a policeman at Lake Placid in a furious gunbattle last August and will be arraigned on a charge of first degree murder, state police said Saturday.

Call confessed he killed Patrolman Richard Pelkey and wounded two others when he was surprised during a burglary and then walked about 300 miles through the rugged Adirondack mountains to escape one of the biggest manhunts in New York state's history.

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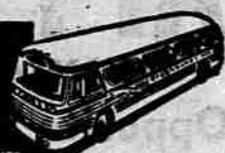
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
