Columbia Compact Argued at Hearing

Portland (U.P.)—Pros and cons of the proposed Columbia basin interstate compact were argued here yesterday at a meet- ing called by Oregon members of seven-state group here.

Gus Norwood, executive secre- tary of the Northwest Public Power Association, listed seven objections to the proposed com- pact. Howard R. Stinson, attor- ney for the compact commission, made a counter argument to each point.

The session was largely devoted to an explanation of the back- ground and meaning of compact articles. About 40 persons at- tended.

The proposed compact must be approved by legislatures of the seven western states. Under the proposed terms, Oregon,

Washington, Idaho and Montana would have two votes each and Nevada, Utah and Wyoming one each.
