Pulp Manufacturing Leads Maine Industry

Augusta, Me. —(U.P.)—Pulp and paper manufacturing has taken over as Maine's largest industry after half a century of leadership by textiles.

Official figures show that pulp and paper products in the state last year were valued at \$285,000,000 compared to \$256,000,000 for textiles.

In 1952, textile goods produced in Maine were worth \$273,000,000 while the paper-pulp mills turned out \$248,000,000 in products.

A long-range expansion program by the paper industry and the steady transfer of the textile industry to the South were credited by business analysts as the causes of the change.

Seaway May Make Chicago Larger Than New York City

Chicago — (U.P.) — The St. Lawrence Seaway eventually should make Chicago larger than New York City, according to Robert Kohl, president of the Midwest Steamship Agency, Inc.

"The only thing that made New York the biggest city in the country is that everything had to stop there," he said. "Now there'll be no reason to stop. We'll come right to Chicago with imports and leave from here with Midwestern products for foreign countries."

Even Chicago banks are advertising their foreign exchange departments, to let the small business man in the Midwest know his bigger business can be transacted near the home office.

The small midwestern business man will grow with the seaway, Kohl said, because it will eliminate the railroad freight and handling costs which had prevented him from competing with the eastern trade.

Five lines now make regular runs from Chicago to France, Belgium and Germany; three go to Scandinavian countries; three to the United Kingdom; two to the Mediterranean area, and one to the Caribbean. Some of the 10 lines serve more than one area.

The Ahlmann-Transcaribbean Line, which started sending its freighters from Chicago in 1953, carries between 1,500 and 1,800 tons of cargo on its regular runs to Venezuela.

More tonnage will move when the locks are fewer and bigger. The present locks are 258 feet long and 42 feet wide. Under the new law authorizing the \$105,000,000 seaway project, the locks would be 800 feet long and 80 feet wide. But Adm. Lyndon Spencer, president of the Lakes Carriers' Assn., Cleveland, says they should be 900 feet long and at least 100 feet wide to handle ships large enough to compete with eastern trade.

There now are 30 locks between Montreal and Chicago to maneuver through, each ship must be raised 581 feet above sea level. The seaway project would reduce the number of locks and thus make transportation easier and faster.

En route from Chicago to overseas a freighter's manifest showed: from Chicago — steel, ore, tractors, housewares, canned and dried meats, paints; from Milwaukee — Milwaukee beer (on return it would bring German beer); from Detroit — autos and automotive parts; from Cleveland — glassware; from Toronto and Montreal — Canadian whiskey.

The lines also expect to increase passenger lists when the seaway is completed and bigger ships can move out of the Midwest. But even now, the freighters carry 12 passengers, with private cabins for each. The ships have game rooms, ballrooms, barrooms and deck chairs — just like the regular transoceanic passenger liners which put in at New York.

More Lines
Great Lakes shipping interests already are preparing to carry more tonnage.

This year 10 shipping lines operated to foreign ports out of the Great Lakes, with about 300 sailings from the end of April to mid-November. That was double the number in operation in 1951. In 1952 there were six lines using the Lakes and in 1953 there were nine.

The Midwest Steamship Agency reported many inquiries from other lines wanting to ship via the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence.
