Head football coaching berths were open at Tennessee and the Citadel today, while Jim Tatum, one of the nation's top mentors, again was being urged to switch from Maryland to the University of North Carolina.

Seattle U. Faces U.O.

Eugene (U.P.)—Seattle University's go-go basketball team, tune-up victors over Western Washington last Saturday, meets sterner competition tonight as it clashes here with the University of Oregon of the Pacific Coast conference.

Seattle rolled over Western Washington 85-48 but Coach Al Brightman discovered several bumpy spots in his defense which need smoothing out if the Chieftains are to down the Ducks.

"Against Western our defense was very ragged," Brightman said. "Though the score didn't indicate it, Western got 94 shots. We were fortunate they made only 14. Our shooting, 34 of 70 shots, would have been better if our fast-break game had been going."

Brightman was expected to start his two watchmen guards 5-foot, 8-inch Bobby Malone and 5-foot, 9-inch Cal Bauer with Bob Godes, 6-9 at center and Stan Glowaski, 6-3 and transfer Ken Fuhrer, 6-5 at forwards.

Oregon dropped a couple to Santa Clara and the University of California over the week end. However, Jim Loscutt and Max Anderson, two of Oregon's big boys were expected to provide plenty of trouble for the Chieftains off the boards.

Expect Majors Will Reject Minors Plea

New York (U.P.)—The major leagues are expected to slam the door in the face of the minor leagues today, flatly rejecting the "little fellows' plea for restrictions on radio and television.

The minors, holding their annual meeting in Houston, Tex., last week, passed 11 amendments to the major-minor league agreement—among them one forbidding the majors from authorizing either radio broadcasts or telecasts of big league games into minor league territories.

The minors claim these air-wave shows are "killing" attendance in the minors, and declare that restrictions must be passed before the whole minor league structure is wrecked.

But the majors, meeting in joint session of the American and National leagues today, aren't expected to agree to go along. Even minor league officials attending the conclave don't hold out much hope of getting the restrictions passed.

Chances Better for Others
The minor leaguers do have more hope that another amendment they passed will be accepted—one that sets specific fees the majors would have to pay in setting up working agreements with teams in the lower minors.

These would include a \$3,000 to \$5,000 fee for making the agreement, plus a \$100 minimum fee for each player the major league team called up from the minors, plus some help in paying the manager's salary and in paying spring training expenses.

The American and National leagues met separately Monday and the emphasis in both cases was on expansion. In fact, there were appearances of a "Westward Ho" race between the two circuits to see which one could

ceed ailing Lowell (Red) Dawson at the helm of the Panther's football team.

Bowden Wyatt, who directed Arkansas into a Cotton Bowl berth this season, immediately was installed as the leading candidate for the vacant Tennessee position, while former Army backfielder John Sauer was being tabbed as the next coach at the Citadel.

Wyatt definitely would fill the bill as Robinson's successor at Knoxville, where officials reportedly are looking for an outstanding "Tennessee man." He learned his football as an end under former Volunteer Coach Gen. Bob Neyland.

However, Wyatt's salary recently was increased to \$15,000 at Arkansas, where he also was handed an additional \$20,000 from an "appreciation fund" and a new automobile from overjoyed Razorback fans. Thus it would seem doubtful he could be persuaded to leave his current post.

Sauer visited the Citadel's president, Gen. Mark W. Clark, Monday but said he merely was giving the former Army commander "pointers on what we did" in the athletic organization at West Point. Currently an assistant coach with the professional Los Angeles Rams, Sauer played in the same Army backfield with Glenn Davis and Felix Blanchard in 1943-44-45.

New York (U.P.)—Manager Marty Marion of the Chicago White Sox, joyful at obtaining six new players in two deals on the same day, said today he thinks the Sox will be a pennant contender now because they have new slugging power.

"Minnie Minoso couldn't do it all," explained Marion. "We had to have some more hitting power."

