

Oregon's George Shaw Second Team Choice on United Press All-American

Portland — (U.P.) — George Shaw of Oregon was the sixth ranking back in the United States in the voting for the 1954 United Press All-American football team.

Shaw was elected on the second team backfield along with Paul Larson of California, Primo Villaneuva of UCLA and Bob McNamara of Minnesota. Shaw received 921 points while Larson got 877. Villaneuva had 876 and McNamara 835.

Two players from Oregon and one from Oregon State received honorable mention. The Webfoots honored were Captain Ron Pheister, at center, and Guard Jack Patena. The Oregon State was tackle Ron Aschbacher.

Pheister had 70 points; Patena 62, and Aschbacher 52.

New York — (U.P.) — The Midwest and the Southwest, landing four players each, dominated the 1954 United Press All-American football team selected today by the ballots of 308 sports writers and broadcasters from every section of the country.

The other three positions went to one player each from the East, South and Pacific Coast. Thus every section of the country is represented on the mythical eleven.

Chosen as the finest college players at their position in the land were:

Ends — Max Boydston, Oklahoma, and Don Hollender, Army. Tackles — Jack Ellena, UCLA, and Sid Fournet, Louisiana State.

Guards — Calvin Jones, Iowa, and Bud Brooks, Arkansas. Center — Kurt Burris, Oklahoma.

Backs — Ralph Guglielmi, Notre Dame; Howard Cassidy, Ohio State; Dick Moegele, Rice, and Alan Ameche, Wisconsin.

Entire New Team
All are seniors except Jones, Hollender and Cassidy, and they are juniors. None, however, was on the 1953 United Press All-American team. Of that eleven, only two played this season — center Larry Morris of Georgia Tech and back J. C. Caroline of Illinois. Morris won the second team center berth this year while Caroline finished among the honorable mentions with only 128 points.

The 306 sports writers and broadcasters who voted this year represented the largest number ever to participate in the All-American balloting, and the player who caught their fancy the most was Wisconsin's crashing fullback, Ameche. He led the point scoring with 2,753 out of a possible total of 3,388. He was chosen for either a first or second team berth on all but 35 of the ballots.

Ellena was selected as the outstanding lineman, with 2,697 points, the UCLA tackle was runner-up to Ameche, with Cassidy, Ohio State's brilliant halfback, third in the point-getting with 2,580.

Two Close Races
There were only two close races for first team berths. Fournet beat out Frank Varrichione of Notre Dame by 73 points for the tackle berth opposite Ellena, while Hollender piled up a margin of exactly 100 points over Ronald Beagle of Navy for the second end berth.

Moegele had the lowest total of

votes among the backs—1,991—but that gave him a margin of 314 points over Paul Larson of California for the fourth backfield spot.

As it has since 1951, the Midwest dominated the first three teams with a total of 13 positions. The Pacific coast was second, winding up with seven spots, followed by the Southwest and East with five each. The South, which dominated the 1951 All-Star selections with 10 posts, won only three berths on the first three teams this season.

UCLA Leads Way

UCLA won the most berths on the first three teams with four, while Ohio State, Notre Dame and Army came up with three each. Oklahoma, Georgia Tech, Purdue, California and Michigan, with two players each were the only other schools to land more than one spot on the first three teams.

West Coast Will Have
Major League Ball in 5 Years: O'Malley Says
Brooklyn, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Dodger President Walter O'Malley predicted today that California will have a major league baseball club within five years—but it won't be the Brooklyn Dodgers.

O'Malley, again denying that the Dodgers are about to leave Brooklyn for the West Coast, spoke on the subject after it was announced that Manager Walt Alton was signed for the 1955 season.

The Brooklyn prexy said that there were two ways for the West Coast to enter the major league orbit.

"First," he said, "it is up to the Coast to show it can operate economically and artistically on a plane to justify a third major league. Second, should the Pacific Coast league open its territory to the majors it is possible that two or four major league clubs could operate successfully on the Coast in 10-team leagues."

Patterson Pays Off
Wager To Langlie
Olympia — (U.P.) — Oregon's Gov. Paul Patterson paid off a wager to Washington's Gov. Arthur B. Langlie today—two huge turkeys because Washington had a better forest fire record in 1954 than did Oregon.

The wager was made last June when Gov. Patterson challenged Gov. Langlie that Oregon would have fewer man-caused forest fires. Langlie accepted but said Oregon had only two-thirds the population of Washington and the odds favored Patterson.

Langlie countered with a challenge based on the number of acres protected by each state forestry department and burned by fires during 1954.

Washington won both bets, with 516 man-caused forest fires against Oregon's 660, and Washington had fewer acres lost, 1,311 to Oregon's 2,253.

Maglioli Victor With New Mark In Mexico Race

Juarez, Mexico — (U.P.) — Umberto Maglioli, a mild-mannered Italian with a penchant for speed, owned a new record for the grueling 1,808-mile Pan American road race today and the top prize of \$18,000 that goes with it.

Maglioli, driving a blood-red Ferrari, lost the first and last laps in the world's most testing auto race, but his overall time of 17 hours 40 minutes and 26 seconds topped the old mark of 18 hours and 11 minutes set in last year's event by Juan Manuel Fangio.

Phil Hill, of Santa Monica, Calif., driving a white Ferrari owned by Allen Guiberson of Dallas, Tex., gave Maglioli a lap — a 222.5 mile jaunt from strong race in Tuesday's final Chihuahua to Jarez airport.

Unlimited Class
Both Maglioli and Hill competed in the unlimited sports car class.

Ray Crawford of Pasadena, Calif., won the heavy stock car class and \$16,800 in a Lincoln. In the U. S. small stock car class, Tommy Drisdale of El Paso, Tex., took top honors with a Dodge.

A cluster of four Italians, all driving Alfa Romeos and led by Gonzalvo Sanesi, dominated the European stock car class. Sanesi earned \$4,480.

Juarez, Mexico — (U.P.) — Ray Elliott, Portland, Ore., was third place money amounting to \$1,600 in the small stock car class of the annual Pan American auto race, which ended here yesterday.

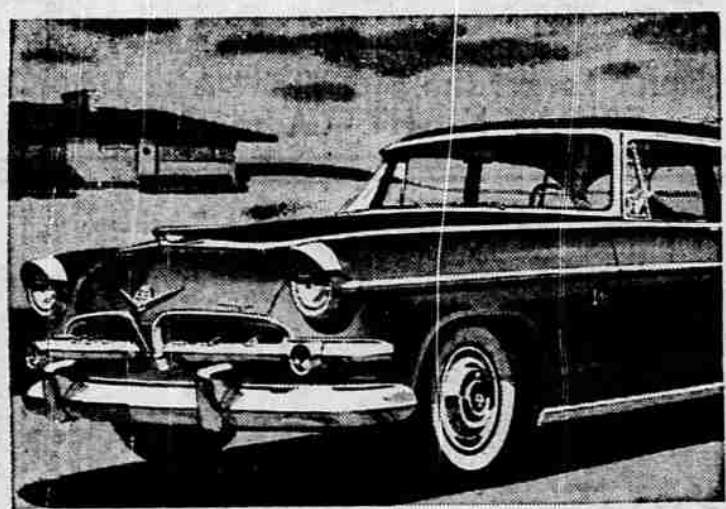
