

Republican Leader Analyzes Election Results in Oregon

Jackson County Republican Women yesterday noon heard Mrs. B. von Lubken, Portland, analyze the recent defeat of Senator Guy Cordon by Richard Neuberger, and were urged to begin now for the 1956 campaign. The speaker, vice-chairman of the Republican party in Oregon, stated "we should start planning now to defeat Senator Morse — its not going to be easy."

Mrs. von Lubken gave several reasons for the Democratic victory in Oregon. She named first the lack of proper campaign organization and second said "there are too many Republican groups, each working alone." Backing up this latter statement, Mrs. von Lubken said there are no less than five Republican women's organizations in the Portland area, and that there is jealousy between the members of these groups. She said that Multnomah county did not deliver the Republican vote it should have, that there was a lack of cooperation on the state level and that the Republican machine lacked coordination throughout the entire state.

Speaking of the vote by districts, Mrs. von Lubken said that Republicans in eastern Oregon claimed the party was hampered by a lack of proper financing, and added that the north-eastern section of the state is "pro-federal power."

The opposite view was held by Republican leaders in the Willamette valley area, she said, where it was reported that Senator Cordon's attitude on foreign policy and his support of the Bricker amendment had brought strong opposition and that power had not been an issue.

Astoria and the coast area have particularly strong Democratic leadership Mrs. von Lubken said, and added that because of slumps in the lumbering and fishing industries, the coastal areas were "economically sick."

Analyzing southern Oregon, she said that here the "battle of registration was lost" adding that fewer Republicans are registered in this area than previously.

The speaker summed up by saying that Senator Cordon is a poor campaigner, that his campaign had been poorly managed, that "Republicans are too placid in Oregon," and that since the party had never had to exert itself in Oregon in the past, it was too confident this fall.

The party must now reorganize, examine its leadership, work for greater registration and better precinct organization and find out why those Republicans who did not vote in the last election stayed away from the polls, she concluded.

Mrs. von Lubken said that she believed the party might have to take up the system of paid workers in Oregon, something which the Democratic party did years ago in Multnomah county.

A general discussion followed Mrs. von Lubken's talk with various persons in the audience advancing the idea that the party should have more widespread and better coordinated publicity throughout the months between elections instead of the concentrated effort shortly before election when factual information is offset by pre-election hysteria.

Others questioned Mrs. von Lubken about possible candidates to oppose Senator Morse and she answered that party leaders are already working on this. It was said that "whoever runs against Morse must be good," and the speaker replied "there are men in this state who can beat Morse."

During discussion of paid party workers, Mrs. Bereth Hopkins, former chairman of the central committee for this county and present county clerk said she believed "the party needs a strong state chairman who is a good organizer."

Mrs. E. A. Littrell gave the report of the nominating committee. Election will be held in January, with nominations possible from the floor at that time. Mrs. Stephen G. Nye, who has

served as president the past year was again offered the head office with Mrs. Robert Keeney nominated first vice-president and Mrs. Wayne Stine, second vice-president. Others nominated were Mrs. Roy Rickard and Mrs. W. J. Moreland for secretaries and Mrs. John Pleisch for treasurer.

Mrs. Nye presided, and Mrs. Carl Wimberly Jr., presented the speaker. Several visitors were introduced. Mrs. Nye named Mrs. Keeney, Mrs. Thomas H. Ness and Mrs. Wimberly on a committee to examine the group's by-laws and suggest possible revision.

Siletz Indian Tribe To Receive \$225,000

Portland — (U.P.) — The Portland office of the Bureau of Indian Affairs today received authorization to pay the members of the Siletz Indian tribe in Oregon \$225,000 from recent sale of tribal timberlands in the Depoe Bay area.

Distributed on a per capita basis, the funds will amount to about \$250 per tribe member and will represent 75 per cent of the proceeds of the sale.

The Bureau said here it hoped to make payment to adult members of the tribe Dec. 12, for those living in the vicinity of Siletz. There are between 800 and 900 members of the group. Shares of minors and persons needing aid in the management of their affairs will be deposited to their credit in Portland banks pending settlement.

Seat sale opens the Thursday before each concert at J. K. Gill box office.

