As We Live

A real test of conversational ability is to be able to keep the talk going when you're alone with one person. A young woman writes:

(Q) "My problem is that I am not a good conversationalist. In a crowd I'm all right, because I just ride along with the rest. But when I'm on a date, I get completely tongue-tied. I read somewhere to make a list of subjects to talk about and refer to it once or twice during the evening. I have tried this, and it just doesn't seem to work. I would appreciate any advice you would give me."

(A) Making a list of topics will work if you use it right. In the first place, if possible a list should fit the interests of the person you are going out with. Since all people have different interests, topics that would interest one might not interest another.

If you don't know the person well enough to know what his interests are, you will always be safe if you list topics that will relate to him. All people like to talk about themselves.

The second suggestion is to know your list well enough that you do not have to refer to it during the evening. This

Dr. Hurlock is likely to make you self-conscious, and it certainly will create the impression that you lack self-confidence.

My final suggestion is to get your conversational experience when you are with a crowd.

True, it is easier to "ride along with the rest," but that will not give you the confidence you need to stand on your own feet.

Listen to how people you consider good conversationalists tackle the problem of keeping a conversation going. Do your share of the talking. The more experience you have of this sort, the better able you will be to tackle the problem when you are alone.

Your Health and Its Care

YES? NO? THAT'S MY BABY?

Aunt Polly regularly comes through with a good story and as likely as not it has an element of truth in it, at least the core or theme of the piece is plausible, although the embroidery may be a shade too fancy.

The latest is about the two mothers who were handed the wrong babies in an English hospital. Somehow the babies got mixed during feeding time out there in the show window (you know, what nineteenth century hospitals call the "nursery for newborn.")

The mothers, who, under the rigid hospital rules, so dear to the hearts (am I serious?) of nineteenth century lying-in institutions, had not been permitted to get acquainted with their babies, so the poor souls both accepted whatever the hospital authorities handed them.

Well, sir, the swap might have come off all right, but after the two young mothers had gone home, each with the other's baby, the hospital authorities became worried about the mix-up, and made some blood tests which proved that the babies had been exchanged. But the respective parents—no, the putative—oh, well, the two couples were still perfectly satisfied with their babies they had brought home from the hospital and there we leave them.

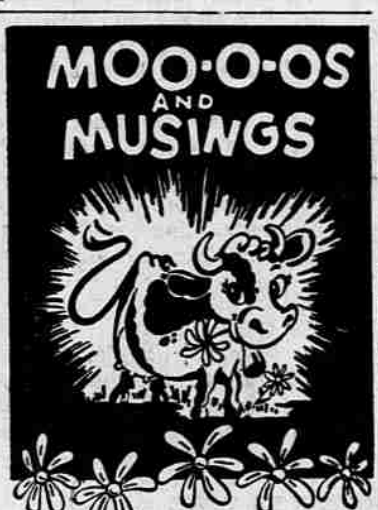

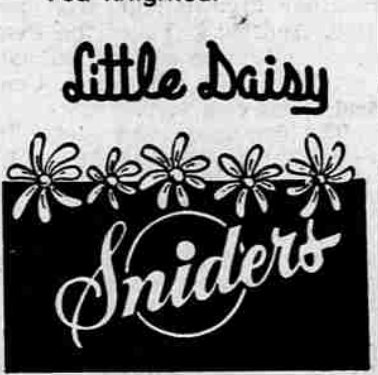
