Eagle Point—Dr. William J. Thompson and Dr. Thomas C. Anderson, both Medford, spoke at a Thanksgiving dinner meeting of Eagle Point Lions club and auxiliary held November 22 in the Eagle Point Teenage clubhouse. Fifty-three members of the two groups attended and other guests were Mrs. Lorene Reid, Medford, and Mrs. Neal Ballard, Reno, Neb.

Dr. Thompson spoke on the importance of vision to the school child, mentioning classroom environment and its effect on growth and development of the school child's vision. Slides were shown by Dr. Anderson showing the importance of good lighting in classrooms and what happens to a child's posture, as well as his vision, when there is insufficient light.
