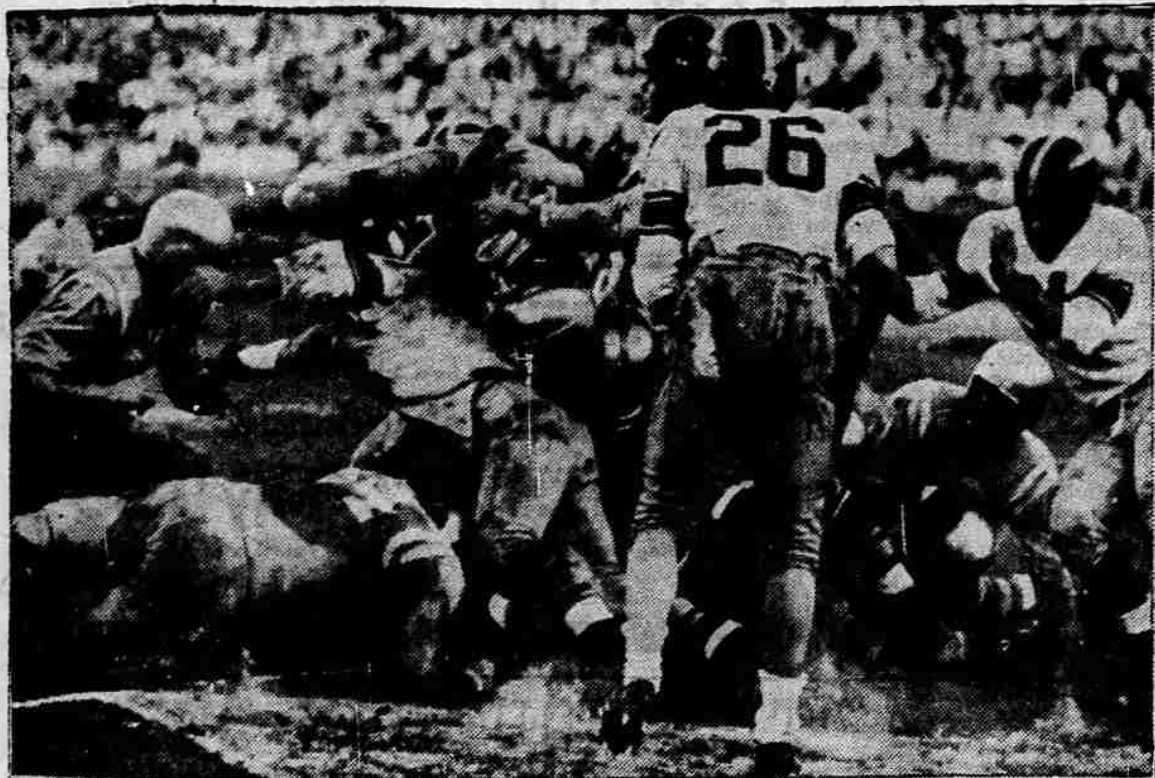

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Six Appear At Hearings

New York — (U.P.) — Six suspended men were slated to appear today at the New York State Athletic commission's hearing of "monopoly" evidence against the New York chapter of the International Boxing Guild.

Chairman Robert K. Christenberry of the commission said, "We hope to dispose of the six men today and conclude the hearing by nightfall, but that will by no means conclude our investigation of the Guild."

The suspended six are:
(a) Fight managers Bill Daly, International Guild treasurer, and Custer D'Amato, New York chapter treasurer and collector. They are accused of accepting "donations" from the manager of each fighter who got a television bout in the New York area in recent months.

(b) Promoter-matchmaker Tex Sullivan and assistant Angelo Pucci of the London Sporting club, which stages television fights on Monday nights. They are charged with dealing with non-licensed managers and with taking \$100 "donations" for the Guild off the checks of 19 TV fighters. Their plight could jeopardize the club's license.

(c) Al Braverman, president of the rival Metropolitan Boxing Alliance and Lippy Breidbart, an Alliance member. Both are fight managers. Braverman was suspended after admitting two convictions for bookmaking at last Friday's inquiry. Breidbart lost his license for failing to appear at Friday's inquiry and "back up" an affidavit he had filed against the Guild.

Billy Smith Gets 8th Win

New York — (U.P.) — Boardwalk Billy Smith of Atlantic City has "an excellent chance" of getting a February shot at the light heavyweight crown, according to Harry Markson, because of his eighth straight victory Monday night on a technical knockout over heavyweight Archie McBride.

Markson, managing director of the International Boxing club said today that 33-year-old Smith's remarkable comeback certainly earned him "top consideration" in negotiations for champion Archie Moore's next defense in February.

Smith, already No. 1 among the world's 175-pound contenders, stopped McBride of Trenton, N.J., at 2:58 of the ninth round at St. Nicholas arena after flooring him three times.

It was the fourth straight knockout and the seventh in his last eight starts for Smith, a jail guard who is managed by Sheriff Jerry Gormley at Atlantic City.

