

California Judge Halts Milk Order

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Presiding Superior Judge Milton D. Sapiro said Saturday he has granted a temporary restraining order preventing W. R. Jacobson, director of the State Agriculture department, from carrying out an order which would affect the Fresno Milk marketing area.

The restraining order was sought by the California Retail Grocers association to prevent milk distributors from charging retailers 40 cents for each milk delivery no matter how large.

The Association claimed that the delivery charge was discriminatory against small retailers because the charge was the same even if 1,000 quarts were delivered.

The action was brought in San Francisco because it was necessary to file it in a locality where there was an office of the State Attorney General.

Sapiro said a hearing will be held at the end of next week on whether the restraining order should be made a temporary injunction.

Skeleton Believed That of Missing Man.

Sonoma, Calif. — (U.P.) — Police and Tuolumne County sheriffs Saturday sought information on John Koski, address unknown, whose description closely fits that of a skeleton found near here last Aug. 14.

Sheriff Donald L. Vars said the dead man wore bib-type overalls and possessed a stainless steel railroad watch purchased in Kenewick, Wash., Dec. 29, 1951.

The same watch was purchased by Koski, a former resident of St. Paul, Minn., Vars said.

The skeleton, he said, was a white male, over 55 years in age, about 5 feet 5 inches tall. A Pacific Trailways identification check issued in Bend, Ore., July 9, 1953 was found near the body.

Vars asked that anyone having information regarding Koski contact the Tuolumne County sheriff's office immediately.

Grand Jury Indicts Youth for Slaying

Hillsboro — (U.P.) — Jerry Eugene Dodele, 16, was indicted by a Washington county grand jury Saturday for the first degree murder of Peter Ribbers, 65, in Timber, Ore., Nov. 11.

The youth, also of Timber, was to be arraigned Monday afternoon before Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters.

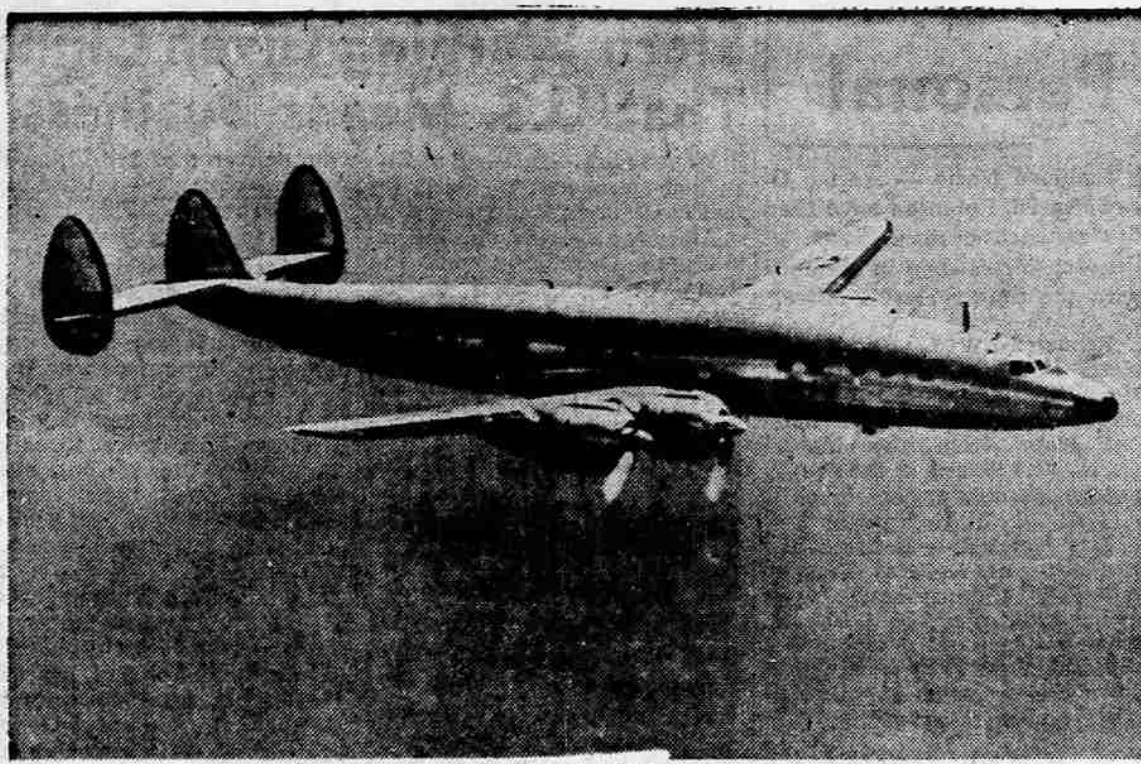
Dodele has confessed killing Ribbers with one shot from a .22 caliber rifle when the elderly machinist came home unexpectedly while Dodele was burglarizing his residence, according to Sheriff Richard Busch.

McMinnville Child Succumbs to Burns

McMinnville, Ore. — (U.P.) — Pamela Gilbert, 7, died in a Portland hospital late Friday from burns suffered when her flannel nightgown caught fire as she attempted to build a fire in a stove at her home here.

The girl was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Wooley, McMinnville. The accident occurred about 9 a.m. Friday while the rest of the family was asleep.

The little girl was treated at a local hospital and then taken to the Providence hospital in Portland. She suffered burns over 40 per cent of her body.

Warden Gives Statement on Release of Hiss from Jail

Lewisburg, Pa. — (U.P.) — Acting Warden Fred T. Wilkinson of the Northeastern Federal Penitentiary Saturday released the following official statement concerning the release of Alger Hiss:

"As provided by law, Alger Hiss was released from the United States Penitentiary, Lewisburg, Pa., Saturday.

