WHY MAKE A PRODUCTION OF IT?

In the richest medical journal in America appeared a description of a method of reducing the danger of hemorrhage after tonsillectomy, by a member of the Department of Surgery, Division of Otolaryngology, of one of the foremost schools of medicine and surgery.

The operation takes about 30 minutes for an adult, twenty minutes for a child. Main feature of the method is that after blunt dissection, and bold wire snare to remove tonsil tissue extending into the tongue, the operator inserts four or five interrupted catgut sutures to close the wound completely but without undue tension. Then the whole procedure is repeated on the other side of the throat.

Whatdaya mean formidable? In 634 cases of "closed fossa tonsillectomy," as the method is called, most of them children from 3 to 10 years of age, there was no post-operative bleeding, except two accidental hemorrhages—a girl aged 7, three days

after operation, slipped away from her mother and dived off the high tower with her mouth open, tearing the sutures out of the right side; and a man aged 65 who jammed his lower dental plate into the right tonsil fossa and tore out the sutures. There's nothing remarkable about a 7-year-old American diving from the high tower, but conservation of the teeth in Yankee land must be shamefully neglected if a youngster of 65 must wear false

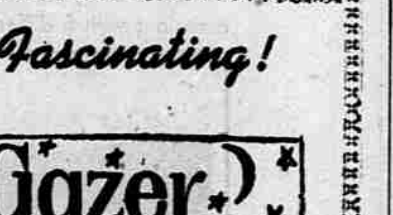

Children more often than not eat fair sized breakfasts the morning after closed fossa tonsillectomy. Swallowing is easier than it is after the ordinary atrocity. Healing is complete in four or five days. Adults can return to work in a week.

The question of the danger from buried tonsil tags is answered by the surgeon quite frankly: "If the tonsil is removed by careful blunt dissection by a competent surgeon, the number of remnants of tonsil tissue should be nominal." Where have I heard something like that before?
