Welsh Paces Middies As Army Licked 27-20

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — Navy's fighting football forces, sparked by the passing and running of Quarterback George Welsh, flattened favored Army, 27-20, Saturday in one of the greatest service classics of them all to win their way to the Jan. 1 Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans.

Welsh flipped for three touchdowns and scored another before 98,616 thrilled spectators at vast Municipal stadium, and then the Middies were rewarded for their upset performance as Secretary of Navy Charles S. Thomas gave them quickly accepted permission to compete in the Sugar Bowl against Mississippi.

Thomas gave them permission to play in "one of several" post-season games as they celebrated in the dressing room. And, in a secret ballot, the jubilant Middies voted to go to New Orleans on New Year's day.

They will play Mississippi. The Middies brought the huge crowd packed in to the concrete horseshoe to its feet with a touchdown after only five minutes and 10 seconds of play kept them there most of the afternoon as they lost the lead only briefly in the second quarter and then forged on top for good.

Beaten twice this season although it was the national defensive leader, Navy was a one-touchdown underdog as it went at it in the 55th game of the storied series. But the kids from Crabbtown on the Severn ignored those odds as they scored their 23rd triumph against 28 Army victories and four ties.

Navy put it squarely up to Welsh and he steered them home. On a keep play, he carried down to the 12 and then after Navy had been pushed to the 16, he faded back and flipped a screen pass to Bob Craig on the 10 and the halfback from Altadena, Calif., carried it over. Tom Weaver, trying an extra point for the first time this year, booted it through the uprights and Navy had a 7-0 lead.

An aroused Army team took the following kickoff and blasted 69 yards in 16 plays for a touchdown. Pat Uebel, the block buster from Bellevue, Ky., led a ripping ground attack which carried to the eight and Tom Bell repaid in part for an earlier fumble as he raced around left end to score.

Ralph Chesnauskas failed to convert. They went into the second

quarter with Navy leading 7-6, and Navy bounced right back with the kickoff to go 59 yards for another score. The Middies got it on their 41 due to an on-side kick and Craig and Weaver, who hails from Wausau, Wis., carried the mail on sweeps to the seven.

Two running plays lost four yards and it was Welsh again, pitching to Earl Smith of Mobile, Ala. Again Weaver booted the extra point to make it 14-6 for the Navy.

Army, taking the kickoff on its 28, battered all the way to the Navy 15. But there Navy took over only to lose the ball on a fumble, Uebel recovering on the Navy 12. Two smashes lost two yards against that charging Navy line and then Army fumbled it away, with Middle Leonard Benzi of Plainsville, Pa., recovering on the Navy 14.

Navy was penalized 15 yards for illegal use of the hands all of the way back to its three but ran it back out to the 17. There Middle Dick Guest fumbled the ball on a fourth-down kicking attempt and Hollender recovered on the three. Uebel blasted it over as the Army line put every Navy lineman on the ground and when Chesnauskas kicked the point Army trailed by only one point at 14-13.

One minute and two seconds later Army scored again to go into the lead. Navy took the kickoff on its 38 but on the first play Uebel intercepted an aerial on the Army 37 and returned it to the Navy 42. Pete Vann of Hamburg, N.Y., pitched a deep pass to Bob Kyasky of Ansonia, Conn., on the eight and he lugged it over. Chesnauskas added the point and Army led, 20-14.

Then for the second time one of those on-side kickoffs put the Cadets in trouble. Navy took it on its 46 and Weaver blasted 26 yards around end to Army's 27. The Middies lanced to the 11, were set back to the 24 by a penalty, and then it was Welsh's air arm again. He cocked that arm and flipped a perfect strike to Jim Owen of Pine Bluff, Ark., on the two. Then Welsh took it over himself on a straight-ahead keep. Weaver's third straight placement gave the lead back to Navy at 21-20.

They stowed it away in the third period with the game's final touchdown — although there still were heavy seas ahead as the Army fought desperately to get back for at least a tie.

Grants Pass Rebuilds in Basketball

Grants Pass—This a rebuilding year for Grants Pass high, the defending District 4 basketball champion.

Gone are Gene Barber, Gary Sutphin, Sam Dean and Bill Hansen, regular and the four highest scorers for the Cavemen in conference encounters last year.

Only Jim Reid is back from the regular starting crew of last season. On hand also is the No. 6 man, Don James, both are seniors. Other Cavemen lettermen on Coach Ray Davis's squad are Mel Drews and Vic Bartlett, seniors, and Bob Erickson, junior.

There's a couple of transfers, who lettered at their former school, Raleigh Burr, senior from Brookings, and Gary Hermann, junior from Red Bluff, Calif. Burr, who stands 6 feet 5 3/4, played freshman ball at Grants Pass, then won monograms as a sophomore and junior in the coast town. Hermann was at GP as an eighth grader. His Red Bluff letter was earned on the lightweight team.

Duck Unanimous
There were, surprisingly, four nearly unanimous selections on the first team; All-American tackle Jack Ellena, UCLA; end

Jim Hanifan, California; and backs Paul Larson, California, and George Shaw, Oregon. The rest of the first team was composed of end John Stewart, tackle Ron Aschbacher, Oregon State; center Matt Hazeltine, California; guards Jim Salsbury, UCLA, and Jack Patera, Oregon, and backs Primo Villanueva and Bob Davenport, UCLA.

The balloting followed quite closely the votes cast in the UP All-American selections. Ellena made the All-American first team; Salsbury, Villanueva, Larson and Shaw the second; Hazeltine and Davenport the third.

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The closest balloting was in the race for center, where Hazeltine barely nosed out Ron Pheister of Oregon. Last year it was just the reverse, with the Webfoot star getting the nod.

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Shaw, Patera, Aschbacher Named On UP's All-Coast First Eleven

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The undefeated UCLA Bruins, powerful rulers of the Pacific Coast Conference, dominated the United Press all coast selections by placing four men on the first team and three more on the second.

The all star team, chosen by the west coast sports writers with the assistance of the coaches themselves, had three men from California; two from Oregon and one each from Oregon State and Washington State.

The Pacific Coast Conference Rose Bowl representative, Southern California, failed to land a man on the first team, although the Trojans did get five men on the second and third place teams. It was the first time in post-war years that the Trojans failed to land a first team man.