Marion, brand-new manager of the third-place Sox, was supplied with these new players Monday as General Manager Frank Lane swung two major straight-player deals in eight hours at the major league meetings here:

First baseman Walt Dropo, outfielder Bob Nieman, and pitcher Ted Gray—obtained from the Detroit Tigers in exchange for first baseman Ferris Fain, infielder Jack Phillips and pitcher Leo Cristante.

Catcher Clint Courtney, infielder Jim Bredeweser, and pitcher Bob Chaleke—obtained from the Baltimore Orioles in exchange for pitchers Don Johnson and Don Ferrarese, catcher Matt Batts, and utility infielder Fred Marsh.

Marion explained that Minoso was regarded as the only "long ball" hitting threat on the squad last season. He said that a team of "high average" but singles-hitting players did well at home in big Comiskey park, but lost some key games in smaller parks for want of a couple of home run belters.

LaSalle Ranked Top Team; Oregon State Picked 17th

New York (U.P.)—LaSalle, the defending NCAA champion, received 28 of a possible 35 first-place votes today to top the first 1954-55 weekly college basketball ratings of the United Press Board of Coaches by a wide margin.

With the voting based on games played through Saturday night, Coach Ken Loeffler's LaSalle team collected 322 of a possible 350 points. LaSalle won its first two starts, including an

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Missouri Upsets Indiana, 64-61

Credit Missouri's defensive-minded Tigers with the first major upset of the college basketball season—a 64-61 triumph over Indiana on the Hoosiers' home court.

Indiana, currently ranked fifth in the nation by the United Press Board of Coaches and an easy winner of its only previous game, seemed on the way to the expected victory as it took a 35-32 halftime lead and increased it to 53-47 midway in the second half.

But right there the Hoosiers ran smack into a roadblock thrown up by Tiger Coach Sparky Stalcup. The Hoosiers were kept outside, and their outside shots missed. Indiana had only five second half baskets. Missouri went on a scoring spree to take the lead and never lost it. Hoosier All-American center Don Schlundt took scoring honors with 25 points.

Three other highly ranked teams—second-ranked Iowa, third-ranked Duquesne, and 13th-ranked Utah—came through with expected triumphs. **Hawkeyes Win Third**

Iowa, favored to succeed Indiana as Big Ten champion this season, racked up its third victory in easy fashion, 84-61, over Nebraska and ran its home non-conference winning streak to 34

games. The Hawkeyes took a 43-27 halftime lead and coasted home to spoil Nebraska's home debut under new Coach Gerry Bush. Bill Logan and Deacon Davis of Iowa and Rex Ekwall of Nebraska each had 14 points.

Duquesne opened its season with an easy 72-52 conquest of Carnegie Tech and got set for its first major showing in the Steel Bowl tournament this Friday and Saturday.

Utah, now rated as the title favorite in the Skyline conference, broke its field house scoring record in walloping Hawaii University, 109-67, as Art Bunte sank 20 points.

Kansas Rout's LSU
Kansas showed that it will be a dangerous rival to Missouri in the Big Seven by displaying its strength in an 83-58 rout of Louisiana state. The Jayhawks of Phog Allen rolled up an early

20-9 lead and breezed home as Dallas Dobbs led the scoring with 18 points.

In other leading games Monday night: Dick Cable's 25 points paced Wisconsin as the Badgers won their first game in two starts, 80-68, over Western Michigan; Loyola of Chicago pulled away in the second half to beat North Dakota State, 90-75, as Art Schaik scored 18 points; Arizona upset Kansas State 86-81 as Ted Lazovich scored 24; Tulsa downed Baylor 60-48; Detroit, tabbed a strong Missouri Valley rival for the Oklahoma Aggies, drubbed Bowling Green, 91-60; Colorado crushed Brigham Young, 65-46; Marquette romped over Creighton, 96-63; Harvard downed Northeastern, 61-49; SMU beat Northwest Louisiana, 98-86; and Virginia ripped Randolph-Macon, 95-54.

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
