## Freezing Cranberries Declared Successful

Madison, Wis. — (U.P.) — Cranberries no longer are merely a holiday treat.

The University of Wisconsin home economics department reports that many persons now freeze cranberries during the fall and winter months for use all year.

The best way to prepare them is to put the packaged berries into the freezer just as they come from the market. Sugar may be added when the berries thaw.

Raw cranberry relishes are a favorite with meat and poultry. It's a good idea to grind enough frozen berries to make up several relish combinations. Keep them frozen until you want to serve them as a relish or use them as a basis for a gelatin salad.

## Former Resident Becomes Citizen After 40 Years

A former Medford woman who lived in the United States for 40 years believing she was a citizen and who discovered three years ago that she was not, was recently granted citizenship in Portland. The woman is Mrs. Andrew Hedlund, Redland, Ore., who was Mrs. William E. Gould when she lived in Medford.

Mrs. Hedlund, who was one of almost 400 persons granted citizenship in a ceremony November 11 in Portland, discovered that she was not a citizen when she applied for a passport to visit her native England. She found at that time that her first husband had been a Canadian, and had never received American citizenship papers.

Mrs. Hedlund had voted each election since women were granted that right.

For three years Mrs. Hedlund gathered facts and information about her 40 years in this country which were necessary for her citizenship, and earlier this year took a citizenship course through the University of Oregon. Her husband, a native of Sweden, encouraged Mrs. Hedlund in her task. He became a citizen in 1921.

Childreth, the former Janet Gould who now lives in Gladstone, Ore.; Mrs. James Ashbaugh, Salem; Bill Gould, radio announcer in The Dalles, and Mrs. V. J. Barron, Tulelake, Calif.