"Hiss was committed to Lewisburg on March 28, 1951, under a sentence of five years commencing March 22, 1951. Under the law he is entitled as a matter of right to deduction from his sentence of eight days for each month that his conduct has been good.

"Section 4161 to 4163 of Title 18 makes mandatory his allowance for good conduct and the courts have, on several occasions, held that no discretion rests in the department with respect to the allowance of these credits if the prisoner's record of conduct shows that he has faithfully observed all the rules and has been subjected to punishment."

"Hiss, since he has been in Lewisburg, has not been reported for any infraction of the rules. Hiss has received only those credits for good conduct that are granted to all prisoners under the statute."

Japanese Railways Halted by Strikes

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Striking railway workers who have delayed or halted train service throughout Japan clashed Friday with police at Shinjuku and at Omiya. Postal workers also were on strike.

Six hundred strikers tangled with 300 police at Shinjuku when police moved in to break a picket line and six strikers were arrested. Three policemen and a railway worker were injured by flying glass in a similar clash at Omiya.

Union officials threatened to call a fourth wave of its slow-down strikes Saturday in a fight for wage increases and year end bonuses.

Eleven Uninjured in Crash of Airplane

Gallup, N. M. — (U.P.) — Eight passengers and three crew members aboard a Frontier Airline DC3 escaped injury Friday night when the plane crash-landed at the airport here.

The plane, on a flight from Albuquerque to Salt Lake City, was "considerably" damaged in the "belly" landing. Frontier officials said the passengers were from Colorado, New Mexico and Texas.

Airline spokesmen said the plane took off from the local airport at 7:29 p. m., but returned here shortly after when the pilot detected trouble with the retractable wheels. The plane was landed with the wheels up.

Pleads Innocent To Assault Charge

McMinnville — (U.P.) — Harace Crowley, 21, Dayton, Ore., pleaded innocent in circuit court here Saturday to a charge of assault with intent to kill in connection with a beating administered his four-year-old stepson Richard Lightle.

The boy has been unconscious since the beating Nov. 15. He was being cared for at a Portland hospital, where doctors said he has had a number of small hemorrhages of the brain. The boy is expected to live, but the permanency of the brain damage is not known.

Crowley waived Grand Jury indictment on the assault charge earlier. His attorney, James E. Craig of McMinnville, indicated he was thinking of filing a motion for a change of venue because of the strong feeling against his client in Yamhill county.

Dep. Dist. Atty. H. W. Devlin said Crowley had signed a statement admitting the beating after having "trouble" with the boy. No trial date was set.

Man Crushed To Death While Family Watches

Richmond, Calif. — (U.P.) — Charles M. Terrell, 46, Berkeley contractor, was crushed to death Saturday as his wife and small son watched when a house he was jacking up slipped and fell on him.

Terrell and his partner, Leroy Baker, 45, Richmond, had been raising the house to install a basement floor. The house was eight feet off the ground when one of the jacks slipped. The house fell sideways and a heavy beam struck Terrell, crushing his chest.

The tragedy was viewed by his wife, Wilma, 25, and their son, Charles Jr., 8, who had been waiting for him to finish work.

Silent Film Star In Fair Condition

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Alice Joyce, 64, star of silent films, was reported in fair and improving condition with a liver ailment Saturday at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital.

Miss Joyce, considered one of the screen's most beautiful actresses in the early silent era, entered the hospital two weeks ago. Her daughter, Mrs. Alice De Tolly, wife of Maj. Nicholas De Tolly, U.S. air attaché in Paris, flew here to be at her mother's bedside.

The actress was divorced from actor Tom Moore shortly after her daughter was born.

16-Year-Old Killed In Headon Collision

Merced, Calif. — (U.P.) — Clifford DeWayne Bell, 16, Watsonville, was killed Saturday when his car collided head-on with a gravel truck near here.

California Highway Patrol officers said Bell apparently tried to turn while going too fast and crossed the center line. Truck driver Leroy Jones, 22, of Stevenson, was uninjured.

Police said Bell's parents lived at Turlock.

Unemployment Claims Increased Last Week

Washington — (U.P.) — New unemployment insurance claims rose by 41,600 last week because of seasonal job lay-offs and a backlog of claims from the previous Veterans Day holiday week the Labor Department has announced.

But despite the rise, the total of 228,700 in new claims still is lower than the total for the same week a year ago, the department said Friday night. It was the third consecutive week in which claims were down from the same week of 1953.

Chicago — (U.P.) — The 55th International Livestock Exposition Saturday got down to the business of picking the best steers, hogs and lambs from the nation's farmlands.

First on tap were more than 300 fresh faced 4-H boys and girls who offered their junior steers and hogs for judging.

The judging of a bout 300 steers held the spotlight. In years past the junior grand champion has often gone ahead to win the exposition's brightest crown — the grand champion steer award.

The farm youths also put up 33 hogs for judging. The exposition, the biggest farm show in the world, opened at the International Amphitheater Friday night with a horse show.

Montgomery Says War Is Unlikely

Omaha, Neb. — (U.P.) — British Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery said Friday he does not think "there is a possibility of conflict in the world at this time."

However, he added he thinks atomic bombs would be used if World War III broke out.

Montgomery made the remarks Friday night as he visited Offutt Air Force base to inspect the Strategic Air Command headquarters.

He planned to fly Saturday to Los Angeles, Calif., where he is scheduled to speak at the California Institute of Technology on the "impact of the science of warfare on the future."

Following his speech, Montgomery said, he will visit in Hollywood with an old friend, movie producer Sam Goldwyn. The World War II hero proudly displayed to newsmen a card showing him to be an admiral in Nebraska's Navy. Gov. Robert Crosby gave him the badge on a previous visit to Nebraska.
