College Program Eyes Hunting Accidents

Saranac Lake, N. Y.—(U.P.)—The Paul Smith's Fish and Game Club and the Paul Smith's college have started a program that may insure fewer careless hunting accidents in the future.

Both groups are jointly sponsoring a junior hunter training program for young men, and women, who are about to apply for their first hunting licenses.

Under guidance of trained instructors, the students get classroom courses in the proper handling of firearms and study the state's game laws and regulations.

Field training also is on the program and the would-be hunter must prove his ability to handle a rifle properly. This, plus a written examination, qualifies him for a license.

Family Trip Delayed Nine Days by Dog

St. Louis — (U.P.) — Because Skipper, a K-9 Corps veteran, has an understandable dislike of dog-catchers, a family of six spent nine days in a park while waiting to get him out of the pound.

Dogcatcher James Christenson saw Skipper tied to a tree in Tower Grove Park about dawn. His owners, Van Winkle, his wife and four small sons, were asleep in a nearby auto.

Christenson rapped at the car windows. Skipper broke his leash and attacked the dogcatcher, biting his leg. That was Skipper's error. Local law entitles a dog to one bite, but Skipper had to go to the pound anyhow—for a rabies test.

Skipper's family, en route from Ohio to St. James, Mo., and low in funds, stayed on, sleeping in the park rather than leave the pet.

After nine days Skipper was declared free of rabies and departed happily with his owners for St. James.

CORNERED. BIOLOGY!

Last May the Raymond High School Biology Class cornered me and I have been seeking some way of escape with my dignity, if any, intact.

The difficulty is that the biology class, if the letter is genuine (it is signed "Sincerely, The Raymond High School Biology Class," but of course any joker might have written it) cites three authorities that contradict my teaching that growing plants are not objectionable and may be healthful in bedroom, sickroom or livingroom, day or night.

The reason why growing plants are not objectionable in the room, if the patient or occupant likes them is that they absorb from the air carbon dioxide, which they use or metabolize, and give off oxygen; animals and persons absorb from the air oxygen, which they use or metabolize, and give off carbon dioxide.

The amount of oxygen or carbon dioxide in the atmosphere of the room is insignificant so far as health is concerned, whether there are growing plants or not. The high school biology class letter continues:

"Our references contradict your statement. We believe it would be detrimental to have flowers in the bedroom of sickroom at night. These authorities state that flowers use carbon dioxide and give off oxygen during the day but during the night they use up oxygen and give off carbon dioxide. We would like to know what is right. The references are as follows:

New General Biology, Smallwood-Revelly-Baily, pages 490 and 491.

Exploring Biology, Ella Thie Smith, pages 140 and 141.

Biology in Daily Life, Curtis and Urban, pages 156 and 157."

The first two textbooks sound dreary as solid trigonometry, but the last one, Biology in Daily Life, appeals to my curiosity, and I'm going to leave it at that, because I'm afraid if I should procure a copy it will prove another disappointment, and I have been stuck like that so much that I now shun book stores and book dealers.

The high school class (are the members persons or just hypothetical characters?) communication speaks of flowers. If that means cut flowers, all bets are off—or, as one of impeccable bedside manner—I should say cut flowers in the room are as lifeless as school textbooks and so when Saireygang puts on the traditional performance toting the flowers out of the patient's room at night the purpose is to impress the yokels.

Port Research Part of Study

Buffalo, N.Y.—(U.P.)—Under a new program, college students will help to shape the future of Buffalo's Lake Erie port.

Students from the University of Buffalo, Canisius College and Buffalo State Teachers College will do research on the port as part of their school work and as research trainees with the Division of Port.

Dr. Marvin A. Rapp, consultant to the division who organized the program, says the students will do primary research on any aspect of the port they choose. Their studies may range from the history of the port to a survey of the impact of the St. Lawrence Seaway on the Niagara Frontier.

"The future of the port rests in the hands of our younger citizens," Rapp points out. "It is important that we have a number of young persons trained to help guide future decisions and policies for the port."

"The program also will be of value to the students. It will enable them to learn about the mechanics of city government. And, their studies should gear in closely with their schoolwork because the port has implications in many fields — economics, sociology, geography, engineering and history."

Rapp explains that the program will have immediate value to the city, which, he said, could never afford to hire researchers to do the amount of work the students will do over the years.

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Evergreen Cone Gathering Profitable

Bremerton, Wash. — (U.P.) — There's money in evergreen cones if you know how to steal them from squirrels.

Approximately 100 persons in Kitsap county made fair profits this fall out of the work of squirrels who gathered the cones from fertile fir, hemlock, red cedar and lodge pole pines.

The cones were sold to a seed company that pays \$4 to \$12 for a 22x26-inch bag. The seeds are planted to reforest burned areas.

One cone-picker, R. C. Porsch of Bremerton, said he gathered 10 bags in one day and sold them for \$40.

The squirrels do most of the work and stockpile the cones in the ground or in a fallen tree.

The only problem is to find the squirrels' hideout.

Some cone-pickers said they "paid" the squirrels for their labor by leaving corn, nuts, or wheat in the place of the cones.
