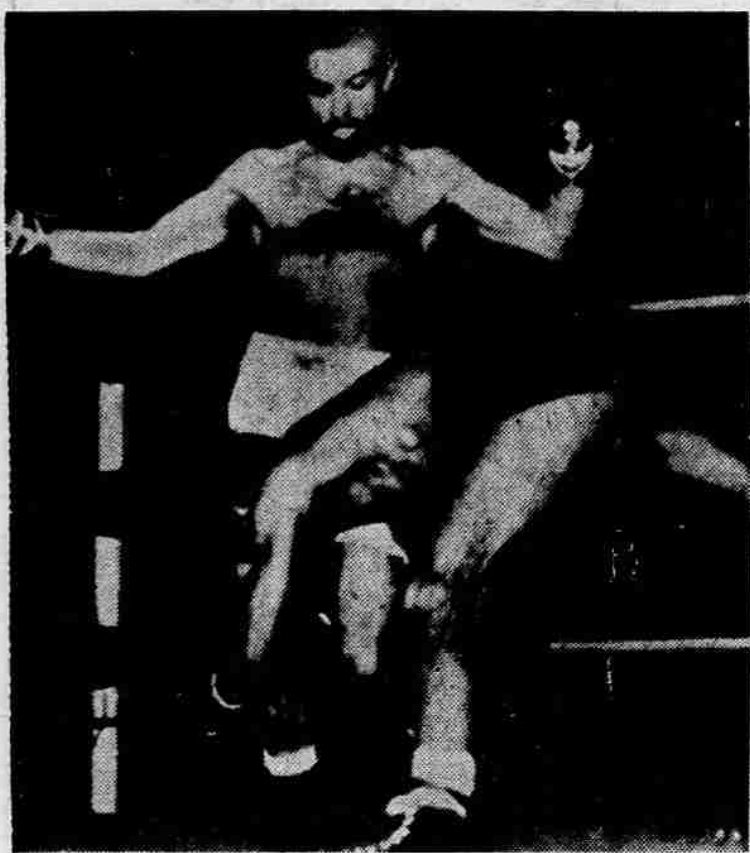

### 3 Yanks Advance In Aussie Meet

Melbourne, Australia —(U.P.)— America's hopes for ending Australia's long supremacy in Davis Cup play brightened Saturday when Tony Trabert, Vic Seixas and Ham Richardson scored impressive victories to move to the quarter-finals of the Victoria Tennis Championships.

Moreover, in this last big pretest before the inter-zone and challenge round competition next Monday, the Australian star Lew Hoad had a shaky time before winning his match from veteran Englishman, Roger Becker.

Seixas, eliminated Neale Fraser of Victoria, 8-6, 6-1, 8-6. Trabert, subdued his 'teen-aged opponent, Ashley Cooper, the Victorian singles champion, 6-4, 6-4, 10-8.

Richardson defeated George Worthington, former Australian Davis Cup player, 6-2, 6-2, 2-6, 6-3.

Vale, Ore. — (U.P.) — Tony Arana fired a 25-yard touchdown pass with less than 20 seconds remaining in the contest to give Vale a 14-7 victory over St. Helens and the 1954 class A-2 Oregon High school championship.

Tater Smith ran 48 yards to the St. Helens 25 to put Vale in a scoring position. The touchdown pass to end Gene Bates was the fifth straight completed pass by fullback Arana.

St. Helens took a 7-0 lead in the second period on a sparkling 55-yard run by Duane Marshall. Vale evened the score in the same period on a seven-yard thrust by Smith, and the two teams battled on even terms until the final 20 seconds of play.

A Medford Independent Basketball League meeting will be held at the Medford YMCA on Monday, Bill Singler, temporary chairman of the circuit has announced. Meeting time is 8 p.m.

Team representatives are asked to bring their \$35 entries fees to the meeting plus a fee of \$1 per player (with \$10 team minimum) for shower privileges.

### Sullivan Trophy Nominees Listed

Miami Beach, Fla. — (U.P.) — The Amateur Athletic union has nominated nine sports stars — including two-time Olympic champion Mal Whitfield — for the coveted James E. Sullivan Memorial award for the outstanding amateur competitor of the year.

The award, made on the basis of character, sportsmanship and athletic ability, will be decided by a vote of some 600 sports leaders throughout the nation. Results of the poll will be announced sometime in January.

Four of the nominated athletes were in the track and field division, Mal Whitfield of Los Angeles; Arthur Bragg of Baltimore, Md.; Robert Backus of Marshfield, Mass.; and Franklin Held of San Anselmo, Calif. Two basketball stars, Tom Gola of LaSalle and Don Schlundt of Indiana University, were selected as candidates. The other nominees were Patricia McCormick, Los Angeles diver; Shelley Mann, Arlington, Va., high school swimmer; and Norbert Shemansky, the heavyweight champion weightlifter from Detroit.

