

Good Weather Seen In Most of Nation For Thanksgiving

Perfect Thanksgiving Day weather was predicted for much of the nation today, but parts of the North and East were warned to be ready for snow flurries.

The Weather Bureau said the nation's only nasty weather tomorrow is to be expected from the Great Lakes and Upper Ohio Valley eastward to the Appalachians.

Snow was expected to sweep this region, dipping as far south as the Pennsylvania and Northern Virginia Appalachians and stretching into Upper New York state.

Fog in Oregon
Some fog was predicted for parts of Oregon, Washington and Northern California.

But skies will be fair and temperatures will be normal in practically all the rest of the nation, forecasters said.

In many parts of the Midwest it was to be a white Thanksgiving and the wintry weather had already claimed at least six lives in traffic accidents.

Near Pittsville, Wis., three elderly persons were killed and three were injured yesterday when their car skidded across hard-packed snow into a picket truck.

A similar accident killed two women near Milwaukee, and, at Muncie, Ind., a pedestrian was killed when a car struck him during a rain storm.

Industrial Stocks At Highest Notch In Market History

New York—(U.P.)—Industrial stocks stood today at a new all time high—a notch above the record prices of the boom of 1929.

The industrial shares soared Tuesday on a 3,680,000 share trading bonanza that lifted many individual stocks to record highs along with the industrial average.

It was the first time since Sept. 3, 1929, that the industrial average rose above 381.17. This time the average was 382.74 in a market far more stable than the boom before the bust of 1929.

Came on Steady Climb
The new top came on a steady climb that lifted the industrial average 28.78 points since the election and 127.25 points since Sept. 14, 1953.

Industrial averages alone commanded the record prices. Railroad averages held 45 per cent below the 1929 records and utility averages were 138 per cent below their previous highs.

Investors today took a matter of fact attitude toward the new highs. The reaction was in sharp contrast to 1929 when speculators greeted the market spurt with wild cheers. But the wild cheers of the 20s were choked soon in the biggest drop in stock market history.

Wall Street experts agreed that the 1954 market was built on stable factors. They saw no indications of a crack in prices in the foreseeable future.

Future Plans of Alger Hiss Unknown as Prison Release Date Nears

Editor's note: This is the first of a three part series dealing with the life and conviction of Alger Hiss, soon to be released from prison.

Lewisburg, Pa.—(U.P.)—Alger Hiss will be awakened at 6:45 a.m. next Saturday by a bugle call and the blast of a whistle outside his cell in the federal penitentiary.

He will wash, shave and dress in 15 minutes, make his bed and then go to breakfast with the other convicts as he has done for three years and eight months.

But Saturday will be different. At 9 a.m. he will walk out the prison gates. He will be free, in a sense.

Hiss apparently intends to stick to the position that there was no truth whatsoever to Whitaker Chambers' story that the two of them worked in a Communist spy ring in the 1930's and that he gave Chambers secret State Department papers.

Denial Meant Prison
His denial of those two points sent him to prison for perjury.

Two congressional committees have indicated they want to question again this man who rose high in state councils, served as adviser to President Roosevelt at Yalta, was secretary general of the San Francisco Conference at which the United Nations was born.

Hiss, now 50, a little fatter and considerably grayer, will be met at the penitentiary gate by his wife and, probably, a small army of newspapermen. It is understood the Hisses will then drive to New York to the small Manhattan apartment where Mrs. Hiss has been living.

Hiss has been a "model" prisoner at Lewisburg, according to warden Fred Wilkinson. His good behavior won him a year

and four months off his five year term. It also got him a cell for himself in the 1400 inmate prison.

Wife on 'Outside'
Last week he had the customary talk with the warden about his future life on the "outside."

Wilkinson declined to discuss it, but it must have been interesting indeed.

Mrs. Hiss and their son, Anthony, 13, have been living

quietly in the third floor walk-out apartment. The boy has gone to a private school. Friends say he is bright and well adjusted socially. Mrs. Hiss worked in a bookstore, attended Quaker services occasionally and spent a few evenings a week with friends.

Chambers is now living at his Maryland farm, the place where

he hid in a hollowed-out pumpkin the microfilm that played such an important role in convicting Hiss in the second of two trials. Chambers has indicated he intends to say no more about the man he accused of espionage for the Soviet Union.

Future Unknown
How Hiss will make his living now is unknown. He has been

disbarred by the United States

Supreme Court and by New York state. He could be employed as an adviser in a law firm. That would be a comedown indeed for an attorney who began as clerk to Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes Jr., and who had two Supreme Court justices as character witnesses at his trial.

Congress has revoked the government pension which Hiss

would have begun receiving at age 62. He cannot vote, he can never hold federal office nor can he get a passport to travel abroad.

His brother, Donald, has said he presumes Hiss will live in New York with his wife and son. Donald says he does not think Alger will write a book telling his own story as Whitaker Chambers did. The brother

said he is convinced Alger is innocent but doubts whether he will ever be able to vindicate himself.

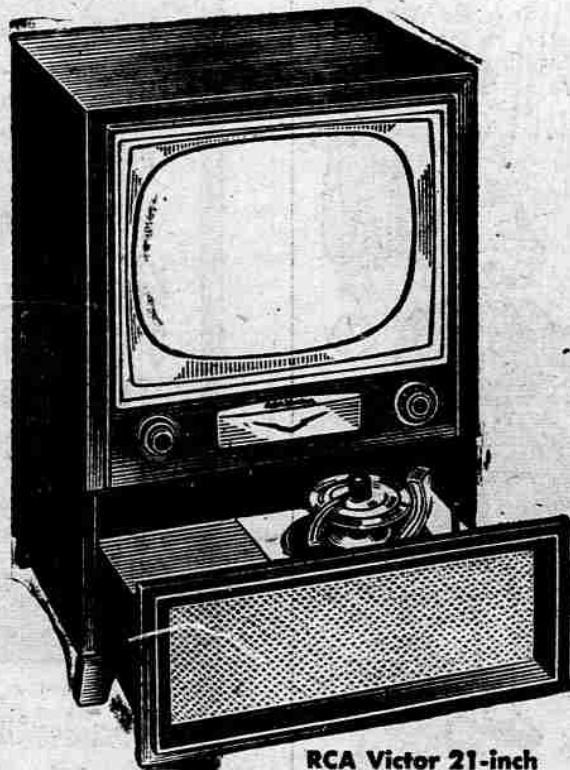
