Ike Will Nominate Egypt Ambassador

Augusta, Ga. (U.P.)—President Eisenhower announced Friday he will nominate Assistant Secretary of State Henry A. Byroade to be ambassador to Egypt.

George V. Allen, now ambassador to India, will be nominated to succeed Byroade as assistant secretary of state for Near Eastern, South Asian and African affairs.

The nominations will be subject to Senate confirmation.

Mr. Eisenhower also accepted the resignation of Whitley P. McCoy as director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, effective next Tuesday.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said McCoy, who became director in July, 1953, in quitting to return to private business.

NEWSPAPER DIAGNOSES ARE MISLEADING

Some 15 years ago the head of the health department in a large city, incensed by my teachings about rabies, promised to show me evidence which would make me change my mind. I assured him I'd be everlastingly grateful if he could dispel the nightmare human rabies.

About the same time there was an extraordinary outbreak of rabies in the community—according to the newspapers. One case was particularly impressive. A young child in apparent health was left alone in the house for an hour or two. When the parents returned they found the child in convulsions. The child died several hours later. What could have caused a healthy child to go into convulsions and die like that? No, no, the child didn't find a package of candy coated strychnine pills and eat them. The health department decided that the child had rabies. A neighbor recalled that a strange dog . . .

I couldn't understand it, but the health commissioner seemed to think the demonstration settled the question of rabies in man.

Not long afterward he invited me to come to his health department office. He escorted me to the laboratories. A young man in charge showed me a rabbit in a cage. The rabbit sat munching feed. The rabbit would die in I forget just how many days, the young man said. The animal had been inoculated with a suspension of the dried spinal cord of another animal that had died of rabies.

Perhaps we don't quite get into the spirit of things when asked "What would you do if all electricity were taken away from you tomorrow?"

First of all, we'd stop paying the darned light bill.

Berlin (U.P.)—Former President Herbert Hoover said Friday the dangers of war have decreased but Communism still is trying to "destroy the very foundations of civilization."

The 80-year-old ex-President called for moral and spiritual resistance to Communism with religion the "first bastion" of defense. He spoke to West Berlin and Allied officials at the West Berlin City Hall on the last day of his six-day visit to West Germany and this Western outpost surrounded by Communist territory.