PCC Coaches Attack No Repeat Bowl Rule

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Pacific Coast conference football coaches and other officials today attacked the "no repeat" rule in the Rose Bowl regulations, but at the same time admitted there wasn't anything they could do about it.

The PCC and the Big Ten signed a pact last year in which three more years to run in which it is stated that no team can go to the Rose Bowl two years in a row.

Coach Jess Hill, who will lead his second-place Southern California Trojans into the bowl against Ohio State on New Year's day, said:
The "best team should be

playing in the Rose Bowl. UCLA is the best team on the coast this year — so the Bruins should be playing in the Rose Bowl."

Coach Red Sanders of UCLA agreed.

"I said before the season started and I repeat it," said Sanders, "that the best team should play in the Rose Bowl."

Not Up To Coaches
But the coaches have nothing to do with making the Rose Bowl rules — so there is little chance their wishes will be heeded.

The rules for the post-season game are set up by faculty representatives of the schools in the two conferences. These men usually are under orders from the college presidents.

The presidents in recent years have looked with arched eyebrows at the proportions of intercollegiate football and this is one of their means of forcing a slight de-emphasis on the game.

Actually, the "no repeat" rule was forced on the PCC by the Big Ten.

At the last meeting of faculty representatives, the Big Ten wanted to put in force a rule that a team could go to the bowl only once in three years. The Pacific Coast group wanted to retain the practice of sending the champion. After hours of deadlock, the compromise of one team every other year was reached.

Orange Bowl Too
The Rose Bowl won't be the only post-season classic starring teams with spotty records. Nebraska, beaten by Oklahoma last Saturday, 55-7, goes to the Orange Bowl at Miami.

The Cornhuskers have been beaten four times this year. But under the Big Seven rules, too, Oklahoma cannot go to the Orange Bowl this year because it went there last season.

Victor O. Schmidt, commissioner of the PCC, is of the opinion that the "no repeat" rule is a good thing.

"You have to examine the whole history of Rose Bowl competition to determine whether such rulings are advisable," said Schmidt. "I think it is a good idea to spread the honor of playing in the Rose Bowl around a little more."

UP's Faye Loyd Says Ohio State Best Team Seen

Waco, Tex. — (U.P.) — United Press sports writer Faye Loyd told the Waco Quarterbacks Club last night its team, Baylor, could wind up in the Sugar Bowl if the Bears win their last game.

Miss Loyd, who has covered five of the nation's biggest games this year, rated Ohio State as the best team she had seen. She rated the Buckeyes, whom she saw beat Purdue, as a notch better than Notre Dame.

But she said Baylor quarterback Billy Hooper was the top signal caller she had watched, being better than Notre Dame's Ralph Guglielmi or Army's Pete Vann.

Miss Loyd said the best sophomore backs she had seen were Del Shofner of Baylor and Len Dawson of Purdue.

"I would say that Shofner and Dawson are automatic all-Americans next year," she said.

Army Choice Over Middies

Minneapolis, Minn. — (U.P.) — The professional odds-makers have installed Army as a six-point favorite over Navy in their annual gridiron classic Saturday.

Notre Dame was rated 14 points better than Southern California, the Pacific Coast's Rose Bowl entry, and Southern Methodist was picked to defeat Texas Christian by six points.

The Minneapolis rating house which sets the official line on college football point spreads picked Oklahoma to defeat Oklahoma A and M by 21 points, the largest margin given to any team.

In games scheduled for Thanksgiving Day Thursday, Utah was rated 13 points over Utah State and Missouri 14 over Maryland. William and Mary vs. Richmond and Colgate vs. Brown were rated tossups, take your pick.

One-Point Edge
Dayton was given a one-point edge over Chattanooga and seven-point favorites Thursday included Cincinnati over Miami of Ohio, Virginia Tech over VMI and Texas over Texas A and M.

Three other Thursday games were rated for 14-point spreads, Cornell over Pennsylvania, Wichita over Tulsa and Denver over Colorado A and M.

In other Saturday games, Miami of Florida was picked over Florida by seven points, Georgia Tech was favored by 13 over Georgia, Mississippi by 13 over Mississippi State, Arkansas by 14 over Houston, and West Virginia by 19 over Virginia.

Other favorites included Boston College seven over Holy Cross, Fordham seven over Villanova, South Carolina seven over Wake Forest, Louisiana State seven over Tulane, Tennessee seven over Vanderbilt, Baylor seven over Rice, Arizona 13 over Wyoming, Auburn 13 over Alabama, Duke 13 over North Carolina, and Texas Tech 21 over Hardin-Simmons.

OSC Players Rate Shaw Over Larson

Longden escaped with little more than a headache and bruises when he was thrown from his mount as it bolted over the infield fence during the parade to the post for the second race. He was knocked unconscious and the horse I'm Going, sprawled alongside.

York, who was behind Longden in the parade, leaped from his horse and vaulted the rail to the veteran jockey's aid. When he saw I'm Going attempt to regain his feet York realized the horse's hooves would strike Longden. He restrained the animal until others could pull the unconscious jockey to safety.
