

Ducks Find Scoring Range; Defeat Seattle Club 86-73

Eugene — (U.P.) — The University of Oregon basketball squad, which dropped its first two games, found its scoring eye last night and defeated Seattle university 86-73 in a pre-season contest.

The Ducks went into the lead after less than three minutes of play in the first half, and led through the remainder of the contest. Halftime score was Oregon 47, Seattle 37.

Stan Glowaski, Seattle forward, and Max Anderson, Duck forward, shared scoring honors with 25 points apiece. Dick Stricklin made 16 points for Seattle from his forward post.

Scoring Divided

Aside from Anderson's effort, Oregon scoring was evenly

divided, with Jerry Ross and Jim Loscutoff, scoring 13 points each, and Howard Page and Phil McHugh notching 12 each.

Oregon meets Portland university at Portland tonight in its last game before making a whirlwind tour of the Midwest. Oregon plays Louisville Dec. 20, Dayton Dec. 21 and Detroit Dec. 22.

Eugene — (U.P.) — Coach Barney Holland's Oregon JV basketball team opened its season here last night by downing Tongue Point Navy 89-41. John Lundell, former The Dalles ace, led the winners with 18 points. Carlos Murphy and Bob Norman had 12 each for the losers.

Safe Driving Day Proclaimed Here By Mayor Flynn

Following is the text of Mayor Diamond L. Flynn's proclamation of Dec. 15 as Safe Driving day:

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, December 15, 1954, has been set aside as S-D day—SAFE-DRIVING DAY, throughout the United States to demonstrate that motorists and pedestrians alike can reduce traffic accidents, and

Whereas, the President of the United States and the Governor of the State of Oregon have asked all Mayors and officials for their active support in this campaign, and

Whereas, accidents last year killed one person on the average of every 14 minutes around the clock and throughout the year for a total of 38,300 Americans,

Now, therefore, I, D. L. Flynn, Mayor of the City of Medford, do hereby proclaim December 15, 1954, as S-D day—SAFE-DRIVING DAY, in the City of Medford and urge every citizen to cooperate in this great cause and challenge them to remain completely free of traffic accidents for the 24 hour period.

Spokane Robber Gets 10-Year Term

Spokane — (U.P.) — George Quastling, 21, a native of Czechoslovakia who nearly got away with one of the biggest bank robberies in the history of the Northwest, was sentenced yesterday to 10 years in prison.

Quastling, Denver, Colo., robbed the Dishman state bank at Dishman, a small suburb east of here, of \$135,000 on Sept. 10.

Quastling, who earlier had pleaded innocent to charges of bank robbery and interstate transportation of stolen vehicles and stolen guns, yesterday changed his plea to guilty of bank robbery.

He was to be taken to McNeil island federal prison today.

The other counts against Quastling were dismissed.

Wimer Youths To Face Destruction Charge

Two 18-year-old Wimer youths are to appear in district court on Saturday at 10 a.m. on a charge of wilful destruction of a street lamp on West Evans creek rd., in Rogue River, according to court records.

Kuchel Denounces McCarthy Attack

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.), who voted against censuring Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, last night denounced the Wisconsin Republican for his attack on President Eisenhower.

"Sen. McCarthy is 100 per cent wrong," Kuchel declared. "The last Congress, under the leadership of President Eisenhower, passed the strongest anti-subversive legislation in the history of Congress."

Road Crew Flagman Killed in Accident

Salem — (U.P.) — William M. Shaw, flagman on a Marion county road crew, died yesterday in Santiam Memorial hospital east of here from injuries suffered while working near Aumsville last Thursday. Shaw, 66, was working on Market road 40.

The road crew was picking up dirt along the shoulder when Shaw fell between two trucks and his head lodged against the wheels of one of the trucks.

A display of the pine cones was set up in the window of Trowbridge and Flynn on West Main st. The cones may be purchased there and the boys also plan to make house to house calls selling them.

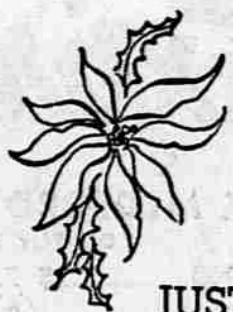

SISTERS SHARE BIRTHDAY

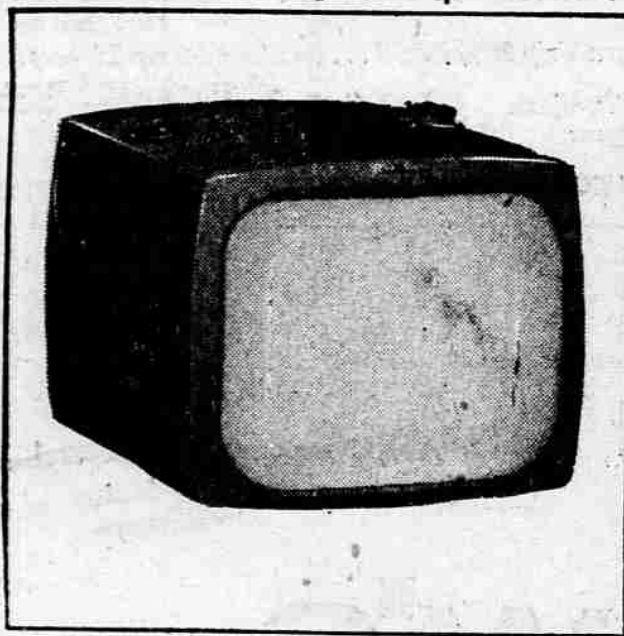