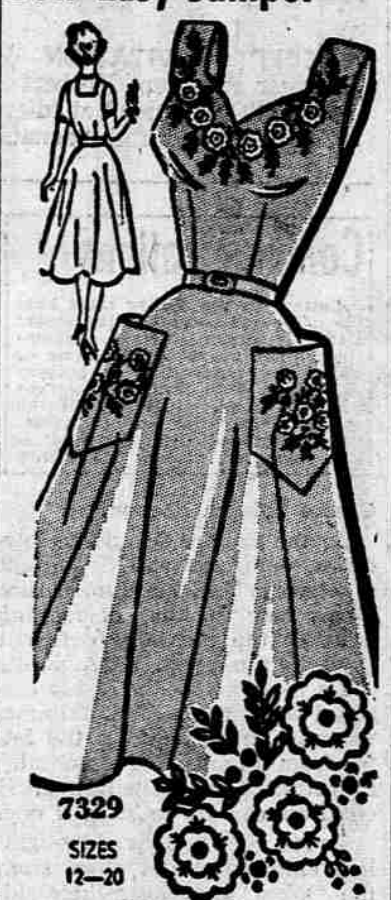
Lady Lions Hold Dinner Meeting

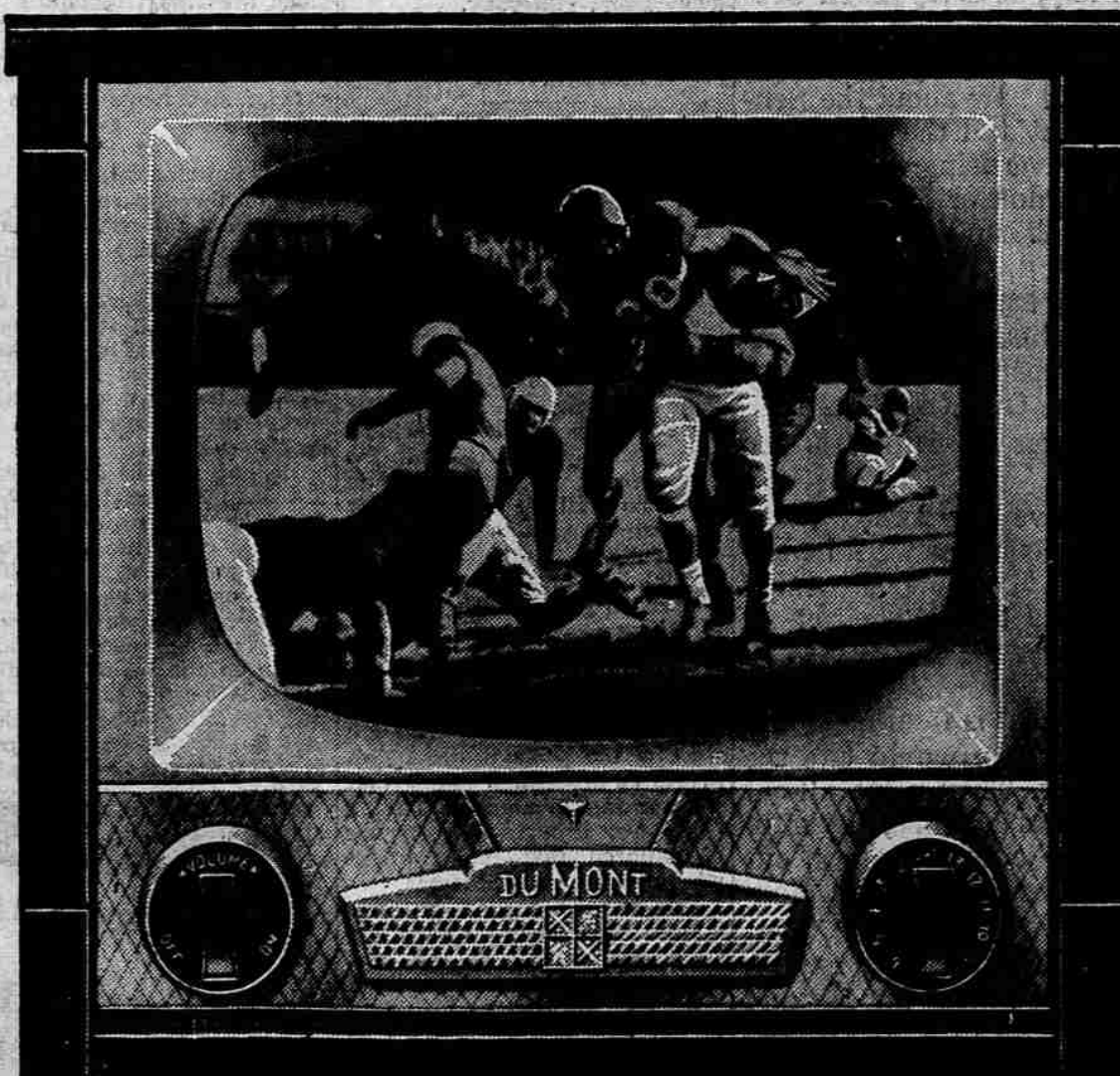

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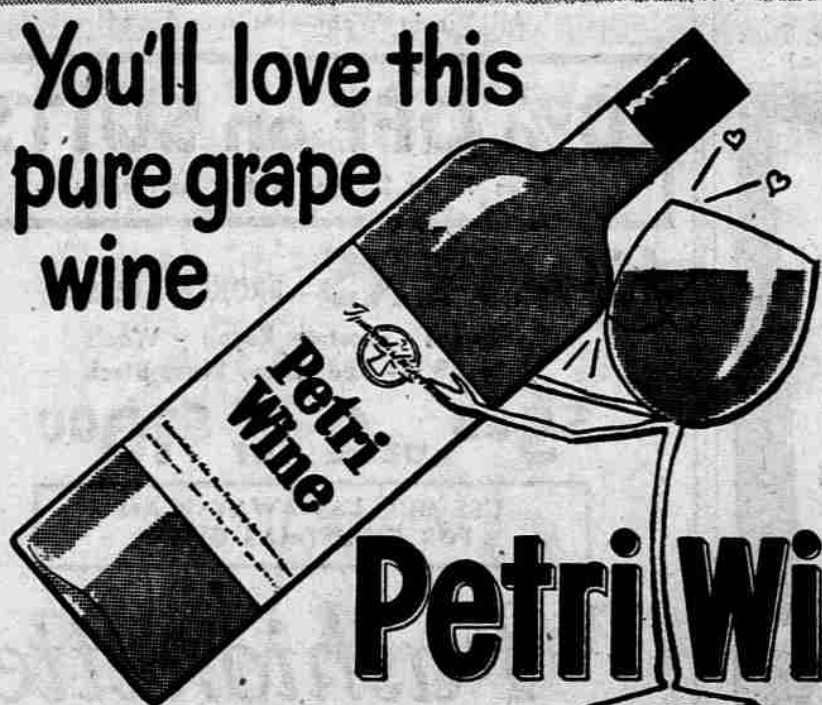
