Committees appointed by the president were constitution and by-laws, James Powell, chairman, Tony Brauner, and Pamela Cooksey; membership and rules, Charlene Cook, chairman, Martha Campbell and Mike Russell; junior high program, Karen Sloninger, chairman; high school program, Janet Perry, chairman.

The next meeting will be Monday, November 29 at 8 p.m. in room B of the Y. At that time the reports of the constitution and by-laws committee and membership and rules committee will be considered and plans will be made for the first social functions under the auspices of the new council.

The YMCA board of directors has made the social hall a kitchen available to the youth council the first, third, and fourth Fridays and the last three Saturdays of each month. The gymnasium and pool will also be available for mixed recreational activities at times when they are not being used by regular classes. Participation in the program is contingent on the payment of the basic YMCA membership fee of one dollar per year. This fee entitles the member to the use of the lobby games such as table tennis, billiards, pool, and shuffleboard as well as the right to participate in the social program.

The council is composed of representatives of the following groups: Junior and senior high school boys leagues, girls' leagues, associated student of officers, Hi-Y clubs, and Hi-Tri-Y clubs, the Medford Ministerial association, YMCA board of directors, and interested parents of junior and senior high school student.