### 23 Grid Clubs Finish Unbeaten

New York — (U.P.) — Twenty-three college football teams, headed by Oklahoma and Tennessee, completed the 1954 season with perfect records.

Oklahoma ran its victory streak to 19 today. Oklahoma scored 304 points while holding the opposition to 62 during the season.

Tennessee State wound up its season Thursday by shutting out Bluefield State, 59-0. The Nashville school has swept its last 27 games, including 10 this year. It scored 324 points against its rivals 49 this season.

Trinity (Tex.) defeated Texas A and I Friday, 41-6 to end its season with a 9-0 record. Southern University, the only other perfect record team which did not finish its regular season last week, bowed to Prairie View today, 20-13, after winning nine in a row.

Besides Oklahoma, Rose Bowl-bound Ohio State and UCLA were the only other major teams to post perfect records.

### Aschbacher Wins Lineman Award

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Ron Aschbacher, Oregon State tackle named to the United Press all-coast football team, also has received another honor. The Lane county "30-Staters" alumni booster organization chose Aschbacher for its best defensive lineman award.

The big tackle from Prineville, who will play in the East-West Shrine game, already had won a flock of awards.

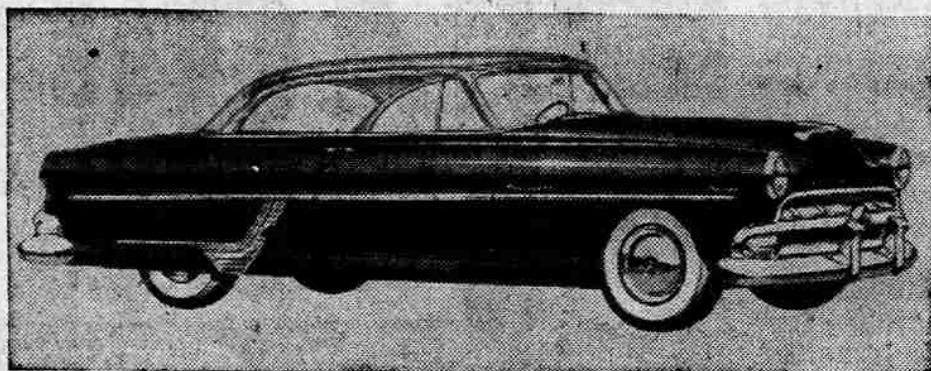

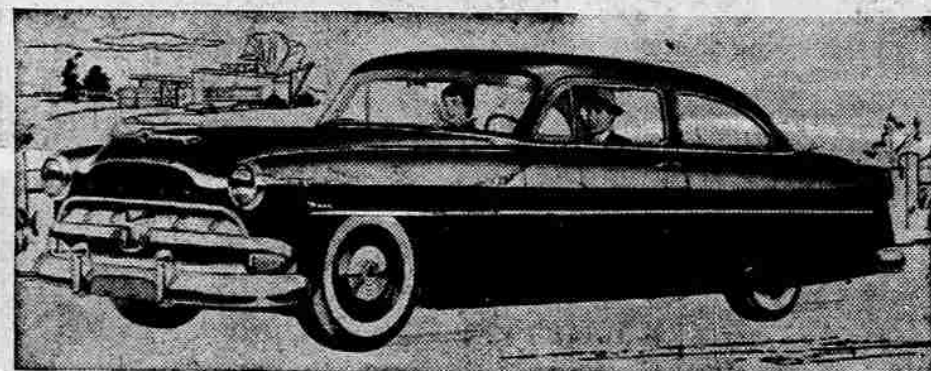

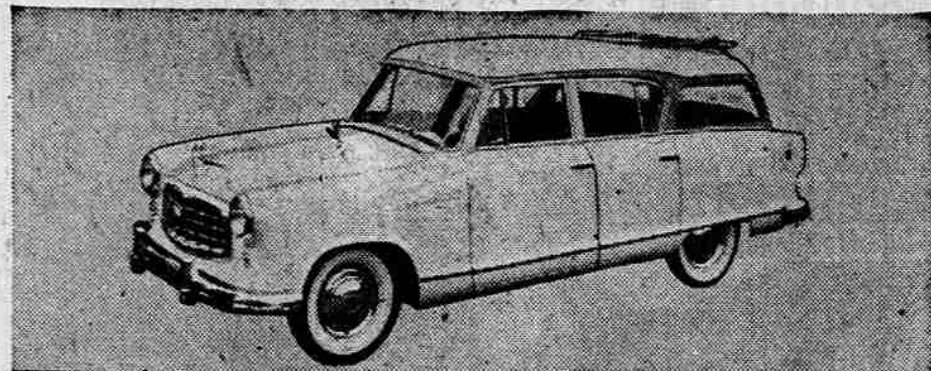
