

Mental Health, Tuberculosis Topics for PTA

Elk-Trail — A mental health film, "First Lesson," was shown Friday evening during a meeting at Elk-Trail school of Elk-Trail Parent-Teacher association.

Miss Mary Vandenberg of the Southern Oregon Child Guidance clinic discussed emotional problems which sometimes exist in a classroom, factors that could multiply them and methods of dealing with them by parents, teachers and the child guidance clinic.

The functions and purpose of the clinic were explained, and how parents may obtain help for their children through it. Miss Vandenberg also stressed the need for cooperation between parents and teachers for the betterment of conditions for children.

Mrs. Thomas McCready, health chairman for Elk-Trail PTA who attended a meeting of Jackson county Public Health association recently, explained the newest developments in the tuberculosis control program for Jackson county. She spoke of the new permanent chest x-ray unit at Community hospital, for the use of anyone who wishes to have chest x-rays, and the fact that an estimated 100 persons in the county have unknown tuberculosis.

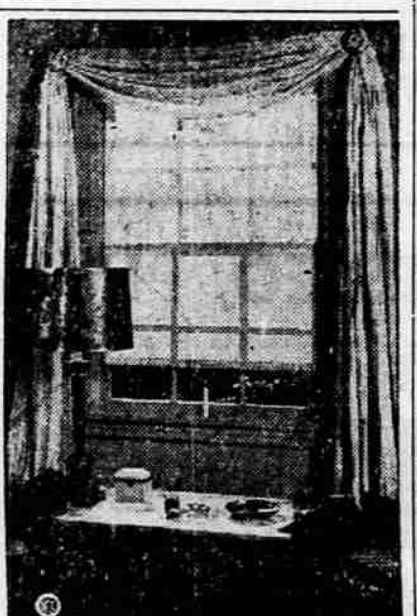

If you never seem to have time to make those fancy cocktail "go-withs" in that crowded hour before your guests arrive, here is a recipe for easy and zesty cheese wafers. Mix well together one package (three ounces) of soft, snappy cheese; ¼ cup butter, ¼ cup each of sifted flour and crushed cornflakes. Shape into little balls, place on ungreased baking sheet and, after flattening them with the back of a spoon, bake in a hot oven (400°F) for seven to 10 minutes. Or make them the day before, store and chill, unbaked, in your gas refrigerator until needed. Makes about two dozen.
