

Soviet Delegation Permits Public To Pay Tribute at Vishinsky Bier

New York — (U.P.) — The Soviet delegation to the United Nations opened the doors of its headquarters building on Park ave. today "to permit the public to pay its respects" to Andrei Y. Vishinsky.

A Russian spokesman said the body of the white-haired chief Soviet delegate to the United Nations would lie in state from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. (EST). Then the Iron Curtain will fall once more on that part of Park ave. while the Soviets prepare for the solemn procession to Idlewild airport. Vishinsky's body will leave for Moscow and a state funeral. His widow and daughter will accompany the body.

Vishinsky's \$9,000 copper-lined casket was wheeled to its lying-in-state place on the second floor of the headquarters building, one floor beneath the living quarters where he was found dead of a heart attack Monday.

Embalming Delayed
Police red tape held up the embalming of Vishinsky's body for almost 10 hours.

A Soviet physician, identified only as Dr. Kosov, said Vishinsky died at 9:30 a.m. of stenocardia, an excruciatingly painful heart ailment known more familiarly as angina pectoris.

But New York embalmers refused to touch the body because Dr. Kosov was not licensed to practice in New York state. It was not until Dr. Milton Helsen, New York deputy medical examiner, signed the death certificate at 7:15 p.m., that permission was given to proceed with the embalming.

Vishinsky's shroud was not the familiar blue serge suit he wore while delivering vitriolic speeches against the United States. Instead his remains were clothed in a black suit, white shirt and dark tie. His horn-rimmed eyeglasses were placed among his personal effects.

Crowd Gathers
A crowd milled outside the headquarters building Monday night but a police detail kept it orderly. Photographers were permitted to enter the building however, and found Georgi Zarubin, Soviet ambassador to the United States; Kuzma Kiselev, Byelorussian delegate to the United Nations, and two members of the Soviet delegation, Arkadiy Sobolev and Amvar Kuckazov, standing at attention beside the casket.

Flowers lining the west wall of the luxurious reception room dispelled some of the gloom cast by the black borders around the flag of the Soviet Union and the black crepe hanging from the chandeliers.

The exact circumstances of Vishinsky's death at the age of 70 remained a mystery. Unconfirmed reports said he collapsed on the sidewalk and was taken back into the building.

Collapse at Desk Reported
The official Soviet version said Vishinsky collapsed at his desk while working on a speech on President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace plan.

Vishinsky was believed to be alone in the room when he was stricken with the fatal seizure that paralyzed his heart muscles.

Thus it was not known whether he died in the agony typical of angina pectoris or suddenly without pain. News of his death was withheld until after French Premier Pierre Mendes-France had delivered a major address to the United Nations. He had attended a reception given the French premier only the night before.

The United Nations was deeply shocked by Vishinsky's death. U. S. Chief Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., made an eloquent tribute to Vishinsky as a Soviet patriot during the afternoon eulogies, which were boycotted only by the Nationalist Chinese delegation.

Word comes from Russia of wholesale dismissals of Soviet government bureaucrats with thousands of white collar workers headed for factories and farms (many of them in Siberia, where slave labor camps are reported to be numerous.)

Moscow radio says the housecleaning stems from a decision of the Communist party and the government (which in our country we call the "administration") to face up to "serious shortcomings" in the Russian governmental system.

NOTE, please:

In this shakeup of Russian Communist bureaucracy, nobody hid behind any Fifth Amendment to the Russian constitution. THERE IS NO RUSSIAN CONSTITUTION AND THERE IS NO RUSSIAN BILL OF RIGHTS.

The Big Boys in the Kremlin just said to those who were getting the sack: "This is IT, Bud," and hustled 'em off—to Siberia, and elsewhere.

IT'S EFFECTIVE, one must admit.

BUT I'D HATE TO HAVE TO LIVE IN A COUNTRY LIKE THAT.

CALLING again for a show of hands, how many of the readers of this newspaper can recite offhand the fifth amendment to the constitution of the United States—or give in his own words a clear summary of its provisions?

Here is it:

"No person shall be held to answer for a capital or other infamous crime unless upon a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in case arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in active service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to BE A WITNESS AGAINST HIMSELF, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation."

THIS Fifth Amendment, of which we have been hearing so much in recent years, was the fifth of the ten original amendments to the Constitution of the United States. The others provide for freedom of religion, freedom of speech and of the press and the right of petition; for the right to keep and bear arms; for the quartering of soldiers in time of peace in private houses without the own-

er's consent; provide the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; forbid excessive bail, excessive fines and cruel and unusual punishments and give to the states all powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution itself or prohibited by the constitution to the states.

The constitution, with its seven original articles, became effective on June 21, 1788. The First Congress, at its first session in the city of New York on Sept. 25, 1789, submitted to the states twelve proposed amendments. Then of these were adopted and became effective on Dec. 15, 1791.

These ten amendments are known as the Bill of Rights of the U. S. Constitution. They guard the rights of INDIVIDUAL Americans.

THESE fundamental rights guaranteed to us by our constitution—particularly the Fifth Amendment, which provides that no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself—have been taken advantage of by many Communists, many pinkos and many fellow travelers.

Let's keep this straight: If the Communists—by subversion or otherwise—should ever succeed in taking over the United States, THEIR FIRST ACT WOULD BE TO DO AWAY WITH THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES AND ITS BILL OF RIGHTS CONTAINED IN THE FIRST TEN AMENDMENTS.

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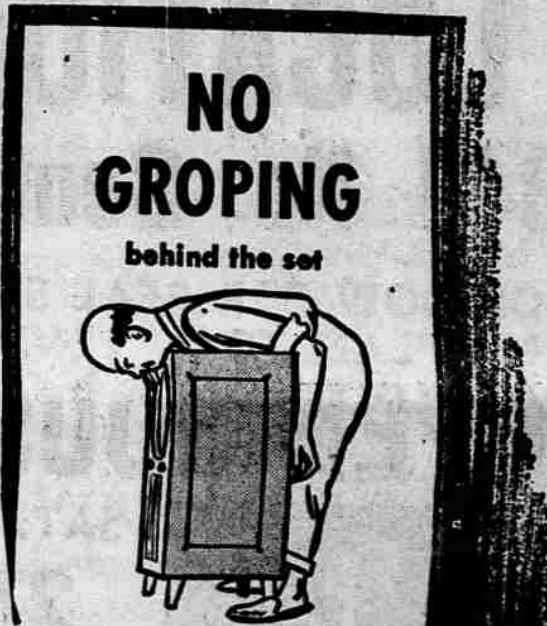
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
